The Temperance Movement.

We condense the following from late telegrams to the Tribune hereon:

Gincinnati, Feb. 23.—Reports from various points show no weakening on the part of the ladies in the cause of temporance. At Mount Vernon 200 ladies paraded to-day, and the bells have been ringing over their conquests. Five surrenders are recorded. Five places are still left for the ladies to conquer. At McConnelisville three saloons were closed to-day, and the contents emptied into the Muskingum River. At Xenia up to to-night 15 saloons have been closed, and several are expected to surrender to-morrow. The ladies are joyful over their success and gain new strength daily. At Nelsonville twelve liquor dealers have proposed to stop selling or handling liquor if the druggists will also agree to do it. They also ask that shipments to individuals shall be prevented, and that nonce but physicians shall keep liquor for prescriptions. At Jeffersonville, Fayette County, all the saloons are closed but two. This is the last place in the county left for the ladies to subdue.

It prevented the convert from having any social influence whatover, for, when a native embraced Christianity, he was immediately ostrpacied by, his family and friends; they never even spoke of him; he was considered as dead, and for any influence he could exert, he might as well be really under the the sod. Other hindrances in the way were the immense vested interests of the Hindoo religion, he riches of the temple and priests; the superstitious, reverence paid to the Erahmins and Pundits; and the deep-seated bolist that the Hindoos had in their religion—in illustration of which Mr. Messmore spoke of the fanatical self-sacrifice of the Fakeers. The difficulties with the Mahommedans were of a different kind. They hated Christianity with an intense bitterness, whilst the feeling of the Hindoos was merely a passive dislike or in difference. The faith of Mahomet was a proselyting religion, like Christianity, and the two systems met in an:agonism just here. They had been at swords point since the time of the crusaders, and there was bad blood between them. The loss of the mighty Mahommedan empires of India always ranked in the minds of the prophet's followers. They also looked down upon Christians as an inferior race, and as idolaters, in the same ways as we look down upon uncivilised savages. The Parsees were an intelligent race. For sixty years Christianity had not made a convert from amongst them; but recently several of them had been won over to the true faith, which had so enraged the others that murders and murderous assaults had been committed in Bombay on the converts. Mr. Messmore concluded an admirable speech by a reference to these difficulties, and the necessity for a firm and steadfast faith to meet them. The choir sang Handel's "Halelujah Chorus."
