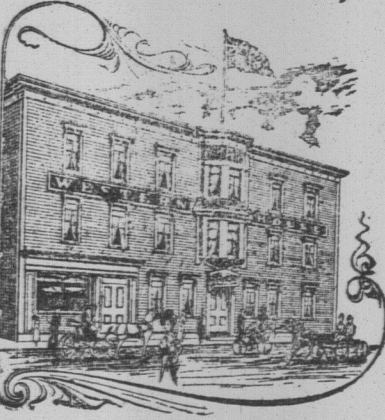

TUBERCULOSIS EXHIBITION

Tuberculosis exhibitions have been held recently in New York and Montreal. The object of these exhibitions is to teach the public the nature of tuberculosis and to illustrate the best methods of prevention and cure. Much good should result from the illustration given of the importance of maintaining sanitary conditions—cleanliness, pure air, wholesome food, etc. Regarding the exhibition in Montreal "The Witness" says: "It was the best of educative work. Children attended in great numbers and were taught what the 'white plague' really is, how to lie so as to escape it, and how it may be cured. One of the best missions of the exhibition was its inculcation of right living—cleanliness, simple, wholesome fare, good habits. Even if nothing else had been done, this would be a most excellent thing and justify all the time and trouble taken. Against the habit of spitting, the children have now learned three things—that it is hurtful and dangerous; that it is offensive to others, and in very bad taste; and that it is quite unnecessary. In the coming generation, therefore, we may hope to have this disgusting practice very largely diminished, if not eliminated. Would that more could be done with the present adult population. Everywhere, in our street cars and on our streets, and in public places no heed is taken to warnings and threatened penalties, and spitting is the rule rather than the exception."

BRITISH AND BOERS FRATERNIZE

On the day when the South African convention began its work at Durban, Natal, the mayor and corporation welcomed the delegates officially. Some 3,000 people filled the town hall long before the advertised hour on a far from cool morning, and when the delegates went on the platform they were cheered again and again. I do not know which was the prettier—the crowds cordial cries of "Boha!" "Speech!" "Speech!" or the Transvaal prime minister looking like a happy schoolboy as he acknowledged this characteristically British tribute in perhaps the most British town in South Africa. Dr. Jameson, who is now a warm friend of Gen. Botha's, ran him a close race for the place of public favorite. Gen. de Wet is become as familiar a figure in the streets of Durban in the capacity of a peaceful delegate, with much the wildest pair of trousers that ever man has worn, as some of his followers once prophesied he would be in quite another capacity. The mere bringing together of the delegates is having an excellent effect both on them and on the people of Durban.—Manchester Guardian.

In the United States fiscal year 1907 the treasury of that country had \$85,236,586 receipts over disbursements. But the figures for the fiscal year 1908 are not so good, for the disbursements exceeded the receipts by \$38,070,201. As however, the secretary had at the beginning of that year an available cash balance to his credit of \$274,061,445, it is not likely that the 1908 conditions will give him sleepless nights.
