YOUNG CROKER DEAD ON TRAIN

Suspicious Death of Son of Former Tammany Chieftain. Kansas City, May 12 - Herbert V. Croker, a son of Richard Croker, the New York political leader, was found dead on a southbound Atchafalpa, Topeka & Santa Fe train between Kansas City and Newton (Kan.) today.
