JUDGMENT IN FISHERY CASE

Important Case in Dispute Settled by Judgment of Justice Roy of Quebec

Rimouski, April 14, 1917.—Judgment was rendered here a few days ago by Honorable Justice Roy, Judge of the Superior Court, in a case which has attracted a great deal of attention, to wit, that of the Matamajaw Salmon Club vs. Duchaine.

The Matamajaw Salmon Club is located at Causapscal, in the Province of Quebec. Some years ago it purchased certain fishing rights from the Restigouche Salmon Club. The Restigouche Salmon Club had bought most of these fishing rights from Lord Mount Stephen. Two years ago, when the members of the Matamajaw Salmon Club went to fish as usual on the river, they were disturbed by one Duchaine of Causapscal, who claimed the fishing rights opposite one of the most valuable pools on the Matapedia River, known as lot C.

When ordered to move off, he refused to do so, and through his legal attorney, Mr. Charles Angers, Advocate, of Quebec, he served a protest on the Club, claiming that he had bought lot C, and that as owner of lot C, he owned the fishing rights opposite the same.

As a consequence, the Matamajaw Salmon Club through their attorney, the Honorable John Hall Kelly, of New Carlisle, entered suit against Duchaine, in order to have him give up possession of that part of the river, and also to have the Court declare that the fishing rights opposite the said lot belonged to the Matamajaw Salmon Club. The Matamajaw Salmon Club produced the title from Lord Mount Stephen to the Restigouche Salmon Club and from the Restigouche Club to itself. In these titles, it is stated that the Restigouche Salmon Club sold to the Matamajaw Salmon Club "the fishing rights opposite lot C," the same description was contained in the deed from Lord Mount Stephen to the Restigouche Salmon Club.

In answer to these titles, Duchaine pleaded that in order to convey fishing rights in a river, it is necessary that a part of the land bordering on the river should also be sold with the fishing rights, otherwise, he claimed that if fishing rights are sold without land, it is only a privilege of use which lasts as long as the party lives, and that at his death, the fishing rights return to the owner of the land. In other words, the owner of the land claimed that a sale of fishing rights alone without any land is for the lifetime of the purchaser, and that in order to convey absolute ownership a piece of land must also be conveyed as is done in all cases.

In support of this claim, many authorities in France and other countries were quoted. In answer to this, the Honorable John Hall Kelly pleaded that when a person sells fishing rights in a river it is not necessary to sell a part of the river bank, that the right to fish in a river is a real right or a right of property, and not only a right of usage which disappears with the life of the party fishing. He also pleaded that when a person sells the fishing rights in a river, he is supposed to sell everything that may be required for the perpetual enjoyment of that right, and if it were necessary to include in a deed the bed of the river or a part of the river bank in order to convey the fishing rights, that when a person sells fishing rights purely and simply, he is supposed to sell everything that is necessary for the exercise of that right.

This case has been before the Courts for quite awhile, and by the judgment handed down last week, the Superior Court at Rimouski decided that the Matamajaw Salmon Club is the owner of the fishing rights in question, and that it is not necessary to convey a part of the river bank or a part of the bed of the river in order to sell the fishing rights opposite a lot. LT. McCORD SPEAKS OF CAMPBELLTON BOYS

Two Irish Boys From Here Who Were True Heroes—How They Died

In an interview published in a St. John paper, Lt. McCord of Sackville speaks of the two O'Keefe boys as follows:

TWO IRISH BOYS.

"There were also two Irish boys from Campbellton who crossed with the first draft over the old 12th—the O'Keefe boys, Dan and Arthur. Dan was a great big soldier with a voice like the blast of a pipe organ. He was a real fellow, always full of fun, and with a heart as broad as his face. Dan was one of the few survivors of his company in the heavy fighting of May 8th, 1915. He carried messages back and forth and in those days since the war has developed Dan would have had a dozen or more recommendations. The next day, May 9th, with a few companions he was walking down what we call Railway Avenue at Ypres, when a big shell struck and killed the four of them. O'Keefe was buried near the historical ramparts of Ypres.

"His brother, Arthur, was a tall slender fellow with a blonde moustache. He had the distinction of being the first member of the old 12th to be wounded—receiving quite severe wounds in the neck. He rejoined up again in the winter and was through the heavy fighting, including that of May 8th. Although he had the shock of his brother being killed, he went through the Somme fighting during the fall of 1915 and when bombing was introduced he became an expert bomber, in fact one of the best in the regiment. In January, 1916, he went out with a party loaded with bombs in the night. It was a daring reconnaissance. Later he was carried to the rear and died in hospital and buried outside of Belleul, where a cross was erected in his memory. There were never finer soldiers than the O'Keefe boys. They couldn't be beaten.

"Other men from the 12th draft who have been killed in action were Private Jardine of Chatham who fell early in the game, and Joseph Lorette of Sackville. The latter soldier was on a listening post at St. Eloi when they were first established. He received a mortal wound and died in a field ambulance. It was at Dickebusche where he died and he was buried there. Joseph Lorette was a fine athletic fellow, very ambitious and he was much missed by all the boys.

KAISER RULE AT DALHOUSIE

Will of Electors Defeated by Legal Quibble—Amended Announcement

Dalhousie, April 18.—The civic contest at Dalhousie, Tuesday was a warm one and Mayor Montgomery and his lieutenants left nothing undone to win the election by fair means or foul.

During the day employees of the Dalhousie Lumber Co.'s office worked hard for Montgomery. Ballots containing the names of only the Montgomery ticket were placed in the hands of other employees and it is alleged that they were led up to the ballot box, and the ballot put in. In writing of this matter a Graphic correspondent asks "is this a secret ballot?"

The boys are in France fighting for just such privileges, yet here in Dalhousie, under the Union Jack electors were openly deprived of their franchise. Ninety ballots for Scott and his ticket were rejected for a technical reason, while eleven others were also not counted. "All the electors are asking for 'a square deal'."

The ballots used were printed in the right form, but contained the names of Thos. G. Scott for Mayor and eight men nominated for Aldermen. They were rejected because they did not contain the names of both candidates for Mayor and the sixteen candidates for Aldermen.

FATHER-SON BANQUET A GREAT SUCCESS

St. Andrew's Hall Crowded Monday Evening to Hear Rev. Mr. Buckley

For some time it had been evident that Campbellton has not been keeping pace with other towns in respect to the education of our boys of that age.

For the past two years the different churches had sent delegates to the Boy's Congress at Moncton and St. John and although the boys had returned with much enthusiasm and organization and assistance from the older church members, nothing was done.

Now Rev. Mr. Buckley of St. John's who has made a special study of the boy problem and as an enthusiastic worker in this line of church activities, has taken the matter in hand and at a banquet Monday evening a committee was organized under the leadership of Standard Efficiency Tests.

In order to act the matter over the boys and the men of the church all were invited to attend a banquet given by the ladies of the different churches in St. Andrew's Hall.

Tables were set for over a hundred but extra places had to be provided to accommodate all.

After all had partaken of the good things, Rev. Mr. Young, Vice-Chairman, explained the object of the meeting and called upon Rev. Mr. Buckley to address those present.

Mr. Buckley very briefly explained the workings of the Canadian Standard Efficiency Tests, and then the fathers present were asked to give two minutes speeches on the subject.

Finally after discussion it was decided to proceed with the organization and a committee of the pastor and two lay men from each church was chosen to be a Central committee to look after the matter.

If the work is carried out as planned a very interesting time is ahead for the boys of Campbellton and every boy should lose no time in identifying himself with this movement through his church or Sabbath School.

Old Papers

During the last nine months the Women's Council have been engaged in a paper-saving campaign for patriotic purposes. They have in that time rescued from furnaces, grates and stoves a portion of the paper formerly burned. This has been sold for \$1,275.61. To waste and burn paper needlessly is the same as burning up \$1 bills. The Women's Council have received 1,275 of these \$1 bills during the last months, but much is still being thrown into our fires and garbage carts. The amount named could no doubt be doubled if all householders would give their assistance. All work in connection with the scheme is voluntary, except the wages of the man in the warehouse who takes the paper. He has been paid \$400.

Other expenses have been \$15.00, leaving a balance of \$800 in the bank. The particular patriotic object or objects to which this will be given will be decided at the meeting of the council next week. When the public are informed of the purpose to which the money is to be given, and realize what can be done with it, it is expected a further impetus will be given to the work of saving. Many people think that the little they have is not worth saving, but if a box or bag in which all old newspapers, wrapping paper, old magazines, books, cardboard boxes are kept, the result will be surprising.

KILLED IN ACTION

PTE. CLIFFORD NOBLE

Was The Son of Mrs. G. B. Ellsworth

and went Over with the 100th

Battalion

On March the first the Observer published among the engravings of Penbrooke boys serving overseas a picture of Pte. Clifford Noble little thinking that on the day the picture appeared this bright young man had laid down his life as a sacrifice for the ideals which he bravely went forth to defend, but such was his case, as his mother, Mrs. G. B. Ellsworth received from the officer in charge of the record office at Ottawa one of those faithful missives which have brought grief to so many Canadian homes advising her that her soldier son had been killed in action on March 1st. Hers but a repetition of the trying experience through which many Penbrooke mothers have passed within the last two years. The news was broken to her as gently as possible by her pastor, Rev. A. T. Jones, yet it came as a piercing shock and hers will be the sympathy of the community in a sacrifice which those of us who have not been called upon to pass through can hardly realize.

Clifford Noble was Mrs. Ellsworth's

fourth son by her first marriage. He was in his 24th year, a young man of good physique and splendid character for whom the future held forth every promise. Pte. Clifford Noble was born in Dawsonville, N. B. His father died when he was a child. Some nineteen or twenty years ago he went to Fredericton and stayed with his aunt for a few years and then he returned to Dawsonville. His mother and step-father then went to Penbrooke to live and in 1913 Pte. Noble went to see his mother and remained there until the war broke out when he enlisted with the guards at Petawawa and in the spring of last year was transferred to the 130th Battalion with which he went overseas in September. In England he was drafted into the 75th Battalion and he crossed to France last fall.

Killed in action tells the remainder of the story and is a noble, fitting inscription with which to enshrine his memory on this page.

Besides his mother he leaves his step-father, two brothers, Archie and David in Brunswick, two sisters, Misses Elsie and Annie nurses in training at Verdun, Que., as well as two half brothers and one half sister at home. Another brother was killed while working in Richard's mill at Campbellton in 1912.

Pte. Noble's letters home, many of which were no doubt written under most trying circumstances were always most cheerful in tone and he always accepted the hardships of military life with a philosophy that helped him under all conditions. Particulars as to how death came to him are of course not yet to hand but it may be safely taken for granted that he met it unafraid and that to the last he did his duty as he did it when he first donned the uniform in response to the promptings and impulses which are inseparable from true manhood.

Important Notice From the Campbellton Board of Health—\$40.00 Penalty

Campbellton being threatened with another epidemic of infectious disease, scarlet fever this time, we thought it necessary to remind the householders of the Regulation of the Provincial Board of Health on this particular disease.

Extracts from the Provincial Board of Health Regulations:—
Rule 1.—The Local Board of Health shall cause to be isolated and kept in a room every person suffering or suspected to be suffering from scarlet fever, so long as the danger of contagion exists.

RULE IV.—"Any householder in whose house there shall occur a case of scarlet fever shall immediately notify the Board of Health of the district."

RULE VI.—"Whenever a case of scarlet fever exists in any household or dwelling, a notice or placard shall be posted on or near the door of such house, stating that such disease exists."

N. B.—We ask every householder to faithfully obey these regulations and prevent the spreading of this serious disease. If some one neglects to do so we will hope that the neighbors will notify the Board who will take immediate action against the neglectful party.

Every person neglecting to comply with the Provincial Board of Health's regulations in regard to the rules above published is liable to a penalty not exceeding \$40.00.

Scarlet fever is contagious from the outset of the disease four or five days before the rash appears and lasts three or four weeks or until desquamation is completed.

The sick child should be isolated in a room and only the person attending the child should enter the room using a special gown which is left at the door to be again used on returning to the room.

No children from such families where there is a case of scarlet fever shall go to school, church, moving pictures, etc., or mix with other children.

Disinfection of the room where a case of scarlet fever has been isolated is necessary.

In order to keep on the safe side we ask the parents to keep home every child who does not feel well or look as well as usual—having in mind that a child who is taken sick with scarlet fever may spread the disease and infect several classmates before the rash appears on his or her body.


