I. SEDERUNT.

TERONTO, MONDAY,
June 13, 1859, 7½ o'clock, P. M.

The Synod of the United Presbyterian Church in Canada met, and after sermon by the Moderator, the Rev. William Aitken, from 1 Cor. i. 17, was constituted.

The Roll of Synod, as compiled from the Rolls furnished by Roll called Presbytery Clerks, was called and marked.

It was reported that the following changes, affecting the Roll of Synod, and the list of Probationers, had occurred since last meeting, namely:—

That the Rev. Alexander Henderson, Fitzroy Harbor, in the Presbytery of Lanark, had been removed by death, on the 23rd death, October, 1858. Taken from Roll.

The Presbytery of Flamboro' was also, on a similar request, permitted to meet in the Vestry of this Church, at 6 o'clock to-morrow morning. The Presbytery of London asked leave, through their Moderator, to meet at such time as may be suitable to them during this session of Synod, it being understood that such meeting shall not interfere with the attendance of the members of said Presbytery at the sittings of Synod. Leave granted.

Adjourned, to meet at 9 o'clock to-morrow morning.
Closed with prayer.

II. SEDERUNT.

TORONTO, TUESDAY,

June 14, 1859, 9 o'clock, A.M.

The Synod met, and was constituted by the Rev. William Ormiston, M.A., Moderator.

Devotions. Devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. Messrs. Stevenson and Robertson.

The Roll was called, and the minutes of the first Sederunt were read, and on being amended were sustained.

Rev. J. Scott, excused for absence. Professor Taylor stated that he had received a letter from the Rev. John Scott, of Napanee, excusing his absence from this meeting of Synod, on account of the recent death of one of his children. Mr. Scott's excuse was sustained.

Bills and Overtures* Committee Report. The Committee of Bills and Overtures gave in their Report to the following purport:—

On motion it was agreed to receive the report, and to sanction the order of business therein recommended. Received and sanctioned.

The Committee were, at the same time, instructed to consider and recommend the time, during this Session, at which the question as to the time and place of next meeting of Synod shall be determined. Instructions as to next Synod.

ORDERED.—That the Reports of the several Committees to examine the Minutes of Presbyteries; as also the Report of the Com. on Minutes and Audit, when to report.

It was moved in further amendment by Mr. Caven, seconded ^{Mr. Caven's motion} by Mr. Moffatt :—

That seeing the Synod are not aware of anything to the prejudice of Mr. Cleihew's character, and seeing that he does not wish employment, but simply to have his status as a Minister recognised, his application be granted.

The amendment of Mr. Caven being ^{put} against that of Mr. Thornton, the latter was preferred by a vote of 23 to 19. The amendment of Mr. Caven was then dropped from the list of motions, and Mr. Thornton's amendment was put in opposition to the original motion of Dr. Jennings, when the amendment was again preferred by a majority, and the Synod did and do hereby decide in terms thereof,—That inasmuch as Mr. Cleihew's application is merely for ministerial standing, and not with the view of employment, the Synod do not judge it advisable to grant it.

Took up the application of Mr. Howie to be received as a ^{Mr. Howie's application} Minister of this Church, referred to Synod by the Presbytery of Brant. Read papers connected therewith, namely :—Extracts from the minutes of the Presbytery of Flamboro'; extract of the Licensure of Mr. Howie by the United Associate Presbytery of Paisley and Greenock, 17th September, 1844, extracted by the Clerk of said Presbytery, on the 13th June, 1856; extract of minutes of the United Presbytery of Carlsruhe, setting forth the ministerial status of Mr. Howie in connexion with said Presbytery; testimonial in favor of Mr. Howie from the Rev Messrs. Robert Cairns and Thomas McDougall, of Paisley; certificate of ministerial standing from the Presbytery of Albany, United States, of the Associate Presbyterian Church; and a letter from the Clerk of the Presbytery of Brant to the Clerk of the Presbytery of Flamboro'.

The hour of noon having arrived, at the request of the Moderator the Rev. Dr. William Taylor engaged in prayer, and the Synod adjourned, to meet again at two o'clock

III. SEDERUNT.

TORONTO, TUESDAY,

June 11, 1859, 2 o'clock, P.M.

The Synod met, and was constituted by the Rev. Mr. Ormiston.

Churches, and a synopsis of the returns made to the reference of this Basis to Sessions, Congregations, and Presbyteries, (as by order of last Synod), presenting a very large majority favourable to Union on said Basis—was read by Dr. William Taylor, the Conveuer.

On motion of Mr. Inglis, seconded by Mr. Logie, it was ^{Report received.} agreed:—

That the Synod receive the Report of the Union Committee, tender its members hearty thanks for their diligence, and defer the consideration of the Report till to-morrow forenoon, when it shall be the first matter in the orders of the day: when all papers on the subject of Union will also be taken up.

Read a petition from Gould Street United Presbyterian Con- ^{Union Petitions on read.}gregation of Toronto, on the subject of Union, and praying that the Synod do take into consideration the Basis of Union believed to have been adopted by Presbyterian Churches in Australia. Read also a petition on the same subject generally, from the United Presbyterian Congregation of Lake Shore. It was agreed that these papers be taken up when the subject of Union is considered, in the morning.

Called for the Reports of Presbyteries on the inspection of ^{Students, inspection of.}Students of Divinity. Reports were given in by the Presbyteries, and in the terms following:—

The Presbytery of Grey reported that the only Student under ^{Presbytery of Grey.}their inspection for the last year was Mr. William Donald, of the third year, and that he had performed all his exercises to the satisfaction of the Presbytery.

The Presbytery of Durham reported that they had had one ^{Durham.}student, Mr. William McWilliam, for a short time under their care; that owing to his great distance from the seat of Presbytery, and from all the members thereof, it was impossible to meet often with him, but that he had performed the exercises assigned him to the very high satisfaction of the Presbytery.

The Pre-bytery of Brant reported that, during the past year, ^{Brant.}they had had under their inspection Joseph White and John Turnbull, students of the second year, who had performed the exercises assigned them to the satisfaction of the Presbytery.

The Toronto Presbytery reported that, during the past year, ^{Toronto.}they had had under their inspection the following students, viz.:

Mr. Peter Goodfellow, of the second year, Messrs. James Malcolm and William Richardson, of the first year, and that they had severally performed all the exercises, and delivered the discourses prescribed, to the satisfaction of the Presbytery.

Flamoro'.

The Presbytery of Flamoro' reported that they had had two students last fall, Messrs. John Cameron and Wm. Stewart, who however did not appear before Presbytery with any exercises, the former because of indisposition, and the latter because, on the 4th January, he pleaded a multiplicity of business, but hoped to have all ready at next meeting of Presbytery, but before that time he had joined another Church.

Theo. Education,

Called for the Report of the Committee on Theological Education. The report was read by Professor Taylor, the Convener.

Received.

On motion, the Synod agreed to receive the report, and tender their thanks to the Committee for the diligence with which they have discharged the duties assigned them. It was also agreed that the Report be printed as usual.

On the question of *Funds* for the support of *Exhibitions* to Students, it was on motion agreed:—

That the Synod recommend to those Congregations which have not yet contributed to the Students' Fund, to do so before the end of the year, and that Presbyteries bring the matter before the Sessions under their inspection.

Literary Course
of Students, mo-
tion on.

In reference to the *Literary Course* to be pursued by Students, it was moved by Mr. Logie, seconded by Mr. Dunbar:—

That the Committee on Theological Education have full power to make all necessary arrangements to regulate the studies of the Students during the Session of the Hall.

Amendment.

It was moved in amendment by Mr. Drummond, seconded by Mr. Cout's:—

That the Committee on Theological Education be instructed to advise with the Students in reference to their *Literary* and *Philosophical* studies, in order to raise the standard of literary attainment.

Decision, Com-
mittee to have
full power.

The amendment being first put, was supported only by a few votes—the original motion was carried by a large majority, and the Synod decided in terms thereof,—that the Committee have

full power to regulate the studies of the Students, during the Session of the Hall.

The Committee on Theological Education was then re-appointed, consisting of the following ministers, namely:—The Rev. the Moderator of Synod, (Mr. Ormiston), Professor Taylor, Messrs. Kennedy, Thornton, Dick, Torrance, and King. Professor Taylor, Convener. Theo. Ed. Com. re-appointed.

The hour of five o'clock having arrived, at the request of the Moderator, Mr. Fraser, Elder, from London, engaged in prayer, and the moderator having pronounced the benediction, the Synod adjourned, to meet again at 7 o'clock.

IV. SEDERUNT.

TORONTO, TUESDAY,
June 14, 1859, 7 o'clock, P. M.

The Synod met, and was constituted by the Rev. Mr. Ormiston, Moderator.

The Roll was called, and the minutes of last Sederunt were read and sustained.

Called for the Report of the Committee on the Independence of the Church and on Funds. The report was read by the Rev. Mr. Gibson, the convener. Independence of Church and Funds, Report of Com.

On motion of Mr. Aitken, seconded by Dr W. Taylor, the report was received, and the cordial thanks of the Synod were tendered to the Committee for the great diligence they have exercised in the business intrusted to them. Report received.

On motion the Committee on the Independence of the Church, and on Funds was then re-appointed, consisting of the following persons, namely:—The Rev. Professor Taylor, the Rev. Messrs. Gibson, Ormiston, Wm. Inglis and Duff, together with Messrs. McVicar and Christie, elders,—Mr. Gibson to be convener. Independence of Ch. and Funds, Com. re-appointed.

After long reasoning as to the manner in which the scheme of the Synod to secure the Independence of the Church, adopted last year, had been carried out by Presbyteries and Congregations, it was on motion unanimously agreed,— Returns to Independence Com. to be made by Presbyteries.

That all the Presbyteries of the Church be enjoined to furnish,

through their clerks, to the convener of the Committee on Church Independence and Funds before the end of April, full returns as to the congregations within their bounds having regular methods of raising missionary funds, and the particular methods adopted by each.

Report to be published and printed copies circulated.

The Committee were requested to publish the report now given in, and also to print and circulate as many copies thereof, in a separate form, as they may judge to be necessary.

Synod. meeting of at Hamilton, on 2nd Tues. of June 1860.

The convener of the Committee on Bills and Overtures, according to instructions given to said Committee, at a former Sederunt, intimated that now would be a suitable time to determine when and where the next meeting of Synod should be held.

A vote was taken, proceed now to fix the time and place of next meeting, or defer it till after the question of Union be disposed of. It was carried by a majority,—proceed now.

It was then moved by Dr. Ferrier, seconded by Mr. Thornton:—

That the next meeting of Synod be held in the city of Hamilton, on the second Tuesday of June, 1860, at 7½ o'clock, in the evening.

It was moved in amendment by the Rev. Dr. Jennings, seconded by Mr. Fraser, elder:—

That the Synod meet in the city of London, on the second Tuesday of June, next year.

A vote was taken, when it was carried by a majority, that the next meeting of Synod be held in the City of Hamilton, on the second Tuesday of June, 1860, at 7½ o'clock in the evening.

The Doxology was sung,—the Synod standing.

The Rev. Mr. Thornton, at the request of the moderator, led in prayer, and the moderator having pronounced the benediction, the Synod adjourned, to meet again at 9 o'clock to-morrow morning.

The Roll was called, and the minutes of last sederunt were read and approved.

At the suggestion of the moderator, the Rev. Dr. W. Taylor, ^{Deputations, Com. to receive.} Mr. Thornton, and Mr. Baird, were appointed a Committee to make arrangements for the reception and introduction to this Synod, of Deputations from sister Churches.

The Rev. Mr. Fuller, of the Congregational Church, Hamilton, ^{Mr Fuller invited to correspond.} being present, was invited to correspond.

The Committee of Bills and Overtures submitted a supplementary Report in the following terms:— ^{Bills and Overtures, Rep't supplementary.}

The Committee of Bills and Overtures report the following additional papers:—

15. Reports, Memorials, and Papers on Union.

17. The Rev. Mr. Shand's application to be received as a minister, with testimonials, referred to the Synod by the London Presbytery.

18. Overture from the London Presbytery, in reference to a correspondence between the United Presbyterian Synod in Canada and the United Presbyterian Church of North America.

19. A reference from a Committee of London Presbytery on the Proudfoot Testimonial.

A vote was taken,—receive the report of the Committee. ^{It Received.} It was carried receive.

Read and received papers on Union as follows:—

1. Report of the Presbytery of Durham on the Basis of Union. ^{Union, papers on.}

2. Report from Toronto Presbytery on Union.

3. Memorial on Union from Congregations in the Presbytery of Brant, and others, said memorial being signed by 250 persons belonging to both the Presbyterian Church of Canada, and to the United Presbyterian Church.

The Rev. Messrs. Laing, McLaren, and Troupe, of the Pres- ^{Messrs. Laing, McLaren and}

Troupe of the byterian Church of Canada, being present, were invited to correspond. respond.

Union, consideration of. Proceeded to the first order of the day, namely: the consideration of the question of Union; when the Basis of Union submitted by the Union Committee, was taken up.

On motion of Dr. William Taylor, seconded by Mr. Inglis.—

Committee of the whole House. The Synod resolved itself into a Committee of the whole house, for the consideration of the question of Union. The Rev. Mr. Aitken in the Chair.

Committee of the whole rose & reported. After sitting for some time, the Committee of the whole house rose. The moderator took the chair, and the Synod resumed. The Chairman of the Committee of the whole reported the resolutions following; and at the same time asked leave to sit again.

1. That the first article of the Basis submitted by the Union Committee be adopted as expressive of the unanimous mind of this Committee.

2. That the second article of the Basis be adopted as expressing fully the mind of this Committee, leaving out all that follows the word "Standards" in the said article. The Report was received.

The Synod then adjourned, to meet again at 2 o'clock. Closed with prayer.

TORONTO, WEDNESDAY,

June 15, 1859, 2 o'clock, P. M.

The Synod met, and was constituted by the Rev. Mr. Ormiston, Moderator.

The Roll was called, and the Minutes of last Sederent were read and sustained.

Minutes of Presbyteries, Reports. Called for the Reports of the several Committees appointed to examine the records of Presbyteries. Reports were given in on the minutes of the Presbyteries of Flamboro', Toronto, Canada East, Durham, Wellington, Brant, Grey, and Huron, attesting that the records of these Presbyteries were correctly kept. The Committee on the minutes of the Presbytery of London stated

that the minutes of said Presbytery had not been placed in their hands. London Minutes not present.

The Committee to audit the accounts of the Synod's Treasurer stated that they were not yet prepared to report. The Committee was allowed further time to complete their labours. Audit Committee.

The Committee to make arrangements for the reception of Deputations from sister churches, reported that they recommend that such Deputations be received to-morrow evening. The report was received, and its recommendation adopted. Deputation Committee, Report received.

Resumed consideration of the question of Union, interrupted by the adjournment in the morning. The Synod again resolved itself into Committee of the whole House on the subject, the Rev. Mr. Aitken in the chair. Union Question, Committee of the whole.

After sitting for some time the Committee of the whole House rose; the Moderator took the chair, and the Synod resumed. Rose & reported.

The chairman of the Committee of the whole reported the following business as transacted, at the same time asking leave to sit again. Report.

The Rev. Dr. Ferrier moved, seconded by Mr. Barrie:— 2nd Art. amend'd.

That instead of the second article of the Basis, the following be substituted: that inasmuch as there is a difference of opinion in regard to the doctrines contained in these standards, in relation to the power and duty of the Civil Magistrate in matters of religion, the office-bearers of the Church, in subscribing the standards and formularies, are not to be held as countenancing any persecuting or intolerant principles which these standards are supposed by many to contain, or as professing any views inconsistent with the liberty of personal conscience, or the right of private judgment.

The Rev. Mr. Lawrence moved in amendment, seconded by Dr. Jennings.—

That the second article of the Basis be adopted, with the alteration of inserting the words "or reception" after the word "interpretation," in the first limiting clause, the insertion of the same words, viz., "or reception" after the word "interpreter," and the substitution of the words "is required" instead of the words

"can be received" in the second and third limiting clauses under the same article.

A vote was taken, and the amendment was carried on a division by 50 to 9.

3rd Art. adopted. It was moved by Mr. Caven, and unanimously agreed:—

That the third article be adopted, as it stands in the Basis drafted by the Joint Committees.

4th Art. amended. A motion was submitted by Mr. Caven, seconded by Mr. Watson, to amend the 4th article of the Basis, by omitting the words "and is therefore king of nations," alter the word "sovereignty" in the first clause, and by substituting the word "private" instead of the word "personal" between the words "his" and "conduct" in the second clause of the article.

Mr. Gibson moved, seconded by Dr. Ferrier:—

That the 4th article be amended by omitting all the words after the words "by the revealed will of Christ."

A vote being taken, the amendment was carried by a majority of 49 to 9.

The Report of the Committee was received.

The Rev. Mr. Skinner, at the request of the moderator, led in prayer, and the moderator having pronounced the benediction, the Synod adjourned, to assemble in Synodical Missionary Meeting, at 7 o'clock in the evening.

The Moderator then addressed the meeting.

The Rev. Messrs. Thornton, Skinner and Gibson, also, briefly addressed the meeting.

On motion the cordial thanks of the Synod were given to Messrs. Logie and Lawrence for the excellent and appropriate addresses which they have delivered.

Engaged in praise, singing the 56 paraphrase, verses 1—3.

The Rev. Mr. Caven, at the request of the Moderator, led in prayer.

The Moderator pronounced the benediction, and the Synod adjourned, to meet again to-morrow morning at nine o'clock.

June 16, 1859, 9 o'clock, A.M.

The Synod met, and was constituted by the Rev. Mr. Ormiston, Moderator.

The Roll was called, and the minutes of the two former Sederunts were read and sustained.

The Synod having last year agreed henceforward to take up the mission business, if practicable, on Thursday morning, it was, notwithstanding, on motion unanimously agreed, that on account of the great importance of the Union question, interrupted by the adjournment yesterday afternoon, the mission business be in the meantime postponed, in order that the Union business be first considered and disposed of.

Mission business postponed

Students, inspection of, Presbytery of London.

The Presbytery of London reported on the inspection of students to the following purport:—

The U. P. Presbytery of London met and was constituted. *Inter alia*. Agreed to report to the Synod that there had been under the care of the Presbytery, during the past year, the following students: Messrs. William Fletcher, David Waters, Robert Hall, James Hanran, George Irving and James Milligan, and that they had performed the various exercises prescribed them to the satisfaction of the Presbytery.

Reception of Ministers, law amendment, Committee Report.

Called for the Report of the Committee appointed to consider the law of Synod for the reception of Ministers and Probationers, and any amendment on that law which may be necessary. The Report was read by Professor Taylor. On motion the report was received, and the thanks of Synod tendered to the Committee. The consideration of the report was deferred.

Bills and Overtures, Com. 3rd Report.

The Committee of Bills and Overtures gave in an additional Report, presenting Papers laid before them as follows:—

20. Memorial of the Grand Lodge of the Order of Good Templars, recommended to be read with paper No. 11.

21. Letter from the Chief Superintendent of Education, Upper Canada, on religious exercises and instruction in the public Common Schools.

22. Memorial from the Presbytery of Brant, on Rev. Mr. Murray's application to receive appointments.

23. Petition of J. J. E. Linton on Temperance, recommended to be taken up along with Nos. 11 and 20.

The report was received.

Union, resumed. Com. of whole

Took up the question of Union. The Synod resolved itself into Committee of the whole House.

Rose, reported

The Committee having sat for some time, on motion rose. The Moderator took the chair, and the Synod resumed.

The Chairman of the Committee of the whole House reported the following business as transacted:—

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1. It was moved by Mr. Caven, seconded by Mr. Ormiston : Note to Article 4 amended.

That the notes be regarded as an authoritative explanation of the sense in which the fourth article of the Basis is held by the Synod of the United Presbyterian Church.

2. It was moved in amendment by Mr. King, seconded by Mr. Lawrence :

That the first note be appended, as a note, to the Basis, as explanatory of the sense in which the United Presbyterian Church understands the fourth article, the form of note being modified as follows : that the article having relation to the Headship of Christ over the Nations, and the duties of the Civil Magistrate, has always been, and is, one of the things most surely believed and most firmly maintained by the United Presbyterian Church, while, at the same time, she has constantly and carefully guarded against the practical inference drawn from it by some, that Christ, as King of Nations, delegates his power to earthly kings—that they are in any sense his vicegerents, or that magisterial interference in matters purely of a religious nature is a medium through which Christ exercises the authority with which, as King of Nations, he is invested.

3. It was moved in further amendment by Mr. Inglis, seconded by Mr. Logie :

That instead of adopting the notes, there be appended to, and incorporated with, the fourth article as adopted by this Synod, the latter part of the first note beginning with the words "the practical inference," introducing the clause with the introductory words "it being understood that it is not required that any one should adopt the practical inference," and so on to the end.

A vote was taken between the amendment of Mr. King and that of Mr. Inglis, numbered respectively 2 and 3, when 61 voted for that of Mr. King, and 16 for that of Mr. Inglis.

The amendment of Mr. Inglis being lost was dropped from the list of motions, and a second vote was taken between the motion of Mr. Caven and the amendment of Mr. King, numbered respectively 1 and 2, when 56 voted for that of Mr. King, and 15 for that of Mr. Caven.

The amendment of Mr. King being thus successively preferred

to that of Mr. Inglis and the motion of Mr. Caven, was declared to be carried.

Article 5 adopted. The fifth article of the Basis was, on motion, unanimously adopted.

Article 6 adopted. The sixth article was also unanimously adopted.

Union Reports adopted. On motion of Mr. Gibson, seconded by Mr. Torrance, the Synod resolved, *nem. con.*, to receive and adopt the several reports on the Basis of Union, made by the Committee of the whole House, and to discharge the Committee.

Union Basis to engross, Com. to. The Rev. Dr. W. Taylor, Messrs. Gibson and Torrance were appointed a Committee to act with the Clerk in engrossing the findings of the Committee of the whole House on the Basis of Union, which findings were afterwards adopted by the Synod, with a view to their being laid, as soon as may be, before the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, now in session in this city. The Committee to report to-morrow morning. The Clerk of Synod convened.

Dr. Ferrier's History, Commit. to frame Minute on. It was agreed on motion of Mr. Lawrence, seconded by Professor Taylor:—

That some expression ought to be given of the sense which the Synod entertains of the service which the Rev. Dr. Ferrier has rendered to the Church, by the History of the United Presbyterian Church, which he has published in the Magazines.

Mr. Lawrence and Professor Taylor were appointed a Committee to draw up a minute, expressive of the interest which the Synod has taken in this History, thanking Dr. Ferrier for the service which he has, by its compilation, rendered to the Church in Canada, and hoping that the papers may be given to the public in a more permanent form.

Distrib'n. Committee Report The Committee for the distribution of Preachers gave in their report. The report was received, and the thanks of Synod were tendered to the Committee for their diligence.

Distrib. Com., re-appointed. The Committee of Distribution was then re-appointed, consisting of Rev. Messrs. Dick and Ormiston, and Dr. Jennings.

Carruthers Mr., case of. In reference to a statement in the report of the Distribution Committee relating to Mr. Carruthers, preacher, Mr. Thornton and Mr. Lawrence were appointed to act with the Committee in

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The Committee to examine the minutes of the Presbytery of Lanark gave in their report in the following terms :—

Minutes, Lanark Presbytery, Report on

The subscribed Committee appointed by Synod to examine the minutes of the Presbytery of Lanark, since last meeting of Synod, have to report that the business transacted is unquestionably stated with faithfulness, yet there were certain peculiarities in the procedure which Presbytery, strictly interpreted, cannot sustain, but which in the circumstances (one minister only being left) could not be avoided.

Mr. Gibson, by request, engaged in prayer, and the benediction being pronounced by the Moderator, the Synod adjourned, to meet again at 2 o'clock.

June 16, 1859, 2 o'clock, P.M.

The Synod met, and was constituted by the Rev. Mr. Ormiston, Moderator.

The Roll was called, and the minutes of last Sederunt were read, and, with some amendments, were sustained.

Entered on the consideration of the Mission business, postponed in the morning. Took up the Report of the Mission Committee.

Mission business.

Thanks to Com. On motion, the thanks of the Synod were tendered to the Committee on Missions, and especially to the Convener, for the able and elaborate report presented last evening.

Preachers' Returns, motion. In reply to a question in the Report respecting Returns of Preachers,

It was moved by Mr. Logie, seconded by Mr. Cross:—

That Presbyteries be required simply to furnish the Convener of the Mission Committee with an abstract of the services and receipts of preachers within their bounds, each half year, at the close of the months of June and December.

2. It was moved in amendment by Mr. Dewar, seconded by Mr. Moffatt:—

That the present law on the subject be continued, but that a Committee be appointed to examine the whole constitution and business of the Mission Committee, and report to next Synod.

3. It was moved in further amendment by Mr. Duff, seconded by Mr. Dick:—

That the present system remain as it is.

Decision. These different motions being put to vote, the amendment of Mr. Duff was successively preferred to that of Mr. Dewar and to the motion of Mr. Logie; and the Synod did and do decide in terms thereof:—That the present system continue as it is.

Paym'ts to Preachers ought to be equal. It was stated in the Report that there were great differences in the amount contributed by congregations to different preachers. The Convener inquired if anything could be done to remedy this, and, as far as possible, to equalize the amounts paid by congregations to preachers officiating among them.

Recommendation The Synod agreed to recommend, and do hereby recommend to Presbyteries, to urge upon congregations the duty of paying equal sums to preachers who may labour among them, in proportion to the services rendered.

Cambray & Manilla complaint. On the matter of complaint against the committee in the case of Cambray and Manilla,—It was moved by Mr. Logie, seconded by Mr. Thornton, and

Resolved,—That the Synod approve of the course of the Com-

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mittee of Missions in delaying to answer the application for supplement to these congregations.

The recommendation of the Committee to discontinue the services of Mr. Fraser, as a Catechist, was then taken up.

Catechist Mr Fraser, proposal to discontinue.

It was moved by Mr. Fotheringham, seconded by Mr. Inglis:—

That the recommendation of the Committee in reference to Mr. Fraser, be not adopted.

It was moved in amendment by Mr. Logie, seconded by Mr. Smith, elder:—

That the Synod, whilst appreciating the reasons which led to the recommendation of the Mission Committee, yet in view of the value of Mr. Fraser's labours as a Catechist, agree to continue his services.

A vote being taken, the amendment was carried by a large majority, and the Synod decided in terms thereof.

Mr Fraser's services continued

The Convener of the Mission Committee having inquired if the Statistics should be published:—It was moved by Logie, seconded by Mr. Whillans, elder:—

Statistics, not in on.

That the Report on Statistics be published, and that Presbyteries be enjoined to take all proper steps to see that the law of Synod be attended to.

It was moved in amendment by Mr. Thornton, seconded by Mr. Duff:—

That Presbyteries be enjoined to insist upon prompt attention to the regulations of Synod in regard to the Statistical Reports, and to demand from the Office-bearers of Congregations, reasons, in every instance of neglect.

It was moved in further amendment by Mr. King, seconded by Mr. James:—

That the Synod enjoin the Clerks of Presbyteries to return within a month from this time, the Statistics of Congregations within their bounds, which have been withheld; and that the Committee publish the Statistics thus furnished along with those already in their hands.

It was moved in further amendment by Mr. Drummond, seconded by Mr. Dunbar:—

That in consequence of the imperfect returns, the Statistics of 1858 be not published.

Decision on Statistics.

A vote was taken, and the amendment of Mr. Thornton was preferred to all the others, and the Synod did and do decide in terms thereof:—

That Presbyteries be enjoined to insist upon prompt attention to the regulations of Synod in regard to the Statistical Reports; and to demand from the Office-bearers of Congregations, reasons, in every instance of neglect.

Audit Report.

The Committee appointed to examine the Accounts of the Synod's Treasurer, reported that they had found the accounts correct.

Adjourned, to meet again at 7 o'clock.

Closed with the benediction.

That the Rev. Andrew Ferrier, D. D., Caledonia, having published a series of excellent papers on "United Presbyterian Church History," embracing a full and faithful account of the denominations out of which that Church was formed, and in one of which his Fathers occupied from its origin, so distinguished a place, the Synod regarding these papers as highly creditable to the author, and eminently fitted to promote the cause of sound, scriptural, ecclesiastical polity, as well as of pure and undefiled religion, unanimously agree to tender him their most respectful and cordial thanks; and the Synod cannot but indulge the hope that this History, if presented in a collected form, might long continue to be blessed as a means for advancing ends so important.

The Committee appointed yesterday, on the case of Mr. Carruthers, submitted by the Distribution Committee, gave in their report in terms following:—The Committee appointed to report in reference to Mr. Carruthers have to state that, owing to peculiar circumstances in which Providence has placed him, disqualifying him, meanwhile, for any ministerial labours, they feel it dutiful to recommend that should he be again restored to health, he should not be placed on the list of Probationers, but that should he be considered, by any Presbytery within whose bounds he may, for the time being, reside, fit for Missionary labours, said Presbyteries may, as they see cause, give him appointments within their bounds. The Report was adopted, and the Synod decided in terms thereof.

Mr. Carruthers, Preacher, delivered on his case.

On motion, the Committee on Union was then re-appointed, consisting of the Rev. Dr. William Taylor, the Rev. Dr. Jennings, the Revs. Messrs. Skinner, Proudfoot, Kennedy, Thornton, Ormiston, Gibson, Aitken, together with Messrs. Lunn, Young, and Robertson, elders. Dr. Taylor to be Convener.

Ministers' reception of, Law of Synod

Took up the report given in yesterday by the Committee on the amendment of the Synodical law on the reception of ministers and Probationers, (the consideration of which was deferred,) of the following purport, that is to say:—

The Committee on the Synod's law for the reception of ministers and preachers, beg respectfully to report that they recommend that all existing regulations on that subject be cancelled, and that the Synod enact as follows:—

1. That when a Student is regularly licensed by a Presbytery of his Church, he shall receive an extract of his license, and that on his presenting this within six months of its date to the Committee of Distribution, together with a request to be put on the list of Probationers, he shall immediately be put on that list, and shall receive appointments accordingly; but that if the application be not made till after the expiry of six months, it shall not be complied with, unless accompanied with a recommendation by the Presbytery within the bounds of which he has chiefly residing the interval.

2. That a minister of this Church demitting his pastoral charge shall be placed on the list of Probationers, on his presenting to the Committee of Distribution, within six months of his leaving his charge, a request to that effect, together with a recommendation from the Presbytery receiving his demission.

3. That a Minister or Preacher having a recommendation from the Mission Board in Scotland, on presenting said recommendation within six months of its date to the Committee of Distribution shall immediately be placed on the list of Probationers.

4. That with regard to all other classes of Ministers and

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Preachers, and such as have not complied with the above conditions, a Committee of Synod shall be appointed to whom the cases shall be submitted: that said Committee shall meet on the call of the Convener, but not oftener than four times in the year; that they shall examine the credentials and professional qualifications of applicants, and that if they are unanimous in recommending an applicant, he shall immediately be placed on the list of Probationers, but if not unanimous, the case shall be referred to the Synod, and that from all decisions of the Committee an appeal shall lie to the Synod.

It was moved by Mr. James, seconded by Mr. Thornton, that the Report be adopted. Motion to adopt.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Synod rose, to meet at two o'clock.

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the case, through Messrs. Thornton and King. Mr. T. J. Scott was heard in reply. Questions were put to the Presbytery of Durham, and were answered. A question was then put to Mr. Scott and answered.

The parties were then removed, and the Synod proceeded to deliberate. Scott against the procedure and decision of Durham Presbytery, in the case of the Rev. John Scott's complaint, agree to dismiss the protest and appeal as ill founded. parties removed. It was moved in amendment by Mr. Watson, seconded by Mr. Baird,—That the Synod finds that the Presbytery of Durham, has not taken sufficient care to lead evidence of the truth of the charges preferred against the Mr. Thomas J. Scott, yet as the decision of the Presbytery does not contain any judicial sentence, but only such admonition as to this Synod seems to have been called for, agrees to dismiss the appeal. Amendment.

A vote being taken, the motion of Mr. Logie, was carried by a majority, and the Synod did, and do decide in terms thereof, to dismiss the protest and appeal as ill founded. Decision.

The Moderator intimated the decision of Synod to the parties.

APPENDIX.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON UNION.

To the Rev. the Moderator, and Members of the Synod of the United Presbyterian Church, to meet in Toronto, on the 13th day of June, 1859, the Committee on Union beg to report:—

That in following out the instructions given to them at last meeting of Synod, they requested that a joint meeting of your Committee and the Committee appointed by the Presbyterian Church of Canada, might take place. Said meeting was held in Toronto, August 18, 1858, and after much deliberation, articles were unanimously adopted by both Committees as a Doctrinal Basis for the Union of the two Churches; and it was agreed that they should be presented to their respective Synods for their approval.

These articles were printed, and copies sent to all the Ministers and Sessions, with a request that they should report on them, to the Convener of this Committee, with as little delay as possible, in order to determine whether a special meeting of Synod, as was at one time suggested, should be called in October, to decide upon them.—The number of reports which the Convener received up to that date was so small, and opinion so much divided respecting the propriety of calling a special meeting of Synod, that it was not thought expedient to request the Moderator to summon one. So that the whole question now remains for the action of this Court in the state in which it is presented in the findings of the Joint Committee.

A tabular statement of the replies received from Presbyteries and Congregations is presented along with this Report; from which it will be seen that replies have been received from four Presbyteries and thirty-eight Congregations. Of these, the Presbyteries of Flamboro' and Canada East, approved of the Articles as a Basis of Union, the Presbytery of Brant approves upon the whole, and the Presbytery of Wellington disapproves. Of the Congregations, 21 approve of the Articles as a Basis of Union, 6 approve on the whole, 6 would have other conditions added, and 5 disapprove. This gives a very large majority in favour of Union, so far as the Reports go.

Your Committee are again happy to have it in their power to report that throughout the anxious and protracted meetings of the Joint Committees, the utmost harmony and good feeling prevailed, with scarcely an exception. They would look upon this as a token from God for good; and judging from this, and from the strong desire for Union expressed in the replies that have been received from Presbyteries and Congregations, they indulge the hope that this most important question is now in such a state that it may be satisfactorily disposed of by this Synod, and our negotiations brought to that happy issue which the Church earnestly desires.

BASIS OF UNION.

BASIS OF UNION WITH THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF CANADA, ADOPTED BY THE SYNOD OF THE UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA, ON THE SIXTEENTH DAY OF JUNE, ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND FIFTY-NINE YEARS:

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I *Of Holy Scripture*—That the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments, being the inspired Word of God, are the supreme and infallible rule of faith and life.

II *Of the Subordinate Standards*.—That the Westminster Confession of Faith, with the Larger and Shorter Catechisms, are received by this Church as her subordinate Standards.

But whereas certain sections of the said Confession of Faith, which treat of the power or duty of the Civil Magistrate, have been objected to, as teaching principles adverse both to the right of private judgment in religious matters, and to the prerogatives which Christ has vested in His Church, it is to be understood:—

1. That no interpretation, or reception of these sections is held by this Church, which would interfere with the fullest forbearance as to any differences of opinion which may prevail on the question of the endowment of the Church by the State.

2. That no interpretation, or reception of these sections is required by this Church, which would accord to the State any authority to violate that liberty of conscience and right of private judgment, which are asserted in chap. xx. sec. 2, of the Confession; and in accordance with the statements, of which this Church holds, that every person ought to be at full liberty to search the Scriptures for himself, and to follow out what he conscientiously believes to be the teaching of Scripture, without let or hindrance.¶

3. That no interpretation or reception of these sections is required by this Church, which would admit of any interference on the part of the state with the spiritual independence of the Church, as set forth in chap. xxx of the Confession.

III *Of the Headship of Christ over the Church*—That the Lord Jesus Christ is the only King and Head of His Church; That He has made her free from all external or secular authority in the administration of her affairs, and that she is bound to assert and defend this liberty to the utmost, and ought not to enter into such engagements with any party as would be prejudicial thereto.

IV *Of the Headship of Christ over the Nations, and the Duty of the Civil Magistrate*. That the Lord Jesus Christ, as Mediator, is invested with universal sovereignty, and is therefore King of Nations, and that all men, in every capacity and relation, are bound to obey His will as revealed in His Word; and particularly, that the Civil Magistrate (including under that term, all who are in any way concerned in the Legislative or Administrative action of the state,) is bound to regulate his official procedure, as well as his personal conduct, by the revealed will of Christ.*

V *Of Church Government*—That the system of polity exhibited in the Westminster Form of Presbyterian Church Government, in so far as it declares a plurality of Elders for each congregation, the official equality of Presbyters who minister in word and doctrine, without any officers in the Church, in due subordination of a smaller part to a larger, and of a larger to the whole, is the Government of this Church, and is, in the general features of it therein set forth, believed by this Church to be founded on, and agreeable to the word of God.

VI *Of Worship*—That the ordinances of worship shall be administered in this Church as they have heretofore been, by the respective bodies of which it is composed, in a general accordance with the directions contained in the Westminster Directory of Worship.

¶ The Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada have made the following additions to this Clause:—“Provided that no one is allowed, under pretext of following the dictates of conscience, to interfere with the peace and good order of Society.”

*Note.—That the article having relation to Christ's Headship over the nations, and the duty of the Civil Magistrate has always been, and is, one of the things most surely believed and most firmly maintained by the United Presbyterian Church, while, at the same time, it has constantly and carefully guarded against the practical inference drawn from it by some, that Christ, as King of Nations, delegates his power to earthly Kings—that they are in any sense his vicegerents, or that magisterial interference in matters purely of a religious nature is a medium through which Christ exercises the authority with which, as King of Nations, he is invested.—NOTE.—The Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, have in the Basis adopted by them, struck out this note appended to the 4th Article by the United Presbyterian Synod.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION.

The Committee on Theological Education, beg respectfully to report as follows: The Session of the Divinity Hall commenced on Tuesday, 19th October. All the members were present. The Rev. the Moderator of Synod occupied the chair. After singing and reading the Scriptures, prayer was offered up by the Rev. Mr. Thornton. An address was given from the chair. The Rev. Dr. Taylor read his Introductory Lecture. The Rev. Mr. Ormiston delivered an address; and the Rev. Dr. Burns of Knox College, at the request of the chairman, concluded with prayer. Fourteen students entered the Hall, viz: of the fourth year, Messrs. William Donald, Robert Hall, Robert Hume, B. A., and William McWilliam.—Of the third year, Messrs. James Hanran, George Irving, John Turnbull, and Joseph White.—Of the second year, Messrs. Peter Goodfellow, and James Milligan.—Of the first year, Messrs. Alexander McNaughton, James Malcolm, William Thomson Murdoch, and William Richardson. These students who attended the preceding Session, and had not completed their course, were absent from the Hall last Session; and the Committee have learnt that one of them has connected himself with another denomination.

The Sub-Committee for Examination have given in the following Report:

“Toronto, 30th Nov., 1858.—The Examiners met,—The Rev. R. H. Thornton in the chair,—and proceeded to estimate the Examination Papers given in by the students. These Papers had been written, as usual, at meetings held for the purpose, when the questions were simultaneously proposed. Dr. Taylor stated that one of the students on account of severe domestic affliction, had not been able to attend all these meetings, but had afterwards written his papers in Dr. Taylor's house, all the conditions being observed as strictly as possible. The Examiners, while deeming it of importance that the regulations should be rigidly adhered to, agreed, in the circumstances stated, to accept of these papers. After careful consideration, it was resolved to arrange the students in the following order of merit, viz: Of the fourth year, Mr. McWilliam, Messrs. Donald and Hume who are bracketed, Mr. Hall.—Of the third year, Messrs. Hanran and Turnbull, who are bracketed, Mr. White, Mr. Irving.—Of the second year, Mr. Milligan, Mr. Goodfellow.—Of the first year, Mr. Murdoch, Mr. Malcolm, Mr. Richardson, Mr. McNaughton. Those bracketed are regarded as so nearly equal, that no attempt is made to distinguish them. Of the fourteen students, eleven applied for Exhibitions, and £10 was awarded to each. The Examiners found a great diversity of merit among the students. Some exhibited highly commendable attainments, others fell considerably short; and though the Examiners still refrain from taking any step affecting the standing of any of the students, they must express their sense of the importance of respectable proficiency being aimed at, and attained, by all who mean to apply for license in our church.

The Committee beg to say, that, while they entertain no doubt that the examinations were judiciously and faithfully conducted, and that correct results were obtained, it is proper to be kept in mind that the attainments of the students, at the time of their admission, differed very widely; that some students, on account of constitutional peculiarities, and from habit, fail to do themselves justice under examination; that the range of subjects for examination is wide, and that the Examiners found their estimate on a consideration of the aggregate whole, so that students who stand low, may have acquitted themselves creditably in particular departments, and may, perhaps, prove popular and useful preachers, though certainly it is, in many points of view, exceedingly important that only men of respectable acquirements should be licensed for the ministry.

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months, amounts to £132 1s.; and after deducting £110 paid as Exhibitions, there remained £22 1s. The Committee have received from the Congregation of Madrid £3 17s 6d.; of Chatham \$4 15s.; of Gould Street, Toronto, £20; of Newton £13; and of Harwich, additional £1. William Dunbar, Esq., Dunbarton, and Thomas Sandilands, Esq., Guelph, have each paid the sum of £10, and Mr. Tisdell, Preacher, has re-paid the sum of £11 which he had received as an Exhibition while a student, in all £73 2s. 6d., making with the £22 1s. formerly mentioned, a total of £95 3s. 6d. The Committee feel grateful to these contributors, especially to the individuals who generously give an Exhibition annually. They also appreciate the honourable feeling of Mr. Tisdell, in repaying his Exhibition; but they do not regard those who go forward to license as under any obligation to refund. It will be observed that the balance on hand, together with the two annual Exhibitions paid by individuals, and calculating on £11 from the Congregation of Paris, is rather too small to enable the Committee to give the Exhibitions which might probably be applied for at the commencement of next Session. It is for the Synod to adopt the course which to its wisdom shall seem proper; but the Committee deem it of importance that the students should be made aware whether Exhibitions may be expected, as on that point, the return of some of them to the Hall may very likely depend.

There was last year a balance of 19s. 3½d. belonging to the Library. From that there has been paid 12s. 4d. for the last volume of a set formerly purchased, leaving a balance of 6s. 11½d.

The close of the Session of the Divinity Hall, took place on Thursday, 14th April. There were present of the Committee, the Rev. Messrs. Thornton, Dick, Kennedy, Torrance, and Dr. Taylor. Mr. Kennedy presided. After singing, Mr. Dick offered up prayer. Dr. Taylor read his concluding Lecture. Mr. Thornton delivered an address. The Chairman also gave a short address. Mr. Torrance led in prayer, and the meeting was closed with singing and the benediction.

During the Session the students were examined in Systematic Divinity, on Dick's Lectures from the 54th to the 79th, both inclusive. In Greek they read critically John's Gospel, chapter iii.; and the Epistle to the Hebrews from the beginning to chapter x., verse 19th. They read also, more cursorily, the whole of the remaining practical portion of the Epistle. In Hebrew they read the 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th and 9th chapters of Genesis, and some selected passages from other Books, together with the corresponding portions of the Septuagint. In Church History, the subject of examination was the 11th, 12th, 13th, 14th and 15th centuries in Mosheim's work. Each student delivered one discourse, and gave in three written exercises on subjects prescribed. Dr. Taylor bore testimony to the good conduct of the students during the Session, and the diligence with which, generally, they had prosecuted their studies. It was matter of gratitude also that, as in former winter Sessions, all connected with the Hall had enjoyed excellent health, with slight exceptions.

The Committee are persuaded that all enlightened and earnest members of the Church must feel deeply interested in the Hall. Its general condition is just ground for congratulation; and it is hoped the Synod will be anxious to make every effort for its maintenance and improvement. The Church, too, it is hoped, will not cease to present fervent prayer to God that His blessing may more and more largely descend on the institution, and that it may yield a supply of able and faithful Ministers, not only to fill the places which, in the course of Providence, become vacant, but also to extend the boundaries of the Church into the regions beyond, where there is still a famine of the word of the Lord.
