MORE SIGNS OF ATTACK ON EGYPT

Italian Military Men Think Such Is Intended

THE TURKS AND GERMANS Rushing Construction of Double Track Railroad to the Egyptian Border From Damascus—Papers of Rome Sound Warning

Rome, Dec. 16.—The Turko-German threat against Egypt is becoming more grave daily, in the belief of military men here.

The construction of the railway line from Damascus to the Egyptian frontier, it is said, has been pushed with extraordinary speed, and it is expected to be finished by the first of February, there being only fifty miles more of track to lay before the Sinai peninsula is reached.

There are reports that the British government is considering the elevation of Sir John French to a viscountcy of the United Kingdom and that the government, in recommending him for the post of field marshal in command of the home forces, has given only a strong recommendation to the king."

Left in Balkans Till After Greek Elections

Allies Have Made Masterly Retirement From Serbia—New British Chieftain Has Seen More Hard Fighting Than Any Other

London, Dec. 16.—On the Macedonian front there has set in a full which will inform observers at Athens believe will extend over the Greek elections of Sunday. The retirement of the Anglo-French forces has ended and they now occupy strong positions north of Saloniki, where this far, their opponents have made no effort to disturb them.

The German forces probably would need some time to prepare for any assault on these positions, particularly as light artillery and mountain guns would not suffice. There would be need of heavier guns, few of which if any, seem to have yet arrived near the front.

The Entente capital view with satisfaction what is regarded as the masterly manner in which the retreat was conducted, and the comparatively small loss of the allies. It is believed much of the credit for this achievement is due to the new re-ordination, among the allies, of which the recent joint councils of war in France were only one manifestation.

In London, the retirement of Field Marshal Sir John French from command of the British forces in France, temporarily overshadowed other war news. The new commander-in-chief, Sir Douglas Haig, who is almost the youngest general in the British army, enters upon his duties with a high reputation. He has seen more hard fighting than any other general in the British army.

P. E. ISLAND MAN OFFICER OF "CARIA" SUNK BY GERMANS

Wm. McEwen Writes Interesting Details of Attack by Submarine Off Crete in Mediterranean

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Dec. 16.—Horace McEwen, superintendent of the P. E. I. Railway, has letters from his son, William, first officer of the 4000 ton steamer "Caria" of the Cunard line, which was sunk by the Germans in the Mediterranean on November 6.

"On the lovely afternoon of November 6," he wrote, "when about 100 miles from Crete, our peace was disturbed by the dim bursting of shells about us. One of these underwater devils had come up on our quarter and did this to make us aware of it."

"Just before this the Hun had been chasing a large cargo boat, the 'Clea McAllister'. Having made sure of her, she slipped over to the 'Caria'. Our skipper saw that escape was hopeless. The sub had a good speed (about 17 knots) and we had no gun to protect us, so the ship was stopped. Then, having ordered the crew of the McAllister to abandon ship, the sub torpedoed her and down she went. Our turn came next, so the signal to clear out was given and they sank the Caria by shell fire."

"Weather conditions were good and we had no difficulty in getting away from the ship's side, so in our boats we made for land and watched the sub put hole after hole in the ship by the water level. Slowly by the stern the stem after rearing her nose high in the air. I cannot describe the feeling of being 'out of house and home' which came over me when there was an empty sea where only a few minutes before the 'Caria' floated proudly on the waves, but then we had to busy ourselves making for the land, which was about 100 miles off. Crete was the place we cleared for, and I think my little crew of eighteen would have hung on two or three days without hardship, provided that the ship's remaining fuel was not so low as it was. I took the tiller and we sailed by the stars until 2:30 a.m. on November 7, when the lights of a westbound steamer were in sight. We landed our red flares and eventually all vacated the deck of the Frankfield at 4 a.m. At daylight two of the McAllister's boats were picked up, but the rest of that ship's remaining two boats is as yet to me unknown. It was a kind action on the part of the Frankfield's commander to lose so much valuable time in taking us aboard, knowing that the longer he stayed in that vicinity, the more risk he ran. Anyway, we were treated like lords and were landed at Malta on Nov. 9."

The crew of the Caria left for England via Marseilles, but Mr. McEwen remained on the Frankfield to fill the vacancy left by an officer.

The Frankfield was an interned German prize and a splendid vessel. The thorough manner in which everything was laid off in that ship, said Mr. McEwen, showed his genius for organization and systematic and methodical work. She had a bridge and chart room which would compare most favorably with the finest British liner afloat, the engines were beautiful, with vibration practically absent. I have never seen such handy cargo gear. In fact, everything, however small, seems to have had the most careful consideration before being laid out as part of the vessel. The above are samples of the methods which have given Germany the strength which she has today."

At the time of writing Mr. McEwen was bound to Dundee.

BONAR LAW SCORES

Montreal, Dec. 16.—A London cable to the Gazette says:—Until now there has been some prejudice in Unionist circles against Bonar Law's leadership as a mere colonial statesman, but his patriotic speech in the House of Commons last night has done a good deal to dispel the old prejudice. The entire press today hails him as a statesman of the first rank, and all Unionists expect him to be the next premier.

PETER OF SERBIA TO FIND SHELTER IN ITALIAN PALACE

Paris, Dec. 16.—It is reported from Rome that King Peter of Serbia will take refuge in Italy at the palace at Caserta, near Naples, which is now being prepared for his use.

FINE WORK OF ITALIAN NAVY

Successful Transport of Troops To Albania

SUPPLIES ALSO LANDED

Loss of One Destroyer and One Transport in Operation Described as More Difficult Than Crossing of Channel or Mediterranean

Rome, Dec. 16.—A semi-official note which announced, last night, that the Italian destroyer Intrepido, and the Italian transport Re Umberto had been sunk by mines in the Adriatic Sea, also deals with recent Austrian naval claims.

The note says that the news from Austrian sources relative to recent events in the Adriatic either is partly untrue or tends to exaggerate the importance of incidents which are inevitable when the complex task of the Italian navy is taken into consideration. The only action the Austrians were able to accomplish, continues the statement, was an attack by a strong group of destroyers on a few small merchant ships, most of which were sailing vessels, forming part of a large fleet employed in the re-organizing of the Albanian coast.

This action in no way hampered important and frequent communication with Albania and still less interfered with military operations. Thus the operations for the transportation of troops, requiring an important traffic with large ships, have been carried out unimpeded, notwithstanding the traps by Italy's opponents. Convoys of men and material, escorted by warships, are said to have reached without hindrance that army of where landings have been ordered. It is asserted that the only exception has been in the case of the Re Umberto, which the Intrepido was following. This statement has been received with satisfaction, being the first authoritative announcement of the Italian expedition to Albania.

That an expedition landed in Albania without suffering any loss in crossing the Adriatic, is considered by naval experts as a brilliant achievement for the Italian fleet, since crossing the Adriatic is more difficult and gives a hostile fleet more favorable opportunities than would be the crossing of the English channel or the Mediterranean.

GERMANS HARSH WITH BRUSSELS BURGOMASTER

Paris Papers Suggest That Pope, King Alfonso or President Wilson Intervene

Paris, Dec. 16.—"I greatly fear I shall have just completed the use of speech before the banquet which you speak of my presiding over in the future," says Burgomaster Adolphe Max, of Brussels, in a letter sent to a friend from the German fortress at Glatz, in which he has been confined for the past year.

The burgomaster, whose disagreement with the German military authorities in Brussels, led to his imprisonment, says that army officers imprisoned at Glatz are permitted to mingle freely, but that he, for some reason, has not been allowed to come in contact with them.

FEDERAL AUTHORITIES HAVE THE VON KOOLBERGEN AFFIDAVIT

San Francisco, Dec. 16.—The affidavit of Johannes Henrikus Van Koolbergen, in which he states that he was employed by Franz Bopp, German consul-general in this city, and Baron George Wilhelm Von Brincken, an attaché of the consulate-general, to destroy bridges and tunnels in Canada, is, it was announced, in the possession of the federal authorities.

They regard it as of the greatest importance in connection with the prosecution of Von Brincken, C. C. Crowley, a detective in Bopp's employ, and Mrs. Margaret Cornelia, an agent in the employ of Crowley.

According to Canadian advices Van Koolbergen, who was a Mill Valley, California, civil engineer, is serving a two years' sentence in Calgary for forgery.

Lethbridge, Alb., Dec. 16.—What is considered almost absolute proof that Von Montford, the German sentenced from Calgary for one year for forgery, a week ago is Von Koolbergen, wanted as a star witness in the prosecution of Von Brincken and Crowley in bomb outrages in San Francisco, is obtained in a letter written him by his wife from Calgary, addressed to him in the name of Koolbergen.

THE STRONGEST PLEA YET FOR SOLDIERS' SOCKS

Some of the Men Wearing Paper For Foot Coverings, Writes Captain—Many Pairs Lying Idle in England

Moncton, Dec. 16.—Capt. H. R. Emerson of the 6th C. M. R., writing to his wife in Moncton, gives some interesting information regarding shortage of socks among men at the front. In a letter in the Transcript today he says— "I notice by your letters you are taking interest in work for soldiers. If you would interest other women in knitting socks for soldiers in the trenches you would accomplish something worth while. The London store houses are full of socks for wounded soldiers in the hospitals; that is just where the soldiers need them most. The socks cannot even an odd pair for the men in the field from the Red Cross Society, and so the men have to go short and use paper in a great many cases. There is a lot of hard work going to waste in Canada making socks for the Red Cross, which same socks will rot in storage in England. "I wish you would do a little canvassing for socks in Moncton. Get others to do so in Amherst and other places and ask the newspapers to publish a request for socks. Collect what socks you can and send them to the officer commanding the 6th C. M. R., 2nd brigade C. E. F., France."

TROUBLES AT HOME FOR THE GERMANS ARE LOOMING LARGE

London, Dec. 16.—"There is every reason to believe that the German Reichstag will have to sit much longer than was expected in order to deal with the pressing discontent among the masses," says the Rotterdam correspondent of the Daily News. "In order to appease these clamorings it will need to deal with no fewer than 130 resolutions, all relating to the distribution of food, besides resolutions dealing with the social policy which will require delicate handling, and demands of better pay for the soldiers and sailors and better provisions for the relief of war families."

MOTHER AND BABE DIE OF EXPOSURE AND WANT; HUSBAND IS SOLDIER

London, Ont., Dec. 16.—Mrs. Mary Williamson, aged thirty, was found today with her new born babe, half starved and nearly frozen in a little room in a tenement house and died soon after being taken to the hospital. The babe died also. Three other small children have been taken to the children's shelter. The room was in an indescribable filthy condition. The woman's husband left her recently, and she is now receiving training for overseas service at Guelph. An investigation has been ordered.

ALLIES' MINISTERS CALL ON-CHINESE TO ASK ABOUT IT

Representatives Want to Know About Recent Change to Monarchy

Peking, Dec. 15.—The British, Japanese, Russian and French ministers and the Italian charge d'affaires, visited Lu Chang-Hsiang, the Chinese foreign minister, at the foreign office this afternoon. Acting as spokesman of the diplomatic representatives, Mr. Hsiang, the Japanese minister to China, asked if China still believed she could preserve the peace through the change in the form of China's government into a monarchy. He virtually reiterated the advice previously given to China by the Entente regarding change in the form of government, and urged the necessity of avoiding further confusion in the Far East. Lu Chang-Hsiang again voiced the confidence of China that the change could be accomplished without disturbance of the peace.

DEAD IN LOS ANGELES

Miss Claire Kelley of Fredericton Passes Away—Brother-in-Law of Dr. H. H. McNally Dead

Fredericton, Dec. 16.—W. S. Kelly of the Victoria Hospital staff has received word of the death of his sister, Miss Claire Kelley in Los Angeles, Cal. She was suffering from tuberculosis and gave up a position as stenographer in New York more than a year ago to seek a change of climate. She is survived by two brothers and three sisters. The body is being brought home for burial. Dr. H. H. McNally received a telegram from Yonkers, N. Y., this morning announcing the sudden death of his brother-in-law, Dr. Fred A. Cook. He was operated upon for abscess a few days ago and was thought to be on the road to recovery. The deceased was connected with the public schools and was prominent in Yonkers. He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Beesly, and McNally of this city, whom he married two years ago.

SANK TEN MINUTES AFTER LAST MAN LEFT

New York, Dec. 16.—Captain Loughane and the crew of eighteen of the American steamer Lucy Neff, which foundered early yesterday, twenty miles east of Fenwick Island off the Delaware coast, arrived here today on the British steamer Chasell. Captain Loughane said he sailed from Falmouth, Jamaica, on December 8, with a full cargo of logwood, which was intended for American dye makers. After encountering high seas and terrific gales for several days, the Lucy Neff sprang several leaks on the night of December 14 and, although the freighter was in constant danger of sinking, the crew remained onboard until the Chasell came to their assistance. Ten minutes after the last man had left the Lucy Neff, she sank. The freighter was of 246 tons gross, and was owned by C. L. Dimon of New York.

QUARTERS FOR TROOPS IN MONCTON AND SACKVILLE

Moncton, N. B., Dec. 16.—At a meeting of the city council today Col. Dean and Captain Jago gave the result of an inspection of buildings in Moncton with a view to quartering troops. The building of the Record Foundry & Machine Company was selected. About 600 men will be accommodated there till the middle of May perhaps longer. From here Col. Dean and Captain Jago will go to Shediac and Richibucto to inspect buildings. Three hundred men of the 14th Bn. are to be housed in the Sackville Wood-working building.

MORNING WAR NOTES

Two Italian steamers have been sunk in the Adriatic Sea by drifting mines. A German submarine has been sunk in the Black Sea and a Turkish torpedo boat has been sunk in the Sea of Marmora by the British. The Turkish cruiser "Sultan Selim," formerly the German "Goeben," was torpedoed but not badly damaged. The super-Zeppelin L-99 is reported to have been destroyed by an accidental bomb explosion as it was leaving its shed at Schleswig, according to a Copenhagen report.

The Kaiser has returned to Berlin after a visit to the several German fronts. Reports from Vienna indicate that the Austrian admiral will not disavow the sinking of the Italian steamer Ancona, as requested by the United States.

THE WAR NEWS.

The retirement of Field Marshal Sir John French and the appointment of Sir Douglas Haig to command the British forces in France and Flanders is the most interesting item of last night's news by cable. Sir John French had a very distinguished career, and his more recent services have been recognized by conferring upon him the rank of viscount. It is a graceful way to effect the change in command. Sir Douglas Haig, on the testimony of Sir John French himself, is a brilliant soldier. He has made a splendid record in this war. It may be that he, in conjunction with Gen. Joffre, will make the situation more interesting on the western front.

If it be true, as reported from Vienna via Berlin, that Austria will refuse to disavow the action of the submarine commander who sank the Ancona, there will be a severance of diplomatic relations by the United States, which would naturally tend to strain still more the growing tenacity of the relations between the latter country and Germany. The American note in the Ancona case was too preemptory to admit of such quibbling, and Austria must disavow or accept the consequences without long delay.

The situation in the Balkans is unchanged. The Allied forces are in no immediate danger, and are awaiting the next move of the enemy. There is no need of development of Greek policy, nor is there any indication of what part Roumania and Russia will play in the Balkan struggle. There are rumors of further concentration of German forces on the western front, and there is evidently fear of a German attempt to make trouble in Egypt, but most of the comment is more speculation. The outlook in the south and southwest is very gloomy, but still, however, far from satisfactory.

CONCERNING PEACE. Despite the disclaimer of the German chancellor, the Montreal Mail holds that Germany desires peace. It says: "Germany is moving heaven and earth today to end the present war, because she is at the zenith of her power and can travel only down the hill from now on. The present conflict is not the kind of war Germany planned, prepared for and thought she was starting. The suffering is too well distributed and the inevitable result in sight is only too depressing. Germany prefers peace to defeat, especially a peace in which she would have, by reason of her spent military efforts, a more attractive place than she can get if the war goes on."

A despatch from Ottawa yesterday announced that St. John is cut out this winter so far as grain shipments over the government railway is concerned. It will be cut out again next winter if no elevator is built, and elevators are not built in a day. Why has no action been taken to provide St. John with more elevator space?

The board of trade is naturally indignant over the announcement that St. John is cut out of the grain traffic over the government railway this winter. They remember the promise of Mr. Gutelius. At the very time when an elevator is most needed in connection with the government railway here, there is none, and apparently there is no hope of the C. P. R. elevators being used for any grain over the I. C. R. How will it be next winter?





LAW SOCIETY IN TRIBUTE TO THE LATE SIR FREDERIC BARKER

A Jurist Who Had No Superior Within Boundaries of Canada

At a meeting of the St. John Law Society in the Equity Court rooms this morning, W. A. Irving, K. C., president, presided, and a resolution, moved by M. G. Leck, K. C., was adopted, as follows:—

"Whereas, this society has learned with deep regret of the death of Sir Frederic E. Barker, lately chief justice of this province, after a lifetime filled with useful labor, both in the exacting duties of his profession and in the wider field of the general interests of the state;

"Therefore be it Resolved that the members desire to place on record their personal appreciation of the urbanity and courtesy which the late chief justice displayed not only while holding judicial office, as well when a member of the bar; and also to commemorate the passing of one who in an unusual degree possessed judicial and critical faculty and whose judgments marked by clearness, industry, logical ability and vigor of expression, have reflected honor upon his native province; the bar of which will always recall with pride his reputation, which far transcended provincial boundaries and marked him as a jurist who had no superior within the dominion.

"And be it Further Resolved that the sympathy of the society be extended to Lady Barker and the family of the deceased in the hour of their bereavement."

"Times must be good in St. John, and there must be work for every one here," said Major Van Tuyl, who is here from Halifax superintending the fitting up of accommodation for the troops. "I advertised yesterday for twenty-five laborers, but only two responded, and so far have received applications from just two. Through the co-operation of the local military authorities and the city commissioners, I am getting enough men, and the work will go on just as fast as it can be done."

Arrangements are being made with the water and sewerage department of the city to install a new sewer from the buildings to be used for the troops to the main in Sheffield street.
