New Schedule - Substantial Increases.

Services Will Rejoice Over

OTTAWA, May 5 .- Substantial increases of certain officials in the customs and postoffice department are given notice of by Messrs Paterson and Lemieux. Mr. Lemieux gives notice that it is expedient to amend the Postoffice Act, by providing for increase of salaries of superintendents of city postoffices, until a maximum of \$2500 is reached. The present maximum is \$1800. Also to raise the minimum and maximum salaries of railway mail clerks to \$500 and \$1400 respectively. The seent minimum is \$400 and the maximum \$1400. 



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

Discussing the United States shoe machinery combine and its practice of supplying machines to shoe manufacturers on seventeen-year leases, and charging a royalty on every pair manufactured, The Globe states that the British manufacturer can buy outright machines as good as the American, for a price that equa's about one year's royalty. "But," it proceeds, "the machinery interests are secure in a 45 per cent. duty." If this description of

the situation is correct, the shoc manufacturers of the United States must be strangely indifferent to their own business interests. If one year's royalty will nearly pay outright for a British machine just as good as the American, evidently two years' royalty would pay outright for one plus the 45 per cent. duty. choice will most likely fall in

Calgary: Geographically considered, Calgary stands in the advantage over other points. These shops will doubtless, for years to come, do the work of the mountain division, the heaviest work t the system. If a mountain engine equires repairs, it would be quite a ask to haul it past Calgary two hundred miles.

Moreover, Calgary taps the Crow's Nest division directly, and is on the cross roads of the system. The Calgary shops could serve, with greater convenience, lines running east, west,

north and south.

A railway strives to keep its main line clear. It doesn't want to haul crippled engines over it. On this aclines running eastward from Wetaskiwin and Lacombe. Engines from any point on those lines, in order to reach Medicine Hat, for instance, would have to first reach either Calgary or Moose Jaw, and then travel over the main line. Calgary shops would avoid this and serve all those east and west branches.
