JAPS MARCH ON YONGE

First Army Erecting Strong Fortifications Six Miles Below Litchfield.

London, May 13.—The advance guard of the first Japanese army has appeared six miles below Litchfield, on the road to Liowang. It is not making any further advance, but is erecting strong fortifications. The Japanese movements were made with the greatest care.

A persistent report is current here that a Russian squadron of cavalry succeeded in getting behind the Japanese, who were several squadrons strong, and in occupying Kuandian. The unexpected appearance of the Russians caused the Japanese to immediately evacuate the town and retire toward the Yalu. The report is believed to be correct.

Prof. Karavich, who has arrived here on a train from Port Arthur, claims that he saw near Polandien, one of the railway patrol, cut into quarters. In a skirmish near Polandien, one of the patrol was wounded. On the Japanese approaching the soldier feigned death and a Japanese officer passing shot him in the mouth.

Col. Zhen, who has returned from a reconnaissance of the district near the River Taisi was attacked May 9 by Chinese bandits. He and his men were killed by the bandits, who were driven off.

WHERE JAPS ARE.

London, May 14.—The Morning Post's Shanghai correspondent says: "The Japanese first army has occupied Aliyang."

"Victory Alexieff has sent a note to the Tartar general of Manchuria, complaining that the Chinese villagers refused to sell supplies to Russian troops and demanding that the general issue a proclamation ordering the natives to supply foodstuffs."

"Some of the Chinese viceroys are anxious for war with Russia."

Gen. Kuratkin's boldness in pushing on is commented on here as showing that he believes Gen. Kuropatkin's forces are much weaker than they are represented.

The partial destruction of Dalny is regarded as showing that the Russians anticipate the Japanese will make a determined attempt to capture Port Arthur, while, owing to the moral effect of the fall of the stronghold, the Japanese are on their guard, and an equally determined resistance will be made.

KUROPATKIN SEES THEM.

St. Petersburg, May 13.—From a dispatch received by the Czar from Gen. Kuropatkin, it is evident the Japanese advance towards Liowang has now begun in earnest. At dawn on May 11 the Japanese moved out of Pengwangcheng by the Liowang road and proceeded to drive the Russians out of the villages held by them in that neighborhood. The Cossacks sustained some loss.

On May 10 Japanese infantry detachments about 10,000 strong, with fifty to eighty guns, advanced towards Liowang, an important town about twenty miles due west of Pengwangcheng. In this movement they were supported by the remainder of the division, who are evidently designed to form the left wing of the Japanese united army of invasion. The effect of the combined operations will be the turning on the south of the chain of mountains behind which Gen. Kuropatkin is massing the Russian troops.

A private telegram also announces that a Japanese force has been landed near Newchwang and was within twelve miles of that town. The Russians have now only two regiments in Newchwang, the remainder of the division having been withdrawn to Mukden. In their retreat the Russians are burning the railroad stations and other foodstuffs as they are unable to take them with.

COFFEE TO DYE EGGS.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, May 13.—British egg dealers are greatly interested in Lord Onslow's advice to use coffee to dye home eggs to compete with the tinted article from abroad. Colored eggs run a shilling higher per 100. The majority of colored eggs come from France, but Canada is her keenest rival.

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FIREBUG BY PORT ARTHUR.

Port Arthur, May 13.—(Special.)—A firebug at work in town. Late last night several fires have occurred, which have led to the belief that some person is engaged in the nefarious work of setting fire to buildings. Yesterday suspicion was turned to certainty by the discovery of a blaze, which occurred at Dalton's warehouse. Oil had been poured in an opening around the door from the outside and a match applied. The miscreant had barely done his work and escaped when the fire was discovered.

Last night an attempt was made to burn Victoria Rink, but the fire was put out in time to avoid any considerable loss. On investigation a pile of chips covered with oil was found in the building ready to be set on fire.

SHINGLE MILL BURNED.

Uthoff, May 13.—The lumber, stove and shingle mill belonging to G. H. Smith at this place was burned down early this morning. It is a complete loss of \$3000. No insurance.

SIDE-STEPS THE PROPOSITION.

Solicitor for M.C.R. Sees Popularity of Two-Cent Rate.

Ottawa, May 13.—(Special.)—The two-cent-a-mile clause that Mr. Maclean proposed to insert in the Michigan Central bill before the railway committee received such approval yesterday that it was believed that it would be adopted. The clause would provide for a rate of two cents per mile for the first five miles, and one cent for the remainder of the journey.

PHONES IN JAPAN.

Japanese Consul at Ottawa Says State Owns Them.

Ottawa, May 13.—(Special.)—The Japanese consul at Ottawa was in the gallery this afternoon when Mr. Maclean had up the telephone question, and was an interested listener. Later on he told the World that the state owned and controlled the telephones in Japan, where they only cost \$12 a year, and controlled the telegraph lines, which carried third-class passengers for a quarter of a cent a mile and first-class for a cent. Japan is also reported to have a system of public telephones, which are owned and controlled by the state.

GENERAL TRAFFIC TERMINALS BETWEEN YORK AND YONGE

G.T.R. Postpones Expropriation Proceedings Pending Possible Plans for New Union Station.

A special despatch from Ottawa to the World last night says: It is announced here that the Grand Trunk have agreed to postpone their application for the expropriation of the City of Toronto's land north of the Esplanade between Yonge and York streets. This gives the proposal for a new union station at the foot of Bay-street in increased strength. It is believed here that the C. P. R. and G. T. R. authorities in Montreal are now arranging for joint action in this regard. A great deal will depend on the city and on the Ottawa government. There will have to be four parties to a treaty—the city, the Ottawa government, who own the custom house and the examining warehouse, and the two railways. The treaty will have to make provision for the construction of the Yonge-street bridge, the settlement of the costs of the new bridge, the location of a new station and its plan and the location of a government railway postoffice and pneumatic plant for the distribution of postal matter in Toronto. It may mean also the removal of the custom house and examining warehouse, and the present old station at the foot of York-street. But it is likely that Sir William Mullock and the minister of customs will be ready to do anything on a project that must tend to advance the interests of all concerned, and especially the public.

What Mr. McNeill Says.

The World's Montreal correspondent wired: It goes without saying that the plan to go into supply, when it is a new station should be followed with interest here, especially in railway circles. D. A. McNeill, vice-president and general manager of the Grand Trunk, who was seen to-day, had a map of the district before him when seen by the city editor, and his statements were not too definite. He said he was quite likely that notice of intention to build a new station had been given, as the parties expressed their intention to build.

Will Move at First Opportunity to Have Railway Act Amended to Provide for Public Ownership.

Ottawa, May 13.—(Staff Special.)—It will not be the fault of the member for East York if the house of commons is not placed squarely on record before long on the subject of public ownership of telegraphs and telephone lines. In a brief, but pointed, speech in the house this afternoon, Mr. Maclean gave notice that he would move the question to an issue at the next opportunity. That will occur on Monday, when it is expected to be open to the government or anyone else to sidetrack the subject by moving an amendment.

C.P.R. Expropriation Granted.

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NEWS FROM PORT ARTHUR SHOWS JAPS BEHIND IT

Russian Archibald Forbes Escapes From the Fortress on the Last Train.

Liaoyang, May 13.—Nemirovich Danchenko, popularly known as the "Russian Archibald Forbes" who is now in the service of the Associated Press, has just arrived here from Port Arthur, and furnishes the following chronicle of the events of the first week of the investment of that fortress. Danchenko escaped from the beleaguered city by the last train:

"From Thursday, May 8, the powerful fleet of the enemy's cruisers, the Aduma, Asama, Idzumi, Iyama and another, the name of which is unknown, together with the flagship Mikasa and the battleships Shikishima, Matsushima, Asahi, and the Fuji remained constantly in sight at Port Arthur, performing every night and morning at daylight. The Japanese torpedoes occasionally swept our coast with searchlights at night, when barges lay in waiting on Pigeon Bay, beyond our vision on the western horizon, and beneath this lurid light that sent the Liaotung Gulf apparently into flames, we were watching to see if we intended to interfere with their landing parties. The following day the telegraph office in Liaoyang refused to accept our messages.

Japs Locked Them Over. "Japanese cavalry reconnoitred the peninsula and were safely imprisoned. But this fact did not cause any particular alarm, and sent back to me a beautiful band was playing on the boulevard, and there were many people unconcernedly promenading the streets. We heard that the Japanese had fired on the last out-going train carrying the Russian sick and wounded, and a second stage of Sebastopol, the passengers. 

NEED ONLY A MAJORITY. Ottawa, May 13.—(Special.)—Altho for a while it seemed that it would require a two-third vote of the city council to give the Bell Company its franchise, it now appears that a simple majority vote will be sufficient. It is likely, therefore, that the company will be voted its two years' franchise when the council meets next Monday night.

There is a humorous touch in the rumor which is current tonight in the city circles, in connection with the Bell Company's struggle for a renewal of its telephone franchise. It is said that a position was offered to the brother of one of the aldermen, but when the candidate looked into the offer the position was so petty that he declined it with disdain. When expert estimates of the cost of civic lighting were published here the Ottawa electric interests declared them to be absurd. At that time the tender of the Ottawa Company was in for \$37 per light. The estimate for civic lighting was \$40 to \$42 per light. But the company's book-keeping of this figure as absurd must have been the sheerest bluff, for it is said that once again to scale down the figure and to offer a position was offered to the brother of one of the aldermen, but when the candidate looked into the offer the position was so petty that he declined it with disdain.

The debenture was taken in reality to cover an investment by the Elgin, thru the Atlas, in Dominion Coal shares, the transaction being to evade the master's statutory limitation of the borrowing power of the Elgin.

MISS BOOTH GOES EAST. Commissioner Eva Booth of the Salvation Army left last night on a tour in the east. She will give her address on "The Two Levels" in Windsor, Mass. Montreal, to-morrow night. She was accompanied by several of the Knights of the Cross, who will provide special music. She will return on Tuesday.

Chancellor at a Loss. London, May 13.—In yesterday's parliamentary papers appeared a question which Mr. Morrell had addressed to the chancellor of the exchequer. Could he state, approximately, asked Mr. Morrell, the amount of indirect taxation carried by a glass of light beer and a half-pint of moderate strength? "I fear it is impossible," replied Austen Chamberlain. To give an accurate reply to this question, the answer must depend on the lightness of the beer and the strength of the tea."

WESTERN CROP REPORT. Monetary Times: If the news about much winter-killing of fall wheat in southwestern Ontario be somewhat dampening to the spirits, nothing of the kind characterizes the news from Manitoba and the Northwest. Our telegram of yesterday noon from Winnipeg states that reports obtained from 125 different points thruout the western prairie country indicate that the increased area under crop will be 12 per cent. None report any falling off, increases being from same as last year to 200 per cent. greater. Seeding is practically completed and the weather considered most favorable. In several districts it is already well sprouted and beginning to show above ground. "A conservative estimate places total acreage in whole Northwest under crop at something over four million acres, probably 4,200,000 acres." Call at 10 King St. East. INSURANCE LOSSES TO DATE.

Must Settle for \$3,105,568.90 Out of \$3,081,206.37 Values. The total amount of insurance losses reported adjusted at the close of yesterday's sitting of the general committee was \$3,681,206.37, based on the "sound" value of the stock and buildings, of which the insurance companies will be called upon to pay \$3,105,568.90. The figures up to Thursday totalled \$3,251,881.22, and \$2,835,974.60, respectively, so that the results of the appraisements handed in yesterday were \$329,325.17 additional valuation of property and stock damaged, and \$272,892.30 in insurance losses. The claims handled were Hoberlin Bros., Debenham-Caldwell, F. D. Dods & Co., Rolph Smith & Co., Caulfield & Burns and Alcock, Light & Westwood. Probably the largest individual loss was that of Rolph Smith & Co., amounting to \$84,000.

NOT OBSERVED. Engineer Rust reported yesterday to the board of control that the street railway did not observe the new timetable which was supposedly in force between April 25-29. On only two out of 105 divisions was the service as required and the Queen, King, Broadview, Dundas and Bloor and Metcalfe cars did not change their routes as ordered. Nothing has yet been done to take daily action against the company.

Praise for Perth. Perth Examiner: A commercial traveler who made his first visit to Perth last Monday was very pronounced in his views on the town.
