Fireman is Dying of Injuries Following Head-on Collision Near Winnipeg.




Church Observes 1,238th Birthday

London, Dec. 17—The Church of Allhallows, Barking, near the Tower of London, celebrated the other day its 1,238th birthday, for it was founded in the year 685 by Bishop Erkenwald, and by him committed to the charge of the Abbesses of Barking in Essex. This is one of the London churches which escaped the Great Fire of 1666.
