Local News.

Commercial Bank bills sold in London on Tuesday for 92 in gold at the brokers.

COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS.—This Court opens at Guelph on Tuesday the 10th December.

An attempt has been made in Greenock, Scotland, to raise one hundred guineas for a statue of Galt, the novelist, father of the Hon. A. T. Galt, and has proved abortive.

MR. T. J. DAY, bookseller, opposite the Market, Guelph, will send a copy of the 'Mechanics and Engineers Pocket Book' (an almost indispensable article) to any part of Canada for \$2.50 free of cost.

John Davidson Esq. of Galt is erecting a new building on the lot at the rear of the Commercial Buildings, to be used as a Post Office. The work is being pushed rapidly forward, as the rooms of the present postoffice have been leased by the Royal Canadian Bank.

About eight thousand feet of flooring was also consumed. It is supposed to be the work of an incendiary. There was an insurance of \$800 on the property.

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Parliament of Canada.

HOUSE OF COMMONS, Ottawa, Nov. 13th.

The debate on the Address was continued yesterday by Dr. Tupper. There was nothing new in his remarks, merely a discussion of the history of the Confederation question in Nova Scotia. Mr. Bellerose spoke briefly on the Union side and Mr. McLellan, of Nova Scotia, gave the anti-Union view of the case.

Mr. James Young of South Waterloo, made an able speech. He said he was a humble member of that party which had for many years been in the ascendant in Ontario, and which he believed, though temporarily betrayed by false friends, still contained in its ranks a majority of the people of that Province.

He thought that in the constitution we had received, the powers of Government were rather too much centralized, and recent events appeared to give ground for the suspicion that some members of the Government and other Conservative members of the House were hostile to the continuance of the Local Legislatures.

Washington, Nov. 13th.—It is rumored that Gen. McClellan has been or will be tendered the appointment of Secretary of War by the President.

New York, Nov. 13.—A number of merchants and capitalists of this city, large holders of N. Y. Central, representing \$13,000,000 of the stock, have addressed a letter to Commodore Vanderbilt, endorsing their proxies, requesting him to use them in the selection of a proper board of Directors at the next election.

New York, Nov. 14.—A despatch from Vassarcollege College, Poughkeepsie, at one p. m., says the observation began at 10:30 p. m. The light of the moon makes it impossible to see faint meteors, but the number of brilliant ones is unusually large.

St. Louis, Nov. 14th.—A fire last night consumed property to the amount of over \$22,000.

Springfield, Mass., Nov. 14.—Six inches of snow fell here yesterday, delaying the railway trains.

Nashville, Nov. 14.—Major Jas. Work, formerly a rich slaveholder and resident of this city, committed suicide by cutting his throat.

New York, Nov. 14.—Last night a thief named Maugee was shot and fatally wounded by a police officer.

John Nevin, of Brooklyn, yesterday assaulted his wife with an axe, breaking her collar bone and crushing her skull. He was arrested.

New York, Nov. 14.—The meteoric shower did not appear in much force last night, a few small meteors were discernible but nothing alarming appeared.

New York, Nov. 14.—Wm Connor was fatally burned by kerosene explosion while filling a lamp last night. 7161 emigrants arrived making 220,475 for the year. Judge Busted leaves here this evening for Alabama to try the case of James Hickman. Hickman was tried for treason by a petit jury. He now brings a suit against the jury, judge, marshal and all concerned for false imprisonment, laying his damages at \$280,000.

The Community System in Bavaria. In Bavaria the old system of communities still exists in full force. Each community is bound to support all the members who cannot support themselves.

As a consequence great pains are taken to keep people from coming upon their hands for support. To do this, the government undertakes the regulation of marriage, saying who shall and who shall not be permitted to wed. Though there are thousands of stout daughters of Bavaria sighing to be married, and thousands of beer-soaked young men hungering to marry them, it cannot be done unless the men can show that they have an assured means of support.

Latest from Ottawa.

It is reported that Mr. Rose is wavering whether to enter the Government or not. The impression now is that the arrangements are only intended to keep the place warm for Mr. Galt.

Not a single bill has yet been introduced of any kind, nor has any notice of any bill yet been given.

There are reports here that the government have it in contemplation to expend the £3,000,000 for the construction of the Intercolonial Railway, under a board of Commissioners, to be appointed from each Province.

A fresh survey of the Intercolonial Railway the rumour goes, is to be ordered, and the selection of a route will hardly be made, in that event, till next summer.

Hon Mr. Campbell has introduced a postal bill in the Senate. It is proposed that in future the rate shall be, on letters 3 cents, and on newspapers 1/2c. payment in all cases to be in advance.

WORTHY OF CONSIDERATION.

The New York Times has the following from its Berlin correspondent as to the new German Parliament:—

"The Reichstag will probably adjourn on the 26th inst. You have no idea how well the not paying of the members is working! They are as industrious as bees, and dispatch in eight days more business than our Congress in a whole season."

We would recommend the foregoing paragraph to the notice of the gentlemen at present in Parliament assembled, legislating for the good of the Dominion of Canada. We presume that they are engaged in legislation, and that they will continue to engage in it until the session is adjourned, and not waste their time in unworthy efforts to show which is the more clever man.

How Sewing Women are Robbed.

Wonder if we have no cases near home something like the following, the account of which we clip from the New York Tribune of Monday;—Miss Bertha Linley, of No 86 Columbia street, a hard-working girl, appeared before Justice Mansfield on Saturday afternoon, and said that she had been engaged by William Herbert, a German tailor, at No. 164 Attorney street, to make pantaloons at the rate of 16 cents a pair, and when she had made the third pair she demanded her money, which he would not pay because, as he said, he had found a defect in the work.

CONFEDERATION IN NEWFOUNDLAND.

This subject is just now seriously occupying the attention of the people, and there is manifestly a growing feeling in favor of it. They are dissatisfied with their present condition, yet they are generally opposed to an immediate union, desiring to wait till they see how Confederation works with the other Provinces.

WAR IN PERU.

Peru is again in the midst of a civil war, and President Prado has found it necessary to place himself at the head of troops to put down the insurrection. It is a new feature in these civil wars that the Government of Chili has been requested and has been found ready to furnish troops to President Prado.

The Directors of the Atlantic Telegraph have done a wise and liberal thing in reducing the rates. Hitherto it has been universally felt that their arrangements were narrow and illiberal, and calculated to restrict the use of the telegraph between Europe and America to speculators, bankers and other classes. Fifty dollars was the lowest price at which any message of any length could be sent, and even this was surrounded with so many restrictions and additions that nothing of any practical value could be sent for less than seventy-five or a hundred. The companies have done what any companies under such circumstances, might reasonably have been expected to do;—they have reduced the rates, in the hope of thereby largely increasing the business. They have fixed the minimum price of a message at \$25 instead of \$50, as it was before; they have made a liberal allowance for date, address and signature; and they have abolished all distinctions between "plain messages" and messages suspected of meaning something else than what they say. They have thus brought the Transatlantic Telegraph within the reach of the great body of the people, and have, we trust, increased in much more than a corresponding ratio the use that will be made of it. The rates now are not higher than they are over land-lines of equal length.
