

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PLAN OF THE SOCIETY.

1.—That the Society be under the direction of a President, six Vice Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary, and a

Committee of twenty-one members.

2.—That all Subscribers of ten shillings annually, or five pounds in one donation, shall be considered Members of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at the General Meetings, and to be elected Members of the Committee, and shall be also entitled to have one child continually in the School, and so in proportion for any larger sum.

3.—That all subscriptions be paid annually in advance, on the 1st November, and no member shall be entitled to any privilege during such time as his subscription is in arrear.

4.—All Clergymen of the Church of Rome, and Protestant Ministers of every denomination, shall be considered Honorary Members of the Society upon their signifying, in writing, to the Committee, their desire to become so, and shall be entitled to attend, but not to vote at the General

Meetings.

5.—That a General Meeting of the Members be held every year, at which meeting the proceedings of the Committee for the preceding year shall be read, and if approved, confirmed. That the funds and the state of the School be considered, and a report thereof, for the information of Subscribers, be approved and published, and such additional regulations and resolutions adopted as may be deemed necessary, and a President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary, and other Members of the Committee elected or re-elected; and that the Members of the Society be permitted to give orders for admission to any friends that may be desirous of attending.

6.—That special meetings of the Members be called at the request of the Committee, seven or more being present, or by any twelve Members of the Society, seven days notice

being given thereof.

7.—That no question be decided by bollot, unless demanded in writing and signed by at least ten Members at the General Meeting, (wherein the question shall arise) and that all Female and absent Members be entitled to vote by proxy at such ballot, which shall be taken seven days subsequent to such General Meeting.

8.—That the Committee meet on the third Monday in every calendar month, five whereof shall form a quorum.

9.—That the Committee may fill up any vacancy which may happen therein during the interval of the general yearly meeting, the members being proposed at one and elected at the subsequent monthly meeting.

10.—That any three members of the Committee may call a special meeting thereof, specifying, in writing, the business to be submitted thereto, and which the Secretary

shall insert in the summons.

11.—That no officer of the Society receiving a pecuniary remuneration shall be admitted as a member of the Committee.

12.—That the Committee shall appoint the Schoolmaster and all the inferior officers of the society, and form temporary regulations, which shall be in force until the next General Meeting, but no louger, unless then confirmed.

13.—That the general Reading Lessons be confined to the Holy Scriptures, without note or commentary, and that no other books except those chosen by the Committee for lessons in spelling and grammar, arithmetic and the first principles

of geometry, be introduced into the school-room.

14.—That the above resolution be particularly attended to, as it is to be observed that the fundamental principle of the system is, that nothing should be taught which can in any way tend to prevent conscientious and pious parents of any religious denomination from sending their children for instruction, and the spirit of this principle, it is hoped, will prevent visitors from endeavouring to bias any children within the walls of the school, in favour of any particular place of worship.

15.—That the Committee co-operate with the parents in devising the best means of securing the regular attendance of the children, on the Sabbath, at their respective places

of worship.

16.—That Femaic Subscribers of five shillings annually, or of £2 10s. in one denation, be considered Members of the Society; and that a Sub-Committee of Ladies—five of whom shall constitute a quorum—be annually appointed for the Girls' School, which shall be conducted according to the general principles of the Institution.

17.—That in the Girls' School the mornings be devoted

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to needlework, and the afternoons to reading, writing and arithmetic; but that on the whole of one day in the week, the Girls should be allowed to work exclusively for their own emolument; that the eldest girls and Monitors attend an extra hour to learn to cut out garments every day in the week; and that the Boys who have made a tolerable proficiency in reading, writing, and arithmetic, be allowed to form a class to receive lessons an extra hour, in such branches of Geometry as are necessary to Mechanical Trades, Land Surveying, &c.

18.—That the hours of the school be from 9 to 12, and from 2 to 5, the last hour from 4 to 5, being considered the extra hour, exclusively for the instruction of the senior

children.

19.-That the strictest attention be paid to the cleanliness of the children, by the Master and Mistress in their respective schools, inspecting them daily with peculiar scrutiny.

20.—That in the event of the funds being sufficient, articles of clothing shall be furnished to the poor children who have been attentive, orderly, and regular in their

attendance.

21.—That no children be admitted until they have completed their sixth year.

ANNUAL MEETING.

THE Annual Meeting of the Quebec British and Canadian School Society, was held at the School-house, in St. Roch's

Suburbs, on Tuesday, the 6th March, 1832,

D. SUTHERLAND, Esq. President, in the Chair, when, the Report of the Committee having been read by the Secretary, the following Resolutions were unanimously adopted:

1.—Moved by Mr. Lee, seconded by Mr. J. McLeod, That the Report be received and published under the direction of the Committee.

2.—Moved by Mr. Clapham, seconded by Mr. Stayner, That this Meeting continues cordially to approve of the Lancasterian System of mutual instruction; is desirous of acknowledging the uniform and generous support which has been afforded to the School by the Legislature; and views the progressive prosperity of this Institution as indicative of the increasing approbation of a liberal and enlightened Public.

3.—Moved by Mr. Tremain, seconded by Mr. Musson, That, in consequence of the formation of a Female School, it is necessary to amend the 16th and 17th Rules of the

Society, as follows, viz.:

That the 16th Rule be—"That Female Subscribers of five shillings annually, or of £2 10s. in one donation, be considered members of the Society; and that a Sub-Committee of Ladies—five of whom shall constitute a quorum—be annually appointed for the Girls' School, which shall be conducted according to the general principles of the Institution."

And that, in the 17th Rule, all the words as far as the word

" England," inclusive, be left out.

Also that the 19th Rule, having been found inapplicable to the circumstances of the poor, and not having been carried into effect for a series of years, be expunged; and that the 20th, 21st, and 22d, become respectively the 19th, 20th, and 21st.

4.—Moved by Mr. Morrell, seconded by Mr. Murray,

That the thanks of this Meeting be presented to His Excellency the Right Honorable Lord Aylmer, for his liberal Patronage during the past year, and for the encouragement which his Lordship has given to the Society by his renewed attendance at the late Public Examination of the School.

5.—Moved by Lieutenant Crawford, R.A., seconded by

Mr. Douglas.

That the thanks of this Society be given to the President, Vice Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary, and Committee, for their past services; and that the following Gentlemen be appointed to fill those Offices for the ensuing year:—(see list of Officers.)

6.-Moved by Captain I'gee, R. A. seconded by Mr.

Gauthier,

That this Meeting is gratified to hear of the success which has attended the formation of a Female School;

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ie success e School ; that the best acknowledgements of the Society are due to the Ladies' Committee, for their persevering exertions; and that the following Ladies be requested to compose the Sub-Committee, for the superintendence of the Girls' School during the following year.—(See list of Officers.)

REPORT

OF THE

BRITISH AND CANADIAN SCHOOL SOCIETY.

In presenting their Report for the preceding year, the Committee of the Quebec British and Canadian School are enabled to congratulate their friends on the encouraging and steady progress which has been made in every department of the affairs of the Institution.

Convinced themselves of the beneficial tendency of their exertions, they feel that it is superfluous at the present day, and that it would be insulting to the enlightened understanding of their constituents, to dwell at large upon the manifold advantages of Education. Neither do the Committee deem it necessary to enlarge upon the peculiar adaptation of the Lancasterian system to the population of a Province, in which, children, differing alike in origin, in language, and in religion, stand equally in need of the benefits which legislative and individual liberality combined have extended now for a series of years to the members of the rising generation.

The Committee, therefore, proceed at once to the details of those proceedings by which, under the superintending Providence of God, the institution has advanced to a condition of comparative prosperity which warrants their adoption of the language of congratulation.

The continued generosity of the Legislature has enabled them, in addition to the ordinary expenses of the School, to discharge the balance of £100, which was noticed by the last Committee as remaining due of the purchase money of the ground on which the School House stands; so that the funds are now relieved from the annual payment of interest to the amount of £6, and the Society is out of debt.

The monies at their disposal have also placed it in the power of the Committee to prepare the vacant half of the upper part of the building, with a covered staircase leading to it, for the formation of a Female School. It will be remembered that, at the last General Meeting of the Society, a Committee of ladies was appointed for the superintendence of this new and important department of the Institution; and the Committee feel that no encomiums of theirs would be commensurate with the promptitude and zeal with which the ladies entered on the duties which they had kindly consented to perform. The Girls' School was opened in the month of July last: the average daily attendance of the girls amounts to 50; and the number on the books to 80.

Of the Boys' School also, your Committee have the most encouraging report to make. It was the painful duty of their predecessors to state that a rapid diminution had taken place in the number of the scholars:—arising, however, it was satisfactory to know, from a cause which was cal-

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e the most il duty of ution had ing, howth was calculated rather to animate, than to discourage the friends of general instruction, viz: the simultaneous establishment by legislative aid, of three other Public Schools, situated more conveniently than this one for children residing in distant portions of the town. But a stimulus was thus afforded to education generally, which is operating favourably now in behalf of the British and Canadian School; and the Committee are enabled to announce that the total number of boys upon the books amounts to 196, being an increase of 111 over the number stated in the last Report, and that the present daily attendance is from 140 to 150.

The Public Examination which took place on the 22nd of last December, in the presence of His Excellency the Governor in Chief, the Patron of the Society, the Revd. Clergy of all the religious denominations in the place, and a numerous assemblage of ladies and gentlemen, will have exonerated the Committee from the necessity of adverting in detail to the 'progress of the pupils of either school in the several branches of tuition in which they were examined then. It will suffice to state that Lord Aylmer expressed himself highly gratified with the manifest improvement of the boys since the last Annual Examination; and that the girls—under the persevering personal exertions of the ladies, evinced a proficiency which was fully adequate to the brief period during which their school had been in operation.

Your Committee notice now with satisfaction the renewal by the Legislature of the important measure which had been adopted in the previous year, of providing the country by degrees with Teachers qualified to introduce the system of mutual instruction. The sudden formation of upwards of 1200S chools has created a demand for competent teachers, which it does not lie within the immediate power of the country to supply. Education will itself provide a remedy in the course of time. Meanwhile, however, the sum of £50 was appropriated to Mr. Morris, the master of the school, whose ability and assiduity in the fulfilment of his duties continue to deserve the highest praise, for qualifying ten persons to conduct schools according to the Lancasterian plan. The instruction of these ten persons was superintended by a standing Sub-Committee appointed for that purpose: they each of them underwent a public examination before receiving a certificate of qualification: and it will be received as a pleasing proof of the success and practical benefits of this proceeding, to state that eight of them are now actually engaged in the management of schools in various parts of the Province.

The Committee have the further satisfaction of reporting that the number of subscribers has been much augmented during the progress of the foregoing year. Additional pecuniary assistance has been obtained from many ladies in consequence of the formation of the Girls' School; and although this latter circumstance occasioned, at the same time, an additional expense, the Committee have every reason from past experience to believe that the funds of the Society will not be permitted to suffer any permanent deterioration by reason of so interesting an extension of the establishment as that which is comprised in the formation of a female School.

The total amount of private subscriptions and donations for the year 1831, is £90 11s. 5d. and presents an excess over the same branch of income for the preceding year of £64 3s. 1d. The other items of the income of the Institu-

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tion will be seen specified in the Treasurer's account, which is annexed to this Report. Application by petition has again been made for Parliamentary assistance; and the Committee cannot but persuade themselves that the Legislature will continue to appreciate the claims which are so justly founded on the merits of the school.

Your Committee now resign the office which has been entrusted to their care. It has been their humble, and their only, aim to ameliorate the condition of the poor around them, by striving to promote the interests of the junior branches of the Society; and believing such to be the lawful tendency of their exertions, they bring this brief account of their proceedings to a close, with the expression of an earnest hope that the labours of the new Committee may continue, under the sanction of Divine Providence, to be favoured with renewed success, and to enjoy the augmenting countenance of a generous and discerning Public.
