Mr. Bennett, of the New York Herald, has a telegraph wire (nine miles) connecting the Herald office with his residence at Fort Washington; also a shorter line (three miles) to his house on Fifth avenue.

The total loss by the Chicago fire is now definitely stated at \$100,000,000, of which \$50,000,000 falls upon insurance companies. Of this amount some \$40,000,000 has already been paid, and the companies now in liquidation may possibly pay \$10,000,000 more, thus leaving a balance of loss of \$140,000,000.

British and Foreign.

LONDON, May 30. The New York "World's" special says the British Government considers that the negotiations with American Government in regard to the Treaty of Washington have failed and will inform Parliament that they will withdraw from the arbitration at Geneva.

Influential meeting was held at the Mansion House last night. Speeches were made giving expressions of warm sympathy for the suffering Israelites in Roumania.

Resolves were adopted invoking the British Government to interpose for the protection of the persecuted race in that country against the outrages of the populace.

Commander Charles Brand, a retired officer of the Royal Navy, died yesterday; he was present at the capture of the ship "Hesperus" by the British in 1814.

A devastating flood has visited South Western Missouri, destroying farms, injuring railways, drowning stock, etc.

The Jubilee drum instrument, a monster—twelve feet in diameter and five feet high! Iron shipbuilding appears to be rapidly becoming an important branch of industry in Denmark. Although for the last fifteen years small iron vessels designed for trading between the various Baltic ports, have been built at Copenhagen, it is only recently that the construction of large steamers has been attempted. At present the extent of one thousand tons are building, and one of these, it is stated, will be employed in laying down the telegraph cable between China and Japan. Two steamers, each of nearly one hundred tons, the "Zofit" and the "Thorsvald"—lately under the passage to New York, and these are said to be the first iron vessels built in Denmark which have ever entered that port.

It is estimated that the entire wheat crop of California this year will reach 30,000,000 bushels, being over 6,000,000 bushels greater than the great crop of 1869-70, which was 23,777,190 bushels for the whole State. It is thought that California will be able to export 10,000,000 of bushels more out of the crop this year than it has out any previous crop.
