THE CHURCH MISSIONARY SOCIETY AND THE INDIAN MUTINY .- The Committee of the Church Missionary Society have pronounced upon the religious aspect of the Indian question. The society commend the humiliation of Wednesday on the ground that the revolt is a Divine judgment, arising from this cause, that two generations of the teeming pupulation of India have been allowed to pass away withont being taught the truths of Christianity. The guilt of this, according to this document. is to be divided between the Government of British India and the Christian churches of G Brian. The committee urge their friends throughout the country to make the day of national humiliation one of special remembrance of past and present sins. 1.
