DID CANADA GET A DEAL?

British Columbia Member Charges U. S. With "Gross Breach of International Honor."

OTTAWA, May 5.—(Special)—J. D. Taylor (New Westminster), in the course of a day discussed the fisheries treaty with the United States. He said the congressional records at Washington showed that so far from the size of the meshes of the nets being the limit of the proposed alterations, as the Hon. Mr. Brodeur had stated to parliament, the American senators had made the most drastic alterations in the regulations. Indeed the fate of the treaty was problematical.

Mr. Taylor declared that the minister was being played with by the other parties to the agreement. There had been a breach of international honor. There had been a gross breach of the written pledge of honor in striking out clauses of the agreement. One of the most valuable considerations Canada had received was the agreement to regulate fishing on Pike Sound, where Canadian salmon were being wantonly destroyed with traps without any regulations whatsoever.

Brodeur's Explanation. Hon. J. P. Brodeur explained that the delay in bringing the regulations into effect was due to the fact that in the United States the treaty making power was vested in the senate, which had not yet seen fit to pass upon them.

LOS ANGELES, Cal. May 5.—John J. McNamara, secretary and treasurer of the International Bridge and Structural Iron Workers' Association and his brother, James B. McNamara, were arraigned late to-day before Superior Judge Borjwell on nineteen indictments, charging murder in causing a dynamite explosion in the Los Angeles Times building, and the consequent death of 21 men.

DENIES THAT ALIEN LABOR IS BEING USED

No Truth in Union's Charges, Says Manager of Hamilton Bridge Works.

HAMILTON, May 5.—(Special.)—The charge of bringing in alien labor to take the places of the striking structural ironworkers is emphatically denied by R. M. Roy, manager of the Hamilton Bridge Works, in a statement to The Toronto World to-night.

The striking carpenters deny that any of their number have gone back to work at less than 40 cents an hour, the scale demanded. More than 25 contractors have signed up, and the men state that they are well satisfied with the progress of the strike.

The Trades and Labor Council met to-night and decided not to appoint delegates to the provincial federation until expressions of opinion are received from the locals.

Glendid Report from Finance Committee — Good Results at Orphanage.

The sessions of the Supreme Court the Independent Order of Foresters held yesterday noon. The morning session was devoted to the consideration of the report of the inspection committee, who investigate the various settlements of the order and the consideration of the report of the finance committee. During the discussion of the report of the finance committee it was pointed out that when the capital of the Union Trust Company had been reduced from \$2,500,000 to \$1,000,000 returned to the order, that the personal attention of the chief ranger, in addition to the work of 5 per cent. per annum interest earned, the order had made a net profit of \$300,000.

The work in connection with the orphan and fatherless children of the order is being carried on by a committee among the members of the Independent Order of Foresters, and the report of the finance committee recommending that the contribution to the fund be 2c per month instead of 1c was carried unanimously. The work of caring for the orphan and fatherless children is naturally of a philanthropic character.

Work of Orphans' Home. The Home for Orphans, which is located in Oakville, about twenty miles from Toronto, took tangible form in 1905, and in November of that year opened. Its international character has become evident, for the first child to arrive was a little girl, and she was followed by fatherless little ones from Peru, Panama. While the originator of the idea, the late Dr. Oroniyatekha,

contemplated a home for those who were left absolutely friendless, yet a wider view of this noble philanthropy was seized by the present supreme chief ranger, Elliot G. Stevenson, who learned of many children of deceased Foresters, whose condition was quite as hopeless as if they had been left absolutely orphans. Widows were left in a distressing state of poverty, and were face and face with forced separation from their dear ones by sending them to public institutions or distributing them in the neighborhood. The result was that instructions were finally issued that in cases where a high standing committee found that a widow of one of the members was engaged in a hard hand struggle to keep her family together, to feed, clothe and educate them, a money grant, varying, of course, according to the conditions found, should be made thru the recording secretary of the local court.

575 Children Protected. Under this arrangement 575 homes, each essential and valuable in its sphere, have been held together and protected, while 325 children, drawn from the most destitute and needy, as well as all parts of United States and Canada, are being cared for by the society. Over 50 more have been benefited indirectly because, thru this relief, the mother has been able to re-marry happily. So that in all over 575 children, in their first years have been protected by the ministrations of the society, at that period in their lives when care and discretion are most needed.

Assumes Parental Duties. In these days when sociological problems are being discussed and publicists are pointing to the tendency towards race suicide, it is remarkable and commendatory that a large fraternal brotherhood like the I. O. F. should assume by its own act the parental responsibilities and become the provider and mainstay of the home. What this means mentally, morally and physically to the younger generation, and what it will mean to Canada when these, whom fate has cast upon our bounty, become citizens of the Dominion, cannot be overestimated. It has often meant, as those associated in the work well know, the difference between hunger and plenty, between sickness and protection, between exposure and shelter. Often indeed the negative situation would have resulted vice, and consequent cost many times in excess of the philanthropy to the country.

A "Happiness Fund." The organization of the society is so maintained that these wards are in constant touch with the head office, and frequently the little ones address the kindly hearted superintendent as "your affectionate boy" or "your loving child." These evidences of appreciation are not wasted upon the big hearts at the head of the order. Not the least significant feature in the work of the Orphan's Happiness Fund—a trust fund made up entirely of voluntary contributions from high courts, subordinate courts and private members, which is so disbursed that a Christmas present and a birthday gift go regularly to each child, as well as prizes to the most successful at school. The system is so followed that the child who has been bereft of his natural parents finds in the 540,000 odd members of the society foster parents whose sympathies are touched and whose purses are opened. Who knows that time has not in her keeping the day when these little ones will not of their foster parents "rise up and call them blessed."

POWER FOR MONTREAL

New Company Wants to Develop From the Ottawa River. MONTREAL, May 5.—The incorporation of the National Hydro-Electric Company with a capital of \$1,000,000, makes one more electrical company which will seek a market in Montreal.

Henry Miles is the president of the new corporation, and Mr. Louis Gosselin the secretary. The Carillon Falls on the Ottawa River, 35 miles from Montreal, will be the source of the power. This point is a strategic one in the rush for power development, was noticed in the report of the surveyors for the Georgian Bay Canal, who considered that 148,000 horsepower could be developed, of great value, owing to its proximity to Montreal.

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Eight Workers on Hospital Wing to Get Their Increase. The striking iron workers gained one point yesterday when "Gill" Goddard signed a contract to pay the men he expects to employ on the new surgical wing of the hospital a minimum of 40c an hour for the year. This will affect only about eight men, however. Otherwise there is no change.

A sub-committee was appointed by the executive committee to confer with the bricklayers and ask them not to work on the iron parts of buildings. Some of them have been reported as doing this in order to expedite their own work.

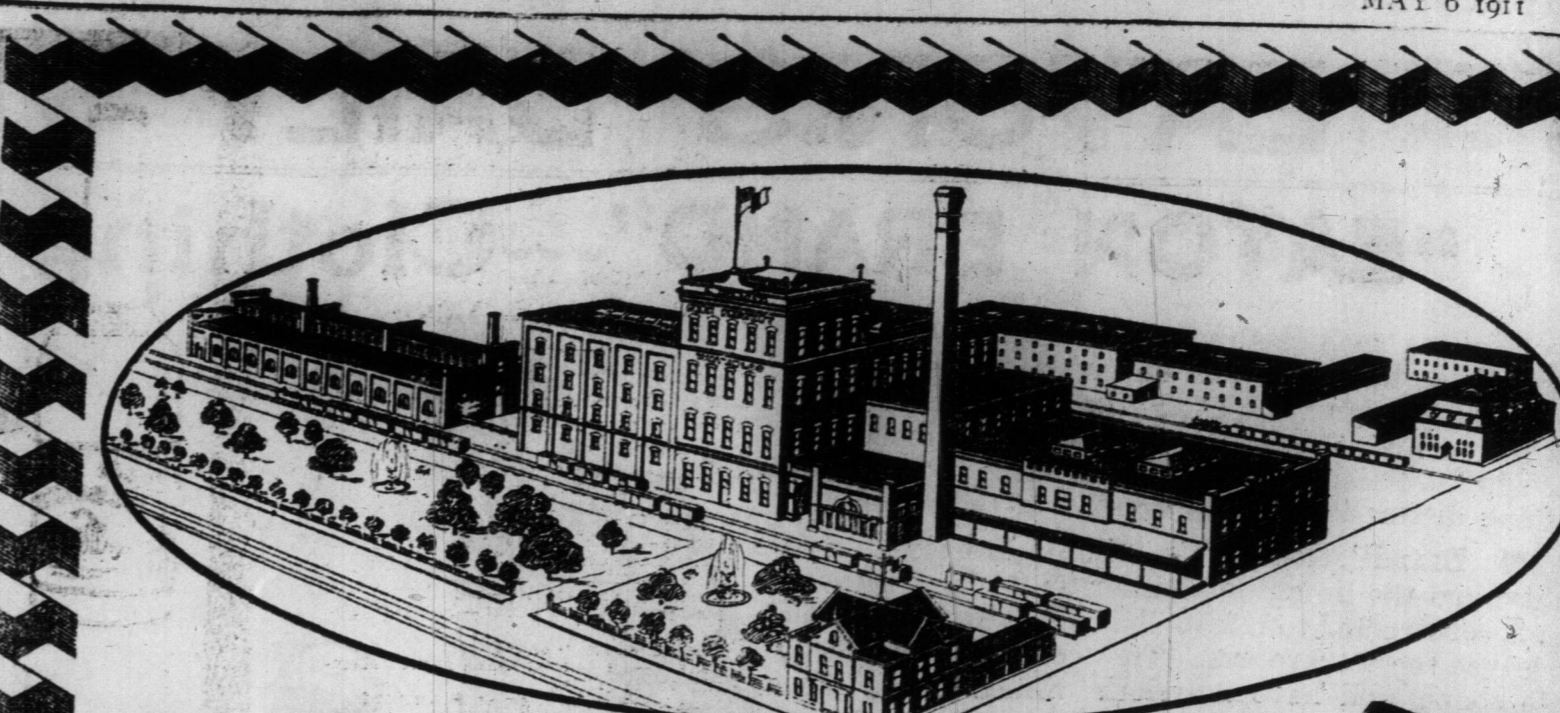

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WHY CALGARY WILL GET WESTERN C.P.R. SHOPS

Strong Reasons Advanced in Favor of Location of Such Plant in Albertan Metropolis.

CALGARY, May 5.—(Special.)—The impression generally prevails that, as between Medicine Hat and Calgary, as the site for the new C.P.R. western car shops, the former must be out of the running.

Geographically considered, Calgary stands in the advantage over other points. These shops will doubtless, for years to come, do the work of the mountain division, the heaviest work of the system. If a mountain engine requires repairs, it will be quite a task to haul it past Calgary two hundred miles.

Calgary has an electrical capacity of some 20,000 horse-power. Medicine Hat has none. A great company also proposes to bring gas to Calgary.

self to resume power and it must give evidence to the people that it is ready to assume to discharge with dignity, with honor and with ability the responsibilities which soon will be placed upon it.

"Let me say that one great principle and policy should be ever in mind. The west and the east of Canada must not be separated by any apparent divergence of interest or by unfortunate differences of sentiment. Let us not fail to recognize the beneficent west of Canada must have more and more influence and a greater voice in parliament and in the cabinet than has a hitherto been the case. Strong as is the Conservative party in the house of commons at the present time, it must call to its council other strong men from the west and require them on no distant day to enter the federal arena.

The Effect in Quebec.

"The issue forced upon the country by the mischievous trade compact at Washington will arouse again the enthusiasm and determination of Quebec Conservatives and assure once more adequate representation of our party from that province. We expect also in the next parliament of Canada a worthy representation of those who for many years past have been associated with the Liberal party in this country, but who only recently have become members of the Conservative party."

Mr. Borden declared his government and the Province of British Columbia opposed reciprocity. He said that such an agreement must draw the Empire closer together, and the only result of that could be that the Empire and Canada would be drawn further away from one another.

Mr. Borden announced that Mr. Borden would make a western tour this summer.

Mr. Hazen said that reciprocity struck no answering chord in New Brunswick. He urged Mr. McBride and Mr. Rogers to stand for federal competition at the next general election as lieutenants to Mr. Borden.

Feverish Trading in Mining Market--Vipond Up 11 Points

Mining Market Boiling Over Sharp Gains Throught the List

Trading in Porcupine Issues Feels Days of Cobalt Boom—Silver Mining Shares in Better Demand.

World Office, Friday Evening, May 5.

The mining market gave a further demonstration of its possibilities today, the trading being exceptionally active, and the list more prolific of price changes than for some days. The cheaper Porcupines came in for more prominence than for some time, and advances were the general rule for the session.

The market was fairly boiling at the opening, and the strenuous trading was continued throughout, the sales in the Standard exchange amounting to over 200,000 shares for the day, which probably makes a new record for activity.

The feature of the gold stocks was Vipond, which since the close of its old-time buoyancy, the shares opening above yesterday's price and selling up to 65, or 11 points over the previous close. As usual on such a day, a profit-taking movement followed, and a portion of the appreciation was lost, the stock closing at 61.

Vipond has been one of the prime favorites among the brokerage fraternity, and as the property has reached a better stage of development than any of the other cheaper stocks, an advance had been looked for, and consequently came as no great surprise.

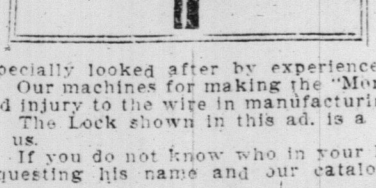

CHICAGO, May 5.—Signs of rain over the dry, belt northwest helped to turn wheat prices downward today. The close was irregular, varying from 3/8c under last night to 3/4c above. Corn finished 3/4c to 1/2c off, oats without change, and hog products 7/8c lower to 5c advance.

The idea that a drought was at hand came thru the despatches from various points in South Dakota. These telegrams mentioned the water towers and indicated a supply of moisture soon. At the same time, millers' advice told of an improvement during April in the spring winter crop sales. The Ohio officials made the condition there 87 per cent. about a month ago and 85 per cent. ago. Ailday purchases were on foot for spring wheat, but no contracts were available for delivery on May contracts. For example, a round amount of this kind was said to have been brought to be shipped to Chicago from Toledo. Some of the larger long grain lots sold at \$18 to \$20 for bushels, and there was a decided reaction from earlier higher prices, which had been due to the dry weather in the northwest. An easy tone prevailed at the close. The day's range for July wheat from \$1.25 to \$1.30, with last sales at the first-named level, a net loss of 3/4c to 1/2c.

With planting conditions fine, and the trade expecting liberal receipts in the near future, a market setback when wheat slipped down. During the first part of the session shorts were forced to cover on an advance based somewhat on the mistaken notion that eastern call was good. July fluctuated between 62c and 64c, closing easy at the last named figure, a net gain of a shade. Cash grades were firm.

Excellent weather for the growing crop had a bearish effect on the market for oats. High 1/2c to 3/4c, with the July option 1/2c to 3/4c, with last sales at 2 1/2c, just the same as last night.

Hay and alfalfa provisions, owing to the fact that packers were on the selling side. In the end pork was 3/4c lower, but the market for articles either unchanged or over averaging 2 1/2c to 3c decline.

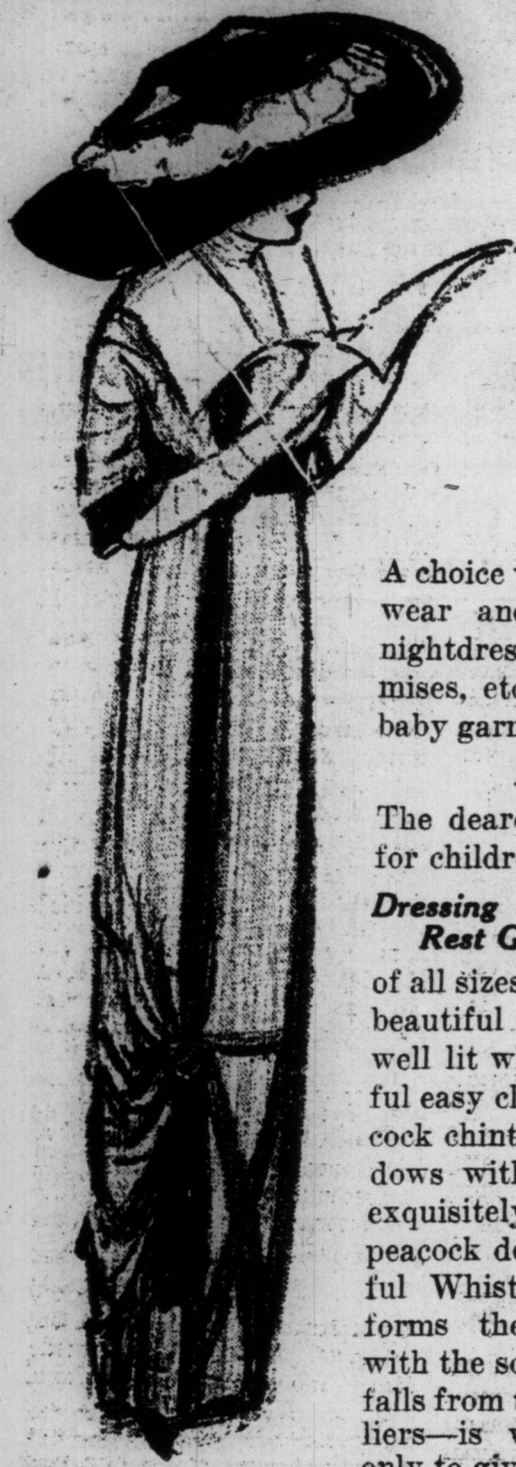
