



THE WATER SERVICE. has not been altogether successful under railway management. The C.P.R. and the D.A.R. however are two companies that have found it necessary to try and obviate the distinction and run a system covering rail and water carriage. In the present instance there is a good deal more than the operation of a railway from Yarmouth to Truro to be considered. The water routes more than equal the railway route and are essential to the proper running of the system and vital to the interests of Nova Scotia shippers. Even if we do not have reciprocity with the United States, a good trade is going on all the time, and with the possibility of the United States reducing its tariff is likely to increase. Than there is the problem of the Bay of Fundy service requiring a daily service for passengers, mail and freight with very close connections in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. No company no matter how wealthy it may be is going to put money into schemes that are simply expense and no profit. I think it is generally believed that the Dominion Atlantic Railway Steamship lines were not as profitable as they should have been, and that the company had to grin and bear it. The Canadian Pacific Railway Company are not likely to grin and bear it, if the steamship service or the railway (D.A.R.) itself cannot be made
