RUMOURED SPLIT IN THE CANADIAN CABINET.

MONTREAL, April 21.—In the House of Assembly, last night, the Canada Assessment Bill was under discussion in Committee. The debate lasted the whole evening. Being a ministerial measure, it was expected that it would pass with little delay, but the anticipations of the ministry were not realized, as it encountered the most strenuous opposition. So great was the tunult, no less than five or six of the ministry were off and on their feet at the same time. Mr. Broughton moved that the committee do rise and report progress, as the proceedings had been conducted amidst squallings and confusion, such as would disgrace any barroom. It was conceded last night that Mr. Baldwin resigned his seat in the cabinet. It is also understood that Mr. Lafontaine would do the same.
