

MINUTES OF THE CONFERENCE

OF

New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

Held at St. Stephen, N. B., June 27th, 1883.

METHODIST CONFERENCE.

Question VII.—Who have died since the last Conference ?

ANSWER.

HEZEKIAH MCKEOWN, who was born in Nictaux, Annapolis Co., Nova Scotia. He was converted during his residence as a student in the Wesleyan University, Middletown, Connecticut. In the year 1853 he was received as a probationer for our ministry, and in the year 1857 ordained. He was stationed on the Musquodoboit, Liverpool, Burton, St. Stephen, Carleton, (St. John), Avondale, Newport, St. Stephen (a second term), Woodstock, Fredericton, Chatham, Exmouth St. (St. John), and Sussex Circuits. He was seven times elected Chairman of his District. At the Annual Conference of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island for 1879, he was elected its President. He was a delegate to the First General Conference of the Methodist Church of Canade, held in Toronto in 1874.

He was an effective pulpit and platform speaker. He did not so much aim to paint in words, whereby he might weave pictures of surpassing beauty, as he did to awaken men's consciences and to save souls. He loved the Sabbath School. He evinced a deep interest in the children of his congregations. He was eminently successful in directing those services, which we sometimes call "special services." His labours in the Church to promote revivals were abundant. In revival services he would bring out the whole strength of his vigorous and emotional manhood. On many of his circuits he was permitted to rejoice in seeing many souls gathered into the fellowship of the Church, a the fruit of his ministry. He was ardently attached to the Church in all its great essentials.

During the last year or two, it was manifest to those with whom he was most intimately associated that his health was becoming impaired. He was appointed to the Sussex Circuit at the Conference of 1882, and continued in the full and vigorous discharge of his pulpit and other duties, until, and including the Sabbath next preceding his death. On the night of his release from his earthly labors, he retired in, apparently, his usual health. A few hours later it was manifest to Mrs. McKeown that he was seriously ill. The family and physician were hastily summoned. The time for his departure had come. After having fallen into his first slumber of that night his consciousness

came not to him again. At 4 o'clock on the morning of Saturday the 14th of October, 1882, he exchanged the life of his earthly pilgrimage for the eternal life of the heavenly country in the 54th year of his age and the 30th year of his ministry. and W. Colaitts have been transferred from the M.



The earnest attention of the members of our Church and of the Superintendents of Circuits is called to the following Rules of this Fund, viz. :

1. "Each circuit shall be considered as responsible for a yearly sum, equal at the least, on a general average of all the societies, included within that circuit, to ten cents per member; the number of the members to be taken in all cases as returned at the preceding Conference, and published in the Minutes.

2. "Every Minister shall, at the renewal of the Society Tickets during the August visitation, fully explain to the members the nature and reasonableness of the claims of this Fund upon the justice and liberality of our Church. He shall then enter in the Class Book the individual annual subscriptions, which are to be paid before the ensuing District Meeting.

3. "An annual public collection in Aid of this Fund shall be made in all churches and other preaching places in the month of December.

4. Application shall be made to our friends in each Circuit for Subscriptions a d Donations in aid of this Fund."

5. It shall be the imperative duty of each Chairman of a District, to earnestly endeavor to secure the observance of the Rules of this Fand throughout his District, by calling especial attention to them at the September or Financial District Meeting; by particularly

enquiring at the regular District Meeting, whether proper attention has been paid on each Circuit to the interests of the Fund, especially in regard to the 5th and 6th Rules; and by reporting to the Conference if any preacher, superintendent or other, is unfaithful in this respect.

The particular attention of the Ministers and Preachers is called to the rule of Conference That the whole amount of the Annual Collection for this Fund be given, and not the average collection deducted for circuit purposes. And also their attention is called to the rule of the New Constitution, That all subscriptions and donations of Two Dollars and upwards on the circuits be published in the Minutes of the Conference.



II. RESOLUTION RESPECTING THE DONOR OF DR. DUFF'S LIFE.

WHEBEAS, it is generally conceded, that great advantages will result from an organic union of the Methodist bodies of this Dominion; and.

WHEREAS, the General Conference of our Church did, at its session held in the city of Hamilton last September, appoint a Committee on Union, to meet a similar Committe appointed by each of the other Methodist bodies; and

WHEREAS, the General Conference ordered that should the joint Committee agree upon a basis of union, the plan of union so agreed upon should be submitted to the Quarterly Boards for approval or otherwise, at the next February Quarterly Meetings, and, also, to the next ensuing annual Conferences; and

WHEREAS, the said joint Committee did, after days of much thought and earnest prayer, with a remarkable approach to unanimity, agree upon a plan to serve as a basis of Union; and

WHEREAS, the said plan has been accepted by a very large majority of the Quarterly Boards of our Church, and

WHEREAS, a Union upon said Basis will not involve the surrender of any one of the fundamental principles of the Methodist Church of Canada.

Therefore Resolved, That this Conference hereby declares in favor of the consummation of the proposed union on the aforesaid Basis at the earliest period, which may, by the Adjourned General Conference, be deemed expedient and found practicable.

IV. RESOLUTION RESPECTING RESTRICTIVE RULES.

WHEREAS, the omission of the Restrictive Rules forming a part of the Constitution of the Methodist Church of Canada from the Basis of Union, leads many of the members of the Conference to fear their omission from the Constitution of the proposed organic Union; and

WHEREAS, such omissions could not fail to have a most disturbing effect upon the entire Church,

STAND NG ORDERS.

I.-DISTRICT MEETINGS.

3. The Chairman of Districts are peremptorily required to procure three complete copies of the Minutes of the several annual and other meetings of the District Committees, financial and ordinary, duly signed by the Chairman and Secretary. One of these copies shall be inserted in the District Records; the second shall be reserved for the use of the Conference, and the third shall be delivered to the Secretary for preservation in the archives of the Conference. Furthermore, it is required that the last-mentioned copies be handed in the forenoon of the day preceding that on which our first preparatory committee-meeting may be appointed to be held, that the Secretaries may prepare classified lists of all matters which are to come before the Conference, and thereby expedite business.

2. That as much trouble has been caused at different sessions of Conference in consequence of alterations made in the District Minutes, it is determined that when the Minutes of the several Districts shall have been signed by the Chairman and Secretaries, they shall not be altered, except by special permission of the Conference.

II.-PROVINCIAL WESLEYAN.

That in regard to subscriptions for the WESLEYAN, inquiry is to be instituted in the District Committees respectively, as to the fidelity of each brother responsible for the collection of such moneys—the accounts being previously sent to the Chairmen, and distributed at the Annual District Meetings.

111.-MISSIONARY LISTS.

Each Superintendent is requested to present, at the Annual District Meeting, prepared on foolscap paper, and made up in Canada currency, a perfect list of all Missionary moneys collected on his Circuit; and each Chairman is required to present such lists to the Missionary Secretary, in a state ready for publication, on the day previous to the meeting of the Missionary Committee. The Financial Secretaries of the several Districts are required to send to the Secretary of the Children's Fund, immediately after the Annual District Meetings, the names of all the ministers in their respective Districts who are claimants upon the Children's Fund for the current year; and to state the number of children for whom allowance is claimed, and, as far as possible, the name and date of birth of each of the said children.

V.-BOOK ROOM ACCOUNTS.

Resolved, That every Minister and Preacher is peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book Steward each year, at or before the meeting of Conference.

VII.-FINANCIAL ECONOMY.

The Conference recommends to the Quarterly Meetings of the several circuits, the following plan, by which it is hoped they may the more effectually raise the amount necessary to meet the allowances of the ministers and preachers, and which will make the collection of class and ticket money unnecessary.

1. Let the Quarterly Boards, at the beginning of each financial year, estimate the amount needed for the year.

2. Then ascertain from each member of the church, and, as far as practicable, from each member of the congregation, what each purposes to give as his or her weekly or monthly contribution.

3. Let these sums be entered by a steward appointed for this purpose in a book which he shall keep as Treasurer of the Quarterly Board.

4. If the total amount of these sums does not equal the needed amount, then let the stewards apportion the deficiency among such as are willing for Christ's sake to assume such deficiency, setting down to each person, with his or her consent, the additional amount which they think he or she ought weekly or monthly to pay.

5. Let the stewards then adopt and carry out a plan by which every one shall have the opportunity of regularly contributing each week or month, by envelope or otherwise, not grudgingly nor of necessity, the sum which has been pledged by him or her. Let these contributions be paid over regularly to the steward appointed to receive them, and be brought up by him to the Quarterly Meeting. The said steward shall keep an individual account of all the pledges and contributions, and shall pay over the same, under the direction of the Quarterly Meeting, to the preacher or preachers authorized to receive them.

6. That Quarterly Meetings adopting the envelope system be recommended not to include in their estimates the claims of Foreign and Home Mission, but to provide for those funds as in times past, by special collections and subscriptions.

7. That in the opinion of this Conference, the minimum salary of ministers should be \$750.

8. That in the opinion of this Conference, the minimum amount of young men's salaries should be \$400.

9. That in the opinion of this Conference, the salary of ordained, but unmarried, ministers should be \$520.

10. When a deficiency occurs upon a circuit having two preachers (a married and a single man), it shall be borne by each, according to a pro rato amount.

VIII. MINISTERS REMOVING.

In the case of ministers removing, they shall be held responsible for the supply of the pulpits on the circuits which they are leaving for two Sabbaths after the close of the Conference, and shall be required to provide for the pulpits of their new circuits on the third Sabbath after Conference.

PASTORAL ADDRESS.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA WITHIN THE BOUNDS OF THE CONFERENCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK AND

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

BELOVED BRETHREN, —Assembled together in our Annual Conference, we gladly avail ourselves of the opportunity afforded us of addressing you, remembering the solemn obligation under which we are laid, to take heed unto ourselves and to all the flock over which the Holy Ghost hath made us overseers to feed the Church of God

which He hath purchased with his own blood. We "dwell together in unity." The faith, hope and charty which shall abide in the Church throughout all ages, as the true principles of the Christian life are counted very precious by us, and we have no desire to "preach any other gospel than that, which we have preached unto you," which "is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth."

While we do not regard the success of the past by any means as commensurate with the agencies employed, much less equal to the gracious purpose of the Divine Master, "who will have all men to be saved and to come unto the knowledge of the truth," yet we record with gratitude the tidings that many portions of the Conferential field have been visited with showers of blessing, enabling those who went forth weeping bearing precious seed to come again with rejoicing, bringing their sheaves with them.

We would particularly urge upon you to cultivate a living faith, realizing in your daily experience, the powers of the world to come, rendering influential on the heart and life, the word of God, his warnings and threatenings as well as his promises. So shall Divine truth penetrate the soul in all its affections and faculties, and give its own impress of holiness to thought and sentiment, to motive, feeling and judgment. So shall it mould and elevate and hallow act and habit and character. It shall elevate the morals of trade, and the tone of the domestic circle, no less than our personal enjoyment in spiritual religion.

In all the seccular affairs of life we exhort you to have faith in God, as the God of Providence as well as grace. "For the eyes of the Lord run to and fro throughout the whole earth, to show himself strong in the dehalf of them whose heart is perfect toward him. Never deviate from righteousness and truth in the transaction of business, under the delusive notion that thereby you will promote your worldly interests. The fear of the Lord is to hate evil. Let your religion be the religion of principle and not of circumstances. When tempted by the allurements of wealth or ambition or pleasure, to turn aside to crooked paths, let integrity and uprightness preserve you.

A living and fruitful faith will have, as one of its associate graces, the Spirit of love, without which whatever our gifts, our zeal, our faith, our self-denial, we are nothing. Maintain this divine love, love that for Christ's sake shall seek the wandering souls of men, with daily prayer, with ceaseless personal efforts and willing sacrifices He which converteth a sinner from the error of his way shall save a soul from death and shall hide a multitude of sins. This charity is the peculiar badge and characteristic of the disciples of Christ. By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples if ye have love one to another. This is the law of Christ's kingdom, the rule of his house and the bond of perfectness, girdling that seamless garment which covers and adorns the regenerate body of Christ's redeemed.

The spirit of devotion must be our constant aim. Let us associate with the spiritually-minded. Never trifle with conscience, to do so will prove a snare. No one can indulge in anything which his conscience tells him ought not to be done, but it will at length wear away his spirituality of mind. Brethren suffer the word of most earnest exhortation on this topic. Christianity in our land has exerted a vast and general influence on the public mind, has removed much darkness and error, has created a public sentiment and a public conscience, and brought the church and the world into much nearer relation. Let us remember that there can be no fellowship between light and darkness, between him that believeth and an infidel, without a sinful weakness and a sinful conformity. To retain the adoption of sons and daughters of the Lord Almighty we must be separate and not touch the unclean thing. In the conflict of the church with error and sin, success depends mainly on the impression made by individual professors in their intercourse with others. It is not the public profession, but the private character that convinces, it is the good conversation that wins. Must we not admit the painful truth that the chief cause of scepticism, of distaste for the Gospel, is the practical infidelity of many who profess and call themselves christians. How great is this contradiction-to profess to be laying up treasures in heaven, and yet to devote every faculty of the mind and almost every moment of time to the acquisition of wealth-to be dead to the world and yet to vie with the most impetuous worldling in the whirl of business ; with the most polished in the elegancies and style of life ; with the most frivolous in amusement ; with the most wealthy in lavish expenditure, and with the most penurious in exaction, oppression and inadequate remuneration. Most fatally will such a spirit re-act upon the Christian himself. Entering the soul it will eat out the very core of religion, leaving only the dead and shrivelled form of godliness. If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God. Set your affections on things above, not on things on the earth. We beseech you to ponder these matters prayerfully, to act out your solemn conviction of Christian duty, to cultivate an enlightened, fervent and devoted piety. So shall our God count you worthy of this calling and fulfil all the good pleasure of his goodness, and the work of faith with power.

Such holy consistency will make every man a preacher in his own house, an example there of all holiness patience and truth, a pattern of faith, purity and love. Let the impress of our renewed character fall first, and with gentle energy, upon our children and domestics. To them at least, let us be guides, in them at least, let us produce the deep conviction of the excellence of personal piety; and of the happiness of a sincere consecration to God. Let the sacrifice of praise and prayer ascend morning and evening to the God of the families of the whole earth, and never may our actions or words, our spirit or temper condemn our devotion or awaken perplexed thoughts in our children, or crush the unfolding of their piety, or discourage their earliest approach to the Saviour. Then shall the Lord create upon every dwelling place of Mount Zion, and upon her assemblies, a cloud and smoke by day, and the shining of a flaming fire by night.

Let us again-urge a conscientious and regular attendance upon the public means of grace, at the hour of prayer and at the Lord's table. Let us practically confess our belief in the sacred character and obligation of the Christian Sabbath by giving all the solemn and devoted hours to hallowed duty and pleasure. Nor let us merit the reproach which must fall on those who cut themselves off from the privilege of renewing their spiritual strength in the week day services of the sanctuary. These are wayside springs for the refreshment of all who wish to preserve their spiritual health amidst the toils and cares of every day life.

Temptations to undervalue and even forsake our weekly classmeeting will probably thicken around us. It may be expected that those who have no sympathy with spiritual-mindedness or those whose training has prejudiced them against any distinct mode of religious expression will always be ready to depreciate this peculiar service, but we would affectionately remind you that the most eminent christians of every name have confessed the desirableness and obligation of sacred and open-hearted communion with their believing brethren. Be assured also that one great secret of faithfulness in the use of all the means of grace, as well as of our continued vigor as a christian church, will be found in our unreserved devotedness to private-communion with God. If our Heavenly Father see us often in secret He will reward us openly.

The Sabbath Schools may be regarded as nurseries of the Church. Those that be planted in the house of the Lord shall flourish in the courts of our God. It is highly desirable that our Catechism should be taught in every class. We cannot expect the children to become rooted and grounded in the truth, as we have received it, unless we early acquaint them with our doctrines.

The interest manifested in the cause of *Temperance* has brought comfort and hope to many stricken homes and secured advanced legislation for the restriction and suppression of the traffic in strong drink. Convinced that the hand of God is in this great movement we bespeak for it your earnest co-operation and fervent prayers.

The Financial support of the Church of God demands your serious consideration. Make yourselves acquainted with the various funds and enterprises of our Church. Many of our Ministry on Circuits and Supernumeraries are bearing heavy deficiencies, whereby their hearts are sorely depressed and their usefulness hindered. Honor the Lord with thy substance and with the first-fruits of all thine increase, so shall thy barns be filled with plenty and thy presses shall burst out with new wine.

The Educational Institutions at Mount Allison continue to hold deservedly a high place in the estimation of the Conference. They are a bulwark against scepticism and immorality. The records of the past and the facts of the present assure us of the wisdom of placing higher education under the fostering care of the Church. We strongly recommend our Institutions to your patronage. Let the contributions to
