The City of Akron, O., Swept by a Fear-ful Tornado Scores of Bull rnado Scores of Build-ings Wrecked.

CLEVELAND, May 10.—A Leader special from Akron, O., says: At 5½ this evening in the midst of a most terrific cloudburst this city was struck by the worst tornado which has ever been known hereabouts, excepting, perhaps, the Sharon cyclone of a month ago. 
