



A Valuable Forumla. Almost every person in Canada has tasted beer of some kind, but on the subject of brewing the great majority have ideas both vague and curious. In order to give a proper understanding to our subject, and at the per understanding to our subject, and at the risk of ruining the brewing trade, let us inform you how with no other uteusils than a teakettle, and and saucepan, a quartor two of ale may be brewed: Into your teak ottle cast a quart of malt and on it pour some hot water—not boiling, let it stand awhile, stirring occasionally. Then pour the liquor into a saucepan and add more water to the walt in the kettle, do this a third time, or until the malt is exhausted. Allow the liquor to cool and when a little below blood heat add a little yeast.
