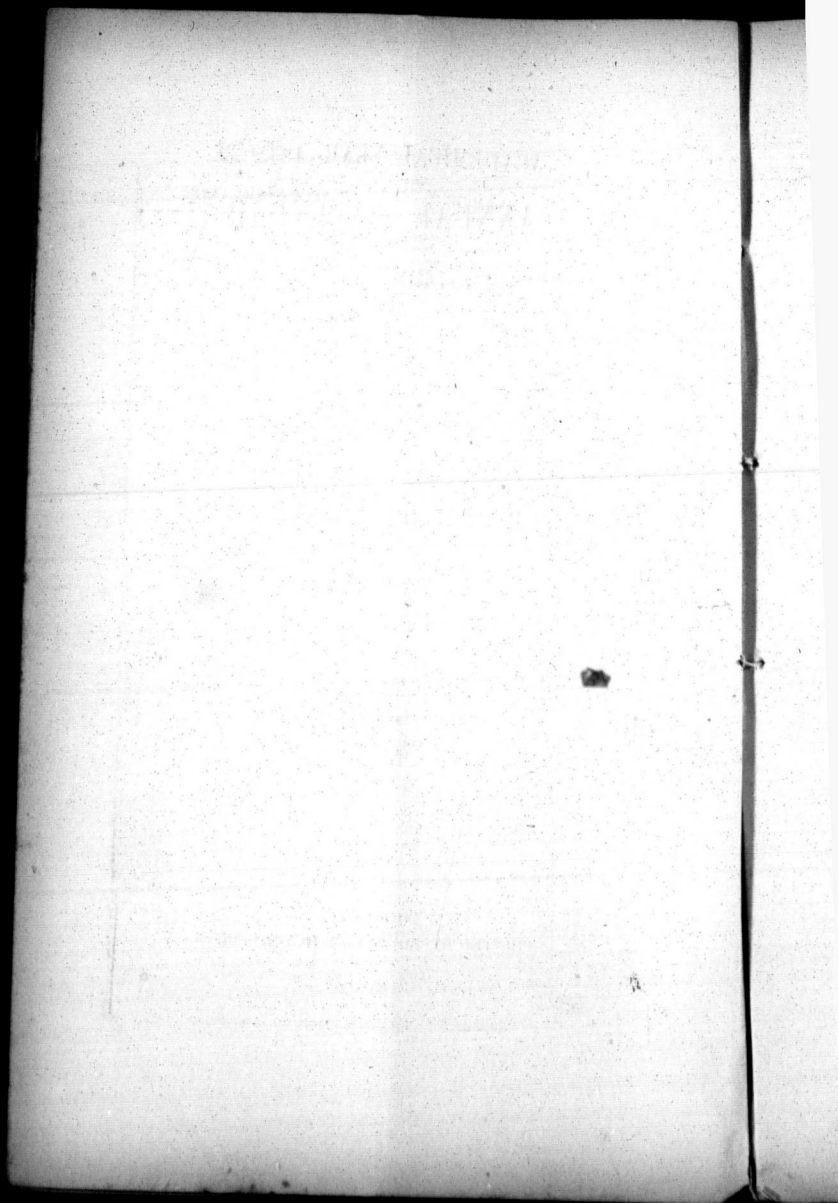

Certification of Students.

1. Young men desiring to enter upon study with a view to the Ministry, are required to make application to some Presbytery of the Church; which, being satisfied regarding their moral and religious character, their motives, and their general fitness to study for the Ministry, will certify them to the Board of Examiners. This regulation applies to

entrants upon the Preparatory Course in Knox College, as well as to Students who, having taken their Literary Course in the University of Toronto or elsewhere, seek to enter the College as Students of Theology.

2. According to the law of the General Assembly, Students are required, each Summer, after entering the College, to appear before the Presbytery within whose bounds they are labouring or residing, and to render certain Exercises prescribed to them; on which they will be certified to the College Senate for the subsequent year.

3. The Board of Examiners will meet in the College on Thursday, the 3rd October, at 9 o'clock a. m., when Students entering on Theology are required to appear and furnish the evidence of standing referred to under the head *Theological Curriculum*.

Theological Curriculum.

Regular Students entering upon the Course in Divinity shall present a Presbyterian Certificate, together with the evidence of having obtained the Degree of B. A. at the University of Toronto; or at McGill College, Montreal; or at Queen's College, Kingston; or at Victoria College, Cobourg; or at one of the National Universities of Great Britain or Ireland; or, instead of said Degree, a certificate of having satisfactorily passed the final examination in the Preparatory Course in Knox College: but in all cases such students must present evidence of having attended at least one Session, a class in Hebrew, or otherwise they must undergo an elementary examination in that language.

The Theological Course extends over three sessions of six months each.

Students of the First Year are required to prepare a Homily; of the Second Year, a Lecture; and of the Third Year, a Sermon, a Critical Exercise, and a Latin Thesis.

The Election Class is attended by the Students of all the Theological Years.

Examination at Close of Session.

In addition to such examinations as may be held by the Professors during the Session, the Board will examine the Classes at the close of it, and, if the examination shall prove satisfactory, will certify the Students to their Presbyteries accordingly.

The Senate gives a general certificate to the Students who have completed their Theological Course, in order to their being taken by Presbyteries on preliminary trials for license.

Preparatory Course.

I.—UNIVERSITY COURSE.

The General Assembly recommends Students for the Ministry to take, when possible, a full Course in some approved College, and to obtain a degree of B. A, before entering on their Theological studies.

For the guidance of Students wishing to take the Course in University College, Toronto, the following particulars respecting that Institution are here given :—

The Course in the University extends over four years of two Terms each : the first Term from the 1st October to the 22nd December ; the second Term from 4th January to 31st May.

The ordinary Annual Examinations for Matriculations (both Pass and Honors) will commence on the 27th of June.

Supplemental Examinations for Matriculation will be held in the latter part of September, at which those who were rejected at the June Examination, as well as new candidates, may offer ; but no Honors or Scholarships will be awarded at such Examination.

Seven Scholarships—three of \$120, two of \$100, one of \$80, one of \$60—are connected with the Junior Matriculation Examination for 1878. Three Scholarships of \$120 are connected with the Senior Matriculation Examination.

Seven Scholarships—two of \$130, four of \$100, one of \$50—are offered for competition among the Undergraduates of the first year. Nine Scholarships—two of \$150, three of \$120, two of \$100, one of \$75, and one of \$50—are offered in the second year. Eight Scholarships—five of \$150, one \$120, and two of \$100—are offered in the third year.

An Optional Examination will be held for Translation from English into Latin Verse, for which a Prize of \$15 may be given on the special recommendation of the Examiners, but the marks awarded will not be taken into account for Honors or Scholarships.

* The Candidate will be expected to exhibit a practical acquaintance only with the ordinary Algebraic process.

These Scholarships are tenable for one year only, but the scholars for one year will be eligible for the Scholarships of the succeeding year. A Student holding a University Scholarship may compete for these, but in the event of being the successful candidate, he will receive only the third part of the Scholarship, the remainder being awarded to the Student not holding any other Scholarship who would be next entitled to it. The Committee will not award these Scholarships unless when a certain standard of excellence is reached.

All Students holding these Scholarships must sign a declaration that it is their intention to enter the ministry in the Presbyterian Church in Canada. *Persons intending to compete for them are requested to intimate their purpose to the REV. J. M. KING, M.A., Toronto, before the 8th of September.*

II.—KNOX COLLEGE COURSE.

Classical Tuition is provided in Knox College for such Students as are unable to take a full University Course; or in whose case it is thought that the Curriculum of the University may, with advantage, be modified.

Students availing themselves of this tuition are required to give three years' attendance on certain classes (as indicated below), in University College, and to pass the terminal examinations in these classes.

ENTRANCE EXAMINATION.

Entrants on the Preparatory Course, Knox College, will be examined on the following subjects :—

Latin.—Grammar ; and Cesar de Bello Gallico, Book I.

Greek.—Grammar ; and Xenophon, Anabasis, B. I., chap. i. to v.

English.—Geography ; Grammar ; History of England ; Arithmetic ; Euclid, first book ; Algebra, first four rules.

N.B.—It is absolutely necessary that the Students applying for admission shall pass a fair examination in the above subjects.

Students desirous of entering the Second Year of the Literary Course will be required to pass an examination in the following subjects, in addition to those prescribed for entrants on the First Year.

Latin.—Virgil, B. II., Sallust's Jugurthine War, chap. i. to xiii.

Greek.—Iliad, B. I., Xenophon, Anabasis, B. I., chap. vi. to x.

Mathematics.—Euclid, Books I., II., III., and Algebra, to Simple Equations (inclusive.)

English.—Composition, Orthographical, Etymological, and Rhetorical Forms of the Language (Fowler's English Literature, Parts III., IV., and VII.)

N.B.—The Senate of Knox College and the Board of Examiners are of opinion that the Preparatory Course should not be shorter than *three* Sessions, unless in case of very exceptional attainments on the part of those entering. A really creditable examination, therefore, on the above subjects, must be passed before any candidate can get the standing of a Second Year Student on first appearing.

These examinations will be held in Knox College, on Thursday, 3rd October, at 10 o'clock, a.m.

Those intending to appear for Examination will intimate their purpose to the Chairman of the Board of Examiners, the Rev. J. M. King, M.A., on or before the first day of October.

Greek (Junior) Xenophon, Anabasis, B. V., beginning with Ch. I. ; Epistle to the Galatians ; Grammar.

(Senior) Homer, Iliad, B. VI ; Lucian, Charon ; Grammar.

Latin (Junior) Cicero, De Senectute ; Grammar, and Prose Composition. (Arnold's).

(Senior) Livy, B. XXI., chs. 30-63 ; Horace, Odes, B. III. ; Grammar, and Prose Composition. (Arnold's).

Library.

The College Library is extensive and valuable, and additions are being constantly made to it. The Church owes the deepest gratitude to the late Dr. Burns for the great zeal with which he collected, in Britain and America, the many valuable works which are the basis of this Library.

The Library is divided into two departments,—*Ordinary* and *Consulting*. The books in the Ordinary Department are issued to the Students under such rules as usually govern Libraries of this kind. The Consulting Department contains Standard Works, especially Commentaries, which Students require frequently to refer to: these books must not be taken from the room in which they are kept.

Each Student in the Theological Course, pays, at his annual enrolment, two dollars towards the maintenance of the Library; and each Student in the Preparatory Course, one dollar.

Mr. A. DOBSON is Librarian for the ensuing Session.

Reading Room.

The Reading Room is in connection with the Students' Metaphysical and Literary Society and the Students' Missionary Society. It is supplied with several of the leading Theological and Literary Quarterlies and Monthlies, and with a large number of newspapers, religious and general.

Students' Metaphysical and Literary Society.

The object of this Society is sufficiently indicated by its designation. Attention is given by its members to the

composition of Essays, and to Elocution, as well as to the discussion of important questions. Membership is voluntary, but the most of the students seek connexion with the Society.

Students' Missionary Society.

The Society consists of all the Students connected with the College, who have in view the Ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The object of the Society is to supply the means of grace in the more neglected portions of Canada. It sends Missionaries to those points chiefly which the regular organization of the Church is least able to overtake. The funds necessary for carrying on the work are supplied by contributions obtained by its members from the fields in which they labour during summer ; and by contributions from Congregations and individuals throughout the Church, who are specially interested in the work of the Society. Nine Missionaries were employed by the Society during the past year.

During winter the attention of the Society is chiefly directed to Mission work in Toronto, in conjunction with the congregations of the city.

New College: Residence of Students.

The new College is very commodious, and it is believed that the occupancy of it much increases our facilities for College work, as well as greatly promotes the comfort of the Students.

The whole subject of the internal economy of the new Building, and the Regulations, under which the Boarding Establishment shall be conducted, have been very carefully

considered by the Board of Management ; correspondence having been had with Theological and Literary Institutions both in Canada and in the United States, with the view of adopting any modifications of our system which their experience might have approved.

It has been decided that the rooms of Students shall be completely furnished by the Church ; that the rate of board shall not exceed three dollars per week, all charges for attendance, &c, included ; that where it is preferred, Students shall be allowed to reside in the College on payment to the Steward of seventy-five cents per week, and to find board elsewhere ; and that, in the case of Students, all applications for rooms shall be made to the Principal, and these shall be appropriated in the order in which applications are received ; academic seniority, however, entitling Students to a preference in the choice of rooms. Students can retain their rooms from one Session to another, irrespective of the rule as to seniority, by giving notice before the beginning of the Session that they wish to do so.

The classes who shall be admitted to board in the College are as follows, viz :—

- (a) Students in their Theological Course.
- (b) Students preparing for their Theological Course, whether studying in Knox College, in the University of Toronto, or in some other Educational Institution in Toronto.
- (c) In the event of the rooms not being all occupied by Students, Ministers or Probationers of the Church who may be temporarily resident in Toronto, may be admitted to board ; but their residence, if longer than a week, must be sanctioned by the Principal.

Residence in the College, is, of course, optional on the part of Students ; but the Board hopes that the arrangements of the establishment will prove such as to make residence desirable and highly advantageous.

There are many important details of the system adopted which cannot well be here given, but which are provided for in the agreement entered into with Mr. Huckins, the Steward.

A perspective view of the plan of the College, taken from the architect's design, appears on the cover of the Calendar.

In the matter of Academic Degrees there may also be inaccuracies, which will be duly corrected when pointed out.

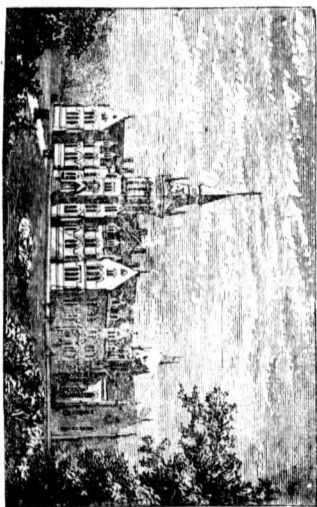
