# EMBARGO PLACED ON GREEK SHIPS IN BR PORTS: ROUMANIA ABOUT TO ENTER CONFLICT?

No Greek Vessels, Except Those Loading or Already Loaded Will Be CROWDS SING THE Permitted to Leave British Ports---Shipments to Greece From French Ports Forbidden---Roumania War Minister Authorized to Requisition All Supplies Necessary for National Defence and Tradesmen Ordered to STREETS OF ATHENS Furnish Inventory of Goods on Hand.

Della Sera says that the official cree authorizing the Minister of war to requisition immediately all things and materials necessary to the national defence, the articles. enumerated comprising metals, wearing apparel, medicines, cloth, machines for military supply factories, craft of all kind for river triffic, rallway material and combustibles. Tradesmen are required to declare what they possess of these things and also of other prime necessities.

This is taken, says the newspaper, as an indication that Roumania sees the impossibility of maintaining her neutrality much longer.

Paris, Nov. 17.—A Havas despatch from Marseilles says the government has ordered the port authorities to accept no further shipments of merchandise destined for Greece.



Field Marshal Putnik, who is Chief of the General Staff of the Serbian army, is one of the ablest strategists of Europe. His title is really that of "Voivode," which carries the same rank in the Serbian military organization as does that of Field Marshal in other nations. He is a veteran of many wars, having participated in the conflicts which have taken place in the Near East in the last forty years. For eleven months this veteran commander kept his country free from foreign foes, and in that time he reorganized his forces and prepared for the greater struggle which it was clear would come when the Germans sent their huge cannon and solid phalanxes against the Serbians.

It is understood that information is now being gathered to aid the department in destermining whether there has been a conspiracy in restraint of foreign commerce, such as to justify presentation to a federal grand jury.

Department of Justice officials always have expressed doubt of the possibility of convicting Fay and his associates under the so-called piracy sections of the criminal code, under which they recently were indicted. The recent trip of District Attorney Marshall to Washington is understood to have been for the purpose of deciding upon indictments under another section of that code.

London, Nov. 17.—The British hospi-tal ship Anglia was sunk by a mine in the English Channel today. Three hun-dred men were saved out of a total of

A statement issued by the official press bureau gave the news of the disaster. It is said that of the thirteen officers and 372 men on board the Anglia 300 had been saved.

The Anglia was a merchantman which was taken over by the British admiralty after the opening of the war and refitted as a hospital ship. She was commissioned in August of last year.

There are four British steamships named Anglia. The one converted into a hospital ship probably is the former London and Northwestern Railway steamer, of 1,862 tons gross. She is 29 feet long and was built in 1900 at Dumbarton. The other three steamers are small vessels.

At the time she was commissioned the Anglia was in charge of Commander V. De Salge, retired.

Coroner Roberts conducts inquest in police court

last night

The enquiry into the cause of the death of L. A. Comman was held last evening in the court house before Coroner Roberts. After the evidence the fury went out and had not returned at 230 celock this morning.

Dr. T. D. Walker was the first witness examined. He examined Lemuel A. Comman at the General Public Hospital Monday evening last and found him suffering from concussion brought on by a blow on the head. Witness thought after the examination that the condition was changing to compression of the brain. He examined for fracture of the skull but could not lift in the condition it did not seem wise to attempt any surgleal interference. With mease ordered the house surgeon in charge to open a vein and bleed the patient so that an operation would not be necessary. There was no change as a result. The man died the seady morning, a few minutes before the witness arrived at the hospital. It had been reported to witness that the man did not rally but grew gradually worse.

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
