ARMY OFFICERS RESIGN WHEN TROOPS ARE RUSHED TO ULSTER

Montreal Civic Official Accused of Grafting—Inquest Into Woodbine Hotel Fire—Murderer of Toronto Man Found Guilty—Toronto Society Leader Dead

Troops Are Rushed Into Ulster War Outbreak is Hourly Feared Orange Forces Well Organized

Regular Soldiers Suddenly Moved to Strategic Points to Suppress Threatened Rising—Ulstermen Notified by Motor-Car Messengers to Be Ready at Instant Notice.

Asquith Ministers Announce Determination to Make Home Rule Effective by Force of Arms if Necessary—Cooler Men Among Ulster Unionists Hope to Avoid Clash.

DUBLIN, March 20.—It is said that as a result of instructions sent by the war office to the Curragh camp today that officers who objected to serving in Ulster must resign or be dismissed from the army, one hundred officers tendered their resignations.

LONDON, March 20.—"War in Ulster" is the startling headline which the sensational London newspapers are displaying in the blackest type. The government began today to dispose of its regular troops in Ireland so that they may be in a position to deal with any situation that arises. The cooler men among the loyalists and the Ulster Unionists, however, believe that nothing resembling war is yet in sight.

The army council some time ago considered the possibilities of home rule strife and instructed Lieut.-Gen. Sir Arthur Henry Pursey, who commands the Irish garrisons, to take all necessary precautions to maintain order and safeguard property. A general redistribution of the forces in Ireland therefore was begun today.

Moved to New Stations. Two regiments were sent from the north to reinforce the Ulster garrisons, while the troops in Ulster were moved to new stations in conformity with the custom that, in the event of hostilities or rioting, soldiers should not be compelled to encounter people with whom they had formed friendships. In accordance with the same rule some Irish recruits were sent from the Arma's recruiting station to England.

The possibility of a collision between the British soldiers and Ulster volunteers, resulting from the superheated political feeling, are recognized, but the leaders on both sides are trying to exert a pacific influence. John Redmond, the Nationalist leader in parliament, today telegraphed the Nationalists in Belfast an urgent appeal to abandon a parade arranged for Sunday in Londonderry, which it was thought would likely result in rioting.

Burns' Defiant Words. Four cabinet ministers spoke of the Ulster situation at different meetings tonight. John Burns, president of the local government board, in an address on the occasion of the unveiling of his portrait in the National Liberal Club, said:

"Home rule is a question mainly for Ireland itself. Three-fourths of the people there have demanded it persistently for years and we have no right to listen to the demand for more concessions or yield to clamor. We have no more desire to yield to lawless lawyers than to lawless laborers."

Thomas McKinnon Wood, secretary of state for Scotland, said: "We will carry home rule by agreement if we possibly can, but without it we must."

Risking Immediate Coercion. Alexander Balfour, chief secretary for Ireland in his speech, declared that the government's proposal gave Ulster freedom from coercion for six years and that the scheme of Andrew Bonar Law, the leader of the opposition in parliament, meant immediate coercion if referendum went against Ulster.

Sir John Alabrooke Simon, attorney-general, said the government proposed to go steadily on adding what ever happens we will see that law and order are unflinchingly observed in Ulster.

FEVERISH PREPARATIONS MADE; TENSION IN ULSTER IS GREAT

Sir Edward Carson, after being received at Belfast yesterday by Gen. Sir George Richardson, commander of Ulster forces, conferred privately with the Orange leaders. It is understood that he counseled a "passive resistance" policy for the present. British troops were reported last night moving along the Ulster border. The men were fully equipped for instant service. Despatch riders in motor cars returned to Belfast yesterday after arranging for prompt mobilization of Orange forces should the need arise.

HUNDRED OFFICERS AT CURRAGH REPORTED TO HAVE RESIGNED

War Office Admits Rumors Are Current and States That Appropriate Measures Will Be Taken—Asquith Ministers Called to Consider Situation in Ulster.

LONDON, March 20.—When inquiry was made at the war office tonight concerning the report that a hundred army officers in the Curragh camp had resigned rather than serve in Ulster, War Secretary Seely's secretary admitted that similar rumors had reached the war office and that appropriate measures would be taken to deal with the situation.

An Emergency Conference. A conference of ministers, urgently summoned, met at Col. Seely's residence tonight, and sat for over two hours discussing the situation in Ireland. Those present included Premier Asquith, Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, and members of the war office staff. Later Mr. Churchill summoned the first sea lord, Prince Louis of Battenburg, to the admiralty house at midnight for a further discussion.

The regiments involved at Curragh are cavalry regiments with famous records. Brig.-Gen. Count Gleichen, commander of the troops in Belfast, has been summoned to London to confer with the war officials. The number of troops now in Ireland is 24,000.

ULSTERMEN READY TO FIGHT BRITISH TROOPS RE-INFORCED

Belfast Astrir Following Confernces of Ulster Leaders and Sudden Shifting of Government Forces Thruout Ulster—Leaders Are Being Closely Guarded.

BELFAST, March 20.—The whole of today was crowded with surprises and suppressed excitement for the people of Belfast. The dramatic entry into Belfast of Sir Edward Carson, the Unionist leader in Ulster, fresh from his defiance of the government in the house of commons, his reception by Gen. Sir George Richardson, retired, commander of the Ulster volunteers and a picked body-guard and a conference which followed with the Ulster leaders, furnished the excitement. The complete shifting of the troops which was in progress thruout Ulster and the arrival of reinforcements from the south furnished the surprises.

Troops Fully Equipped. The Dorsetshire regiment, which had been stationed in Belfast for the past year was transferred to the Holywood Barracks, four miles distant. The men marched with full equipment, taking with them twelve carts loaded with rifle ammunition and also machine guns. It was expected that the Bedfordshire regiment from Mullingar, Westmeath, would take the place of the Dorsetshire in the Victoria Barracks during the night. While the Dorsetshire were passing Craigavon, County Down, the residence of Captain James Smith, one of the volunteer leaders and with whom Sir Edward Carson is staying the guards of the Ulster volunteer force turned out an detour at salute. Many of the Dorsetshire returned the salute.

Troops tonight were moving all along the Ulster border. Messages received from Enniskillen, Newry, Armagh and Omagh, said that detachments from various regiments from Dublin, Carragh and Mullingar were drafted in. Their expected arrival was made the occasion for enthusiastic demonstrations by the loyalists.

Motor cars with despatch riders went from Belfast Thursday to volunteer headquarters in all parts of Ulster returned today. It is believed they carried orders arranging for a quick mobilization of the Orange forces if this should become necessary.

WRONG BODY WAS SHIPPED AWAY FOR BURIAL

Cohan and Levinson Were Found in Ruins of Woodbine Hotel Yesterday and Body Thought to Be Cohan's Will Be Sent Back From New York.

Five bodies have now been removed from the ruins of the Woodbine hotel and only four have been identified. These are those of Cohan, Graham, Wilmet and Levinson. The body next taken out was not Cohan's, and its presence in the building cannot be explained. The mystery of the unknown body, the first one found, is difficult of solution. When first taken from the hotel it was positively identified as that of Max Cohan, New York, by his own brother, and was sent to New York for burial by the F. W. Matthews Company. Now it has been proven that was, all a mistake. Cohan's and Levinson's bodies were found yesterday afternoon by the fire department from that of the hotel. They presumably re-entered the building to rescue. Last night, Cohan's brother was wired to stop the funeral today and to ship the remains back to Toronto.

Cohan's body was positively identified yesterday by a gold tooth. Levinson was identified by a signet ring bearing his initials and by letters. There is no doubt of the identity of Graham and Wilmet, but who is the fifth victim? All guests and hotel employees have been accounted for, all missing persons by guests who escaped have been accounted for.

Not Graham's Friend. Next the theory was advanced that the dead man might have been a friend of Graham's, as he had worked in C.P.R. offices here and had friends in Toronto. A message late last night to Graham's employer and friend in London exploded this, however. Graham's only intimate friend here was his former fellow-employee, Flinder, who had intended to visit the Woodbine on Tuesday evening, but who is now in London and will be a pall-bearer at the funeral there today. In this connection light was thrown on the failure of Graham to make his escape.

On the second indictment the jury returned a verdict finding each of the accused guilty of aiding Kratchenko to escape. The maximum penalty on each indictment is seven years in the penitentiary. Each prisoner took the verdict coolly.

CAPITALIZATION OF RAILWAYS UNDER COMMISSION'S CONTROL

Long Fight of W. F. Maclean, M.P., Directed Toward Curbing Stock and Bond Issues, Ends in Victory—Railway Board's Powers to Be Much Enlarged.

Ottawa, March 20.—Many and important changes are to be made in the Railway Act in the review and enlargement of that act as introduced in the senate today. First of all, control is taken over the capitalization of railways. Less than four years ago W. F. Maclean of South York made a stand on this question. He could not get a second for his motion, but he got a lot of cheap ridicule. Instead, now the commission is given power over all stock and bond issues. The amalgamation of railways and the stock issues in connection therewith are also to be better controlled. Unnecessary duplication of railways is to be prevented. So are unnecessary encroachments into cities and towns. Municipalities are to be entitled to share in the cost of railway bridges and public roadways thereon. This is a radical improvement and was brought to the attention of Mr. Cochrane for the first time this session by the member for South York. Not only does the measure provide for more complete regulation of railway matters and for regulation by the railway commission, but also extends the act to a number of questions other than purely railway matters, including express business, telegraphs, telephones, power and electricity and traffic by water between ports in Canada when carried by railway companies. To prevent evasion, a clause is added to prevent evasion of the board's control over traffic, etc., where companies acquire control of and operate railways standing nominally in the name of non-Dominion companies. Provision is made for applying the act and the authority of the railway board to railways in insolvency or under mortgage or receivership. Formerly there was considerable difficulty over this question. The measure also gives the board power to submit questions of jurisdiction to the supreme court with a view to more speedy determination and to avoid expense to litigants. Provision is also made for more quickly dealing with appeals generally.

Stock and Bond Issues. One of the most important clauses of the act relating to stock and bonds. It is provided in the bill that hereafter the issue of stock, bonds and other securities by railway companies shall be subject to the control of the board. No stock, bond or other security shall be issued by any railway company unless the board has given its consent. The board may refuse to issue stock, bonds or other securities, or may issue them on such terms and conditions as it may think fit. The board is also empowered to require any railway company to give security for the payment of its debts. The act is being amended so as to give the board control over the sale, lease and amalgamation of railways, and the provision for lapse of right if construction is not started. Changes are also being made with respect to the regulations governing the location of railways and the cutting up of cities, towns and highways. It is now provided that the board, instead of the minister, shall pass upon location of railways. Wider powers are given to prevent unnecessary and injurious duplication of railways and railways' rights-of-way. The board may refuse permission to build a new railway where it will not be useful to the public or may compel different railways to run over one track of way by putting down extra tracks or setting running rights over existing tracks on the one right of way. It is expected that this will help to solve the problem of highway crossings in cities.

Construction of Industries. There is a new provision to enable the board to provide that industries, establishments or other works may be situated upon existing spurs or branch lines. The forbidding of removal of spurs without the consent of the board is extended to include the control of these matters more completely. The powers of the board are being extended to include the location of railways and the cutting up of cities, towns and highways. It is now provided that the board, instead of the minister, shall pass upon location of railways. South York Member's Suggestion Created Discussion of Federal District Plan in House—Hon. Sam Hughes' Alleged Willingness to Aid Ulster's Cause Touched on.

Ottawa, March 20.—The house spent all the day in committee of supply on estimates of the public works department. These included the initial appropriation for the big departmental block on Wellington street to cost \$2,000,000, and led Mr. W. F. Maclean of South York to inquire whether we should begin building expensive government offices until the capital of the country was definitely and permanently fixed by common consent at Ottawa. There were many objections, he said, to Ottawa as a capital, the climate being disagreeable in the summer and winter alike. 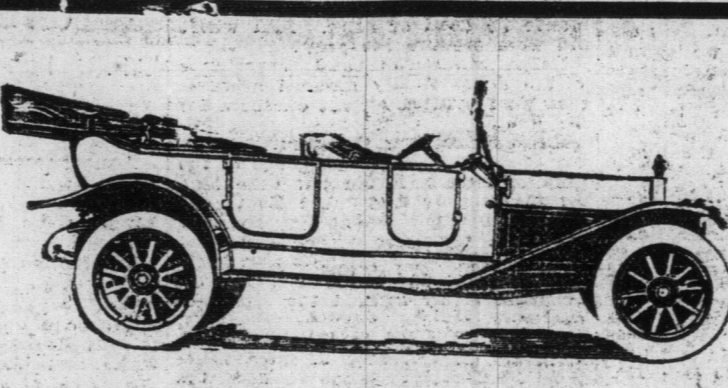

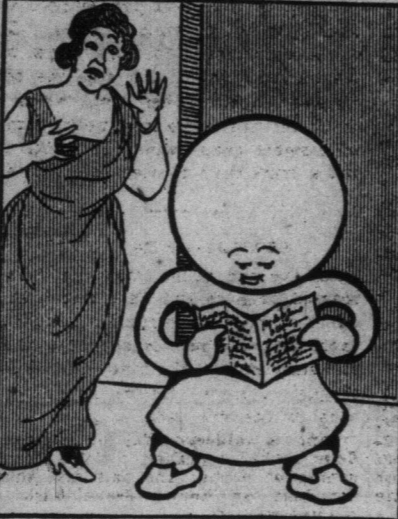

NO SETTLEMENT BY SHIPOWNERS

Transatlantic Shipping Companies Fail to Agree at Berlin.

BERLIN, March 20.—The conference of the trans-Atlantic shipping companies broke up today without reaching any settlement. The representatives of the British and continental steamship companies decided to adjourn until May 1, when it is understood they will meet again in Cologne.

ULSTER OUTLOOK BECOMES GRAVER

Predictions Made That Threatened War is Matter of Days.

COUP IS NOW EXPECTED

Government Said to Be About to Pour Troops into the Provinces.

LONDON, March 20.—With startling suddenness the outlook in Ulster has become one of great gravity, and predictions are freely made that the long-threatened "war" is now only a matter of days. A rumor was current last night that the British Government is preparing for the military occupation of the province.

The atmosphere in Ulster itself has grown suddenly electrical. Important developments are being reported at this moment and sinister rumors abound. Military strengthenings are reported indicating early signs and portents of a coup d'etat.

Unionists are convinced that the authorities are contemplating some coup. It is stated that the government has a comprehensive scheme for pouring extra troops into the province within twenty-four hours and for holding strategic points by an overwhelming force.

The acerbity of yesterday's debate in some of the commons was largely responsible for precipitating the situation which now undoubtedly exists. Unionist disappointment at failing to detain the government's parliamentary support was also a perceptible factor.

Nearly Three Hundred Thousand on Deposit by School Children.

TORONTO HEADS LIST

Congratulatory Speeches Made at Annual Meeting of the Institution.

President Hamilton Cassels of the Penny Bank congratulated the directors and friends of the institution upon the attendance at the annual dinner last night and upon the prosperity of the institution. Letters of regret were read from Sir John Gibson, President Falconer, Col. Wilkie, Hon. Mr. Crothers and Hon. Dr. Pyne.

The Toronto school pupils have now 71,000 deposits, the outside branches 40,000, and branches at allied institutions in the city total 118,000 depositors.

Since the Penny Bank was founded three million deposits had been made, and records showed 48,000 closed accounts. Very few of the accounts exceeded \$100, while very many were under \$1.

Dr. Colquhoun, deputy minister of education, stated that it was the intention of Hon. Dr. Pyne, in a few days, to issue a statement in favor of the establishment of branches in all the schools throughout the province.

Rev. Father Minehan said that the influence of the Penny Bank on the children was marvelous. He knew of a case where two children's savings had carried a family along when their father was ill. Another little boy and girl bought a coat at Christmas for their mother. He hoped to see the movement continue to grow.

Congratulatory addresses were also made by A. E. Donovan, M.L.A.; J. A. Hill, C. G. Fraser, Miss Mary E. Steinhilber, Miss C. Prattis, and Messrs. Eryce and Mott was much appreciated.

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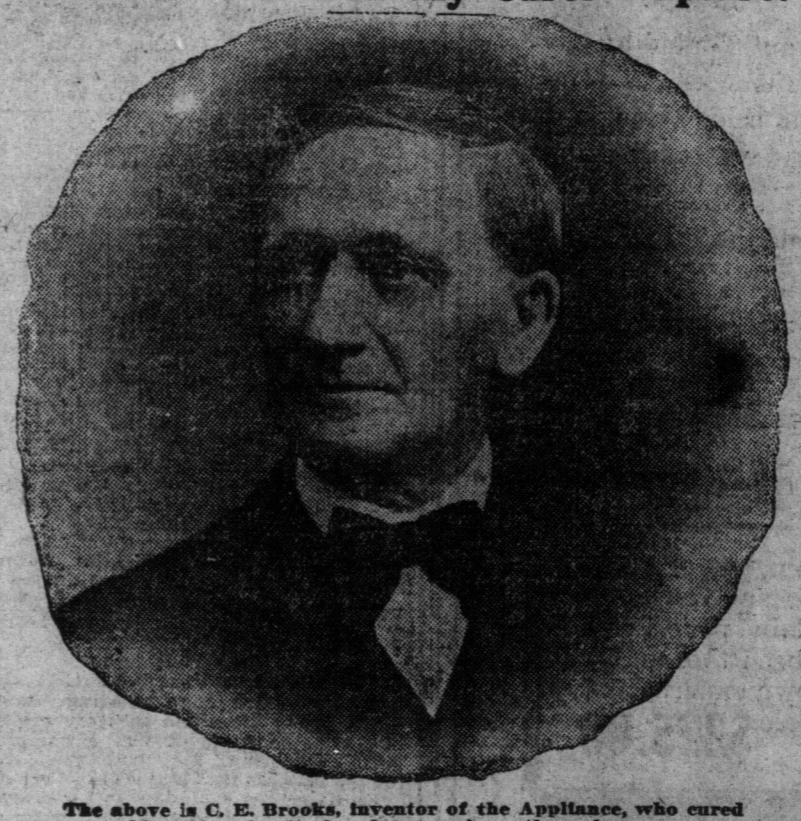
