Resolved, To express the thanks of this Association to the people of Parrsboro' for their kind hospitality.

Resolved, That this Association send an expression of their sympathy and love through their Secretary to Rev. Samuel Thompson.

Also Resolved, That a tangible expression of this be given by taking a collection.

The sum of \$14 was then cheerfully contributed.

On motion, any of our brethren attending other Associations be our delegates.

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Report on Sabbath Schools.

Your Committee on Sabbath Schools respectfully report that they regard the institution of the Sabbath School as being one of grand importance, and therefore should occupy a much wider place in the Association. Next to the religious family it is the most efficient auxiliary the church has to guide the young into the ways of peace and safety, and consequently the Sabbath School has a most momentous bearing on its present efficiency and future triumph. In view of this fact, it becomes a question for serious consideration whether the time has not arrived when the Sabbath School should be more fully recognized as an integral portion of the work of the church to be sustained and fostered, to be supported and controlled by it, and thus the church make itself directly responsible for whatever of success or failure may accrue, instead of holding aloof from it as though it were an independent force.

As the object of the Sabbath School is to learn the way of salvation and duty to God and man through study of the Bible, your Committee believe that great care should be taken in the selection of teachers whose hearts and lives are pious. We believe the spiritual prosperity and enlargement in the Sabbath School depend much on the character of those employed as teachers. How can one teach whas he does not know? And how can he apply to others what he has never applied to himself? Your Committee would therefore recommend that our churches select, so far as possible, those who have a Christian experience, and whose lives are consistent and

Christian, to instruct the young in the ways of wisdom and truth, salvation and holiness in our Sabbath Schools. It is the opinion of your Committee that the church should also appoint the superintendent and teachers in a Conference of the church.

Your Committee also believe that the time has come when all the members of the church professing godliness should manifest a deeper interest in the work of the Sabbath School by their presence, prayers and sympathy than has been witnessed in the past. The work of the Sabbath School, like all other Christian work, claims the hearty co-operation of the entire church.

In conclusion, your Committee would urge the necessity upon all the churches that have schools connected with them to provide for their schools a good, sound religious literature. To this end we would recommend to their favorable consideration and patronage our Baptist Tract and Book Room in Halifax.

Report on Missions.

The cause of Missions is the cause of God. In the work of the Divine Redeemer was embodied the two great departments of Mission work,-Home and Foreign. These are not two but one, interwoven with and interdependent upon each other. The Christlike character of individuals, churches and denominations consists in the harmonious blending of both. To be indifferent to the cause of Missions is to be unlike Him, who came to seek and save that which was lost - to be disobedient to the great command, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature."

It is to us a source of gratification that both departments of the work are engaging the earnest prayerful attention of our denomination. During the past year on the Home field, General Missionaries have been constantly employed in visiting destitute localities and assisting churches. Fields have been so grouped and arranged that constant supply has been secured, and a number of fields have been supplied by Student Missionaries. The work done by the Home Mission Board in this matter has secured the approbation of the denomination, and a rich blessing from God. We believe that never before has so great a work been performed, and that never before has God more richly blessed.

Many large and important fields lie vacant; ground that should be occupied by us is not reached on account of want of men and means. God is placing before us in the Home field great opportunities of usefulness. Let us not be disobedient to the heavenly vision.

On the Foreign field Brother and Sister Hutchinson, Brother and Sister Archibald, and Sisters Wright and Gray have diligently toiled. and not without results. Slowly it may be, but surely, the work goes on, and evidence is constantly afforded that the foundations of heathenism are crumbling, and the final triumph of Christianity rapidly approaching.

Brother and Sister Sandford and Brother and Sister Churchi'l are still with us, and have done good work in visiting the churches, diffusing Missionary information, and awakening a deeper interest in the world's evangelization. They return in a few weeks to their fields of labour, accompanied by Bro. Harrington. We trust that all may have the sympathies and prayers of God's people. In the words of Carey. "The mine is deep, brethren, hold the ropes."

Although death has not visited any of our Missionaries, we mourn

with the Canadian and American Boards over the death of Brethren Currie and George, with whom so many of us had the pleasure of a personal acquaintance. They fell on the field, and have entered into their reward. To the bereaved families we tender our sincere sympathy, and pray that the God of the widow and fatherless may make them the special objects of his care.

With fields home and foreign whitening to the harvest, it becomes us to enter more vigourously than ever the great field, and with enlarged contributions, more fervent prayer and deeper sympath, manifest to the world how deeply we are interested in the world's

evangelization.

Report on Denominational Literature.

Your Committee beg to report that we view with thankfulness the steady growth of our agencies for the dissemination of our denominational influence. The business of our Book Room is slowly but steadily increasing. We would respectfully urge that our churches and Sabbath Schools and our people generally patronize our Book Room as much as possible, since it is prepared to furnish everything necessary as cheaply and of as good quality as can be procured elsewhere.

Your Committee think that we, as a people, should assist as much as lies in our power the Colportage work of the Book and Tract Society.

We are rejoiced to know that the subscription list of the Messenger and Visitor is rapidly growing, and that it has reached the goodly number of 6,240. Believing that the influence of the paper under its present skilful management is very great in the direction of furthering our interests as a denomination we earnestly trust that every Baptist family will soon be in receipt of its weekly visits, and to this end we would urge with all earnestness upon our people the claims of what we believe to be an exceedingly valuable addition to our denominational literature.

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Report on Finance.

Your Committee beg léave to recommend the propriety of heartily co-operating with the Finance Agent appointed by the Convention in working up the Convention plan, and would further recommend that the Association be divided into districts, each county constituting a district, and that the pastors of each district be a committee to correspond with the churches in their county and hold public meetings where our denominational objects may be brought affectionately and intelligently before our people, and where collections will be taken for the Convention plan, and systematic giving instituted for charches that are not now giving systematically, the funds to be sent to the Finance Agent of the Convention. Your Committee recommend that the oldest pastor in each district be the chairman of the committee in his county, (viz.: the pastor who has been settled in the county for the longest time), and that the Finance Agent be asked to tabulate a statement of funds raised within the bounds of this Association, that it may be presented to the body at its next session.

Report on Canso Matters.

Your Committee appointed to consider the difficulty in the Baptist Church at Cape Canso, beg to submit the following report:—

Your Committee regret exceedingly the existence of serious difficulties in one of the oldest churches in this Association, caused by unwise and injudicious exercise of church discipline, which has produced a sad condition of affairs in a once prosperous church.

We have full confidence in the brethren composing the Council (ex parti so called), and regret that the action taken by the church prevented it from being a mutual Council.

We recommend that the letter from the church to the Association be read, and also the letter from certain aggreeved brethren.

We recommend the appointment of a committee of three brethren to go to Canso and effect reconciliation if possible, and report to the Association next year.

Report on Education.

Your Committee would draw the attention of parents and guardians to the institution at Wolfville.

The College is doing good work. The training of young people is painstaking and thorough. It is the aim of the governing body to impart a solid rather than a superficial education. While not able, on account of limitations imposed by want of adequate resources, to provide as many chairs as in this day are deemed necessary, on the whole, the College presents as wide a range of studies as other universities have had where the countries were under similar conditions. A young country cannot have an old college. Endowments are the growth of years, and of centuries. At the same time, your Committee see that much may be done in an advanced

direction. We of the present must do our share to make the college worthy of patronage by the generation now rising. There is one step which we conceive might be taken to facilitate progress in the direction indicated. It is well known that on account of the existing system of scholarships, but a small income is received from tuition fees. These fees are charged in similar institutions, while we are obliged to content ourselves with an imaginary revenue from monies long since subscribed in the form of scholarships. would respectfully suggest to the Board of Governors that the time has arrived when those who are able to pay their class-fees should pay at the same rate as in other institutions. Our wealthier people surely will be willing to pay for value received in this as in every-thing else. We believe that the indications are, that it will be impossible to keep open the privileges of the College much longer on such free terms.

Our academies, male and female, are in a prosperous condition. They have had during the year past a larger average attendance than in any previous term. The outlook for the next year is bright. A large class have matriculated for college. Miss Wadsworth, a lady of good record from the United States, has been appointed principal of the Seminary. Your Committee would gratefully make a note of the fact that the religious interest which has from the beginning characterized our efforts in the higher education, continues unabated. There have been several baptisms during the year. The students have "gone round about the villages preaching," while

a missionary spirit is cultivated among themselves.

Your Committee trust that the connection always maintained between the people and these institutions may still be kept as close as possible. "The churches cannot flourish without the college, while, on the other hand, the college must depend upon the churches." We would recommend these schools, with their prochurches." We would recommend these schools, with their professors and teachers, to the patronage of our people. Do not put your children in jeopardy by sending them to institutions whose spirit is utterly alien to the principles of the New Testament. Support your own. Give them your entire sympathy. Let your prayers daily ascend for their welfare. Give, beyond the mere fees asked for tuition, of your substance, in order that these schools may be equipped for all the demands of an advancing age. Fifty years have well nigh passed since our College opened her doors to all, without any test, save that of the love of learning. The denomination has increased in intelligence, in wealth, in numbers, and in nation has increased in intelligence, in wealth, in numbers, and in true piety. Let our people make a substantial return to mark the jubilee of the founding of the College.

Finally, your Committee would call renewed attention to the fact that the Baptists of the Dominion have, by the generosity of the Hon. Mr. McMaster, a Theological Seminary adequate to the needs of our students for the ministry. Some little has been left for the people to contribute in aid of the young men studying there; and we would suggest that, at the proper time, there be a compliance on the part of the churches with the recommendation of the Convention, that a collection be taken up to assist in defray-

ing some necessary expenses by the students.

Report on Obituaries.

REV. GEO. ARMSTRONG, D.D.,

Resolved, Ti liquor traffic i successful spr foreign missio to suppress t legitimate me terrible busin and ample pr ledged curse. Was born in Ireland, Dec. 5th, 1814; brought, when an infant, by his parents to St. John's. N.F., where they continued till his 16th year; then removed with them to Sydney, C.B., where, three years after, he was converted, and was in the following year baptized by Rev Dr. Crawley. Studied at Horton Academy and Acadia College, where he graduated June, 1844. He was ordained at Port Medway in 1848; was subsequently pastor at Chester; became in 1854 pastor at Bridgetown, and so continued for 20 years; then was pastor at Sydney for two years; was editor of the Christian Visitor for three years. He also was pastor at Kentville, and at the time of his death had just assumed the pastorate at Hawkesbury, C.B. Such is the summary of the life and work of a good brother, who was well known throughout the churches of this Association. Bro. A.'s genial manners made him a general favorite. He held the principles of the new Testament, in all things endeavoring 'to show himself an example of good works; in his doctrine showing uncorruptness, gravity, sound speech, that cannot be condemned." For many years his brethren honored him by a seat upon the boards of the denomination. and in all the great questions under their purview he took a hearty interest.

Our beloved brother was called upon suddenly:

"At midnight came the cry, He started up to hear A mortal arrow pierced his frame, He fell, but felt no fear."

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On the 7th of June, 1886, he passed over the river to join the great host of the servants of God in heaven. The remains were carried to Bridgetown, where "devout men carried him to his burial and made great lamentation over him." Bro. A. was twice married and leaves several children, one of whom is the Rev. J. J. Armstrong.

REV. WILLIAM GEORGE

Was a native of Berwick, N. S., where he was baptized in 1858 by Rev. E. M. Saunders, D.D. He was ordained at Little River, Cumberland Co., Nov. 28th, 1865. In the following year, when retiring from the anniversary exercises at Acadia College in June his wife and sister were drowned in the Basin of Minas, near Partridge Island, while attempting to land in an unseaworthy boat. He himself barely escaped with his life. He then determined to obey the call of God which he had hitherto resisted, to go to the foreign field. some time spent at Acadia College, in 1869 he was accepted by the Board of Foreign Missions, and was sent to Henthadah, Burmah, to labor in connection with the American Baptist Missionary Union. On the inauguration of the Independent Foreign Mission by the Convention, Bro. George was transferred to the control of the American Union, in whose service he continued till his death. Previous to his setting out for the East he married Miss Oressa Lowe, daughter of Deacon Moses Lowe, of Amherst. After laboring some years in Henthadah, in loving fellowship with the late Rev. A. R. R. Crawley, he organized a new station at Zeegone. He was very

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successful here, much of his strength being expended in jungle work, and many of the natives being won to Christ. In 1879 he returned, accompanied by Mrs. George and family, to this country, and took up his residence in Amherst. Here he labored in conjunction with the pastor, rendering much valuable aid. In 1882 Mr. and Mrs. G. again went to Burmah, where he continued his labors until the 3rd of July, 1886, when his health being completely shattered he was compelled to abandon the field. By medical advice he left for Calcutta, where he was placed in the hospital, and steadily sank till the 3rd of August, when he was removed to a higher sphere. He had just completed his 50th year.

Mr. George was physically a large man, his mental endowments good, his spiritual forces strong. While he was above the average as a preacher he was essentially a Missionary, always ready to go to the houses of the people to engage them about their souls. Many in this Association will remember his warm appeals, and his efforts to lead them in the way of life. "The memory of the just is blessed." Better to die young laboring for the welfare of the heathen, and to lie in a far distant grave, than to spend a long life at home in attaining mere worldly success.

"Go to the grave; at noon from labor cease;
Rest on thy sheaves; thy harvest task is done;
Come from the heat of battle, and in peace
Soldier, go home; with thee the fight is won."
