PUBLIC OWNERSHIP OF RAILROADS

Public or inion in the United States are advocating that measure in the lead ing magazines. The Arena, for August has an admirable paper, by Mr. C. Wood Davis, advocating the taking over of the lines, and setting forth the great public advantages that would result. The strongest point in favor of govern ment railway management, considered from an economic standpoint, is the enormous saving it would effect in the waste and loss now occasioned by working under the competitive system.

As Mr. Davis points out, under national ownership traffic would natu-

rally take the shortest route, and no;

as is frequently the case at present, be sent by a roundabout channel, because low rates are offered for the purp diverting traffic. He estimates that the nggregate saving from this cause would he some \$25,000,000 per year. great reduction in the staffs of officials made necessary by competition would result, and the need of keeping up be on their guard against the inferral line or line of the more consistent of the state of the property of the proper their special interests would find their occupation gone. According to the writer's estimate the legal expense of railroad companies amount in the ag gregate to some \$14,000,000, or about operating the roads. Free passes to politicians, judges, officials, editors and others, who are now bribed to use their influence in favor of monopoly by being allowed to travel free at the expense of the public, would be abolished, effecting another great saving. The large commissions paid brokers and others who can influence freight traffic cost the people ware twenty or twenty five millions annually, and this lead can only be effectually closed by gov-ernment ownership. A like figure is paid for keeping up general office presid ats, treasurers, secretaries and other officials who are absolutely us less so far as securing the practical working efficiency of the road is con cerned, their part of the business merely being to maintain its position as an instrument of speculation.

> Taking all these and other sources o eedless waste and expense involved by the competitive system, the write stimates that the American people would save \$160,000,000 per year on the cheapening and simplification of administration alone if the railroads

were managed by the government.
