BY-ELECTIONS ARE CALLED ON

St. John and Madawaska on June 10th—Eggs a Week Later.

FREDERICTON, May 19.—An announcement was made by Premier Foster this afternoon of the date for the three by-elections to fill vacancies in the New Brunswick legislature. Polling will take place in St. John and Madawaska counties on Saturday, June 10th, while polling in Kings county will take place a week later, on Saturday, June 17th.

The Premier said that the later date had been fixed in the case of Kings county because of representations from that constituency, where the supporters of the government are meeting in convention to-day to name a candidate from among several aspirants.

Announcement was also made by the Premier of several appointments. T. M. Gaylor, former mayor of the town, was named as police magistrate of Chatham, and Norman S. Murray, of Hon. Robert Murray, former provincial secretary, and a returned soldier, was appointed registrar of probate for Northumberland county, his recommendations including one from the G. W. V. A.

BRAKEMAN KILLED AT ATHOL YARD

Crushed Between Cars and Dies From Injuries Two Hours Later.

Mr. Peter A. LeBlanc, an employee of the C. N. R. was the victim of a sad accident which occurred on the Athol yard which occurred on Tuesday afternoon. Mr. LeBlanc was on duty with the shunter at the time. It appears that the coupling on a car which he was about to connect to the freight train was in working order. Mr. LeBlanc somehow got caught between the coupling and the one with which he was supposed to connect it. He was rushed to the hospital but medical assistance was of no avail for his injuries were fatal. He passed away about two hours after the accident, but was pronounced to be dead, thus being in a condition to receive the last sacrament.

The deceased was thirty-one years of age, was a veteran of the first world war, having served with the famous 25th Battalion. Besides his bereaved wife, Mr. LeBlanc leaves two young children to mourn his loss. He is also survived by his parents, of this town, Mr. and Mrs. John L. LeBlanc and four sisters and three brothers. The sisters are: Mrs. Joseph Jean, Florence at the Roosevelt Hospital, in New York and Lenora at home. The brothers are Louis of Dalhousie, Patrick in the West and Frank of Campbellton.

The funeral will take place to-morrow morning at 9 a.m. and will be conducted under the direction of the Knights of Columbus. The Rev. Father Melanson will officiate and will be assisted by Father Sivert and Father James LeBlanc, a cousin of the deceased. Special music will be supplied by the K. C. Council. The pallbearers will be: Messrs. Frank Champeau, R. J. Lawrie, J. N. Boudreau, P. P. Dupuis, Allan J. LeBlanc and J. J. Bernard.

It is expected that all returned men who possibly can will attend the services.

SEIZED VALUABLE LIQUOR SHIPMENT

Moncton Inspectors Take Charge of Eight Cases of Dry Goods.

Moncton, May 22.—Acting on notification from St. John the C. N. R. police searched a case No. 31858, C.N.R. in the yards here and discovered eight packing cases supposed to contain dry goods, all billed to Toronto.

Freight officials here were transferred the goods when Chief Hutchison seized the entire consignment at the freight shed this morning. Four cases were billed to the Dominion Cloth Co., two to the Universal Garment Co. and two to the Toronto Clothing Co., all of Toronto.

Each case contains one hundred bottles of Dewars Special Liquor and the whole consignment is valued in the vicinity of \$5,000.

The seized goods were transferred from the freight shed to the Police Station this morning. This is one of the largest seizures made in Moncton as yet.

Apparently the St. John C. N. R. police only got a part of the consignment which was to have lubricated dry gulleys in the Queen City and which through the vigilance of Chief Tingley and his department and the prompt action of Chief Hutchison of Campbellton, Delima in the West, Florence at the Roosevelt Hospital, in New York and Lenora at home.

BOOM HAND LOST HIS LIFE

Fell from Boom and Was Drowned—Body Sent to Home at Doaktown.

The boomhouse at Athol was the scene of a sad tragedy last Saturday afternoon when Hugh Parker of Doaktown, a young man of about eighteen years of age was drowned while at work on the boom.

The unfortunate young man lost his footing and fell into the river just a few minutes after the crews had begun work after the dinner hour. There was but one man anywhere near at the time and it was several minutes before he could reach the drowning youth. It is presumed that contact with the cold water so soon after eating must have brought on a cramp which completely disabled the boy, for having once sank he did not resurface, and consequently, it was several minutes before his rescuers could locate the body.

As soon as the seriousness of the accident was realized Dr. MacPherson was called. The doctor made a record trip, covering the distance to the boom in an incredibly short time and arriving just as the boy's body was recovered. But all that medical skill could do was of no avail as the youth had been under the water for nearly fifteen minutes.

A memorial service for the deceased was held in the church at Ferguson Manor last Sunday. The young man's remains were forwarded to his home in Doaktown on Monday's limited.

TOWN COUNCIL BOYS TRUCKS

One Ton Trucks Ordered to be Purchased for Street Work.

A special meeting of the Town Council was held at the Mayor's residence last Thursday evening. His Worship Mayor McKay presiding. Couns. St. Onge, Moores and Gilker were present.

His Worship explained that the meeting had been called to consider the advisability of purchasing motor trucks for street work. He said that a large amount of work was planned for this year. Besides the laying of concrete sidewalks it was agreed in committee that the permanent street from the subway to Sugarloaf Street should be undertaken this year. It had also been decided to lay a concrete base for this. The town had already purchased a concrete mixer and the committee had decided to do all the work by days work, under the management of a competent man.

Coun. Moores spoke in favor of purchase of two light trucks and moved that the town purchase two small motor trucks.

Coun. St. Onge spoke strongly against the purchase of motor trucks. Light trucks were forever getting out of commission and cost more to operate. Four teams could do as much work. Labor was cheap and plenty of men looking for work. Gravel could be delivered for \$1.00 per yard from the pit to any part of the town. Coun. Moores said a truck would do the work of five horses and carts. On the vote being taken it was as follows:—

Yes—Moores and Gilker. No—St. Onge. Mr. A. Gillis, the Ford dealer was present and offered two Ford ton trucks with steel lined dump bodies at \$1,100 each.

WILL CUT RATES ON LUMBER

C. A. Hayes Announces Proposed Cut of Sixteen or Seventeen P. C.

Ottawa, May 22.—Replying to questions from New Brunswick members, C. A. Hayes, vice-president of the Canadian National Railway this morning informed the special House committee on railway transportation costs, that the C. N. R. proposed a cut of 16 or 17 p. c. in the freight rates on lumber.

President Beatty, of the C. P. R., giving evidence on Friday, suggested a cut of 11.70 p. c.

MANY PERISH IN S.S. COLLISION

British Steamer Egypt Sinks And French Steamer Badly Damaged.

Brest, France, May 22.—Nearly one hundred perished Saturday night when the Peninsula and Oriental Line steamer Egypt sank off the Island of Usant after collision with the French freight steamer Seine.

The Egypt sailed from London for Bombay, Friday with 44 passengers and a crew of 290. A roll call on board the Seine after the disaster showed that at least fifteen of the passengers and eighty of the crew of the Egypt were missing.

The collision occurred during a dense fog within twenty-two miles of the Armen lighthouse. The dinner table was about to be stounded on board of the Egypt. Many of the passengers and most of the men were on deck. The shock threw persons into the sea, others jumped, and a number went down with the ship, which sank in twenty minutes. The Egypt was rammed amidships on the port side.

A DANGEROUS PLAYGROUND

Although some parents do not realize it, our local wharves constitute a rather dangerous playground, especially for children who are under school age.

Last week a trio of youngsters were playing about on the lower wharf where one of them tripped and fell heading over the side. A boat happened to be moored just at that point and fortunately the tide was high, so the boy did not have far to fall into the boat. By chance he was uninjured except for being shaken up a bit.

It can be easily imagined, however, that this accident might have resulted in a tragedy. Even more simple happenings have frequently resulted in fatality. We have often read of similar incidents where one boy has managed to rescue his playmate from danger and the affair has resulted in a dual tragedy. Parents should take warning and endeavor to keep their children away from this place of danger.

WHY GO WEST?

Drought and floods, a curtailed market for cattle and the slump in grain prices have caused the western farmers many troubles. There has been for years an impression, solidly fostered, that the west was a land of opportunity for the farmer. It was a land where the soil was rich and the climate was ideal. It was a land where the farmer could make his money and live in comfort. It was a land where the farmer could find a better life than in the east.

Since the cycle of depression has set in the western farmers appear in many instances—and in whole districts—to have lost nearly all they gained during the era of good times and high prices. This may be only and appearance because they probably have better stock, more equipment, more land, more stock, on their farms than they had in the old days; but reports that in the half of the provinces the farmers have lost so heavily in the operations of the past two years that they are heavily in debt to the banks and need further advances to carry them over this season. Does not indicate a condition making for optimism.

That the cattle raising industry has been struck a serious blow by the widely talked of medicine in the world is not surprising. The United States seems evident. THE MENTAL ATTITUDE COUNTS

Can you walk 25 miles without feeling fagged out? Probably not. Yet you cover that much distance in an ordinary evening of dancing.

Madalyo Lee, a young Boston girl, checked the figure. She wore a pedometer, danced five hours and she had traveled 25 miles. Not only that, she "finished fresh."

The 25-mile dancer steps the light fantastic for a few minutes, then pauses to recuperate. It's like the intermission between rounds of a prize-fight.

Rested, if only for a few minutes, the body is ready to go ahead again at top speed.

Brain workers, in particular, can increase their productive capacity by relaxing into absolute rest five minutes an hour. Some shrewd factory managers give their employes similar periods of rest as a matter of increasing efficiency.

Like all things, this 25-mile proposition has a psychic or mental-science side.

TUBERCULIN TESTING

A discussion which took place recently in the House of Commons revealed the fact that the cities and towns of Canada do not take advantage of the opportunity offered by the Dominion Department of Agriculture to have the herds supplying milk or cream tested for tuberculosis.

STRONG WATER FROM BOSTON MAN'S TAP

Boston, May 18.—Water with a kick in it. That is what comes from a faucet in a house at 281 River street, Cambridge, according to the owner, Michael J. Saghrae. He so told Judge Wolcott in the Cambridge court. The alleged alcoholic water was brought to the attention of the court through a raid made by Capt. Conroy and Cambridge police upon the Saghrae home on April 22. After vainly seeking liquor throughout the house the officers sniffed at the sink. A suspicious odor arose from the drain pipe. The zealous officers then drained the odor stronger, and had the water analyzed. A seven per cent alcoholic content was shown by the analysis.

In court the police charged that Saghrae was guilty of two illegal sales of liquor, one on April 20 and one on April 21. After testifying concerning the alleged sales they told about the strong water in the drain pipe. Michael admitted the quality of the water, and declared that it came to the house flavored with alcohol.

TWENTY DEAD IN CONFLAGRATION AT SANTO SPIRITO

Rome, May 19.—A disastrous fire swept the historic hospital of Santo Spirito, one of the most ancient and picturesque charitable institutions in Rome, early yesterday. Collapse of the pavement isolated the chronic ward. Sixteen bodies had been extracted from the burning ruins at seven-thirty o'clock.

The institution accommodates nearly 5,000 and includes a hospital, lunatic asylum, foundling home and a refuge for aged and infirm persons.

The fire broke out a little before mid-night in the laundry. At first it seemed insignificant, but it spread rapidly to the neighboring wards, each containing sixty chronic sufferers or infirm patients who were seized with a panic.

So far as can be ascertained the death list will reach twenty. Sixteen bodies already had been buried. Four other patients were badly burned, and one dangerously injured.

The hospital of Santo Spirito is situated on the bank of the River Tiber, not far from the Vatican grounds. It was founded by Pope Innocent III. rebuilt under Sixtus IV. in the fifteenth century. The altar in the hospital chapel was designed by Andrea Palladio, and is reputed to be the only work of this artist in Rome.

BIRD'S NEST HUNT MAY COST HIM HIS LIFE

Montreal, May 20.—Climbing a telegraph pole on Goan Boulevard near his home, to reach a bird's nest, Glenn Dewille, aged 17, unwittingly touched the transformer on one of the electric wires with a short piece of iron bar he carried in his hand. The subsequent shock rendered him unconscious and he fell against several live wires, from which he suffered severe burns. The wires not being strong enough to support his body, fell to the ground. He was picked up by a passerby and conveyed to a hospital. It was later found necessary to remove him to a hospital, where his condition was reported last night as very serious.

WOOD ALCOHOL KILLS N. S. MAN

Bangor, Me., May 19.—Timothy Burke, who came here last year from somewhere in the maritime provinces, died last night from the effects of wood alcohol.

On Thursday afternoon the police were notified that two men, apparently drunk, were lying in a field near the hospital, and the patrol car was sent up with officers to investigate. One of the men was Burke, who seemed to be in a strange stupor, and was taken to the hospital, while the other gave his name as Clifford Pyne of Calais, and was locked up at the station.

RAN AROUND IN FLAMES AT ALBANY IN BRONX

Albany, N. Y., May 19.—A man who has been working on the roof of the new wood mill under construction by the company in the St. John Lake district. The man had gone under several names, it is said, and that may account for the appearance on his arm of the initials P. M. tattooed on the forearm. MAN A SUICIDE

Body of R. McBrane Smith found in Penobscot River at Brewer, Maine.

Bangor, May 19.—Through the efforts of Sheriff Fernandez and a Pinkerton man who has been working on the case it is believed that the identity of the man whose body was found in the river bank in Brewer this week has been established.

CHARLOTTETOWN

The man believed to be R. McBrane Smith, of Charlottetown, (P. E. I.), who had gone employed by the Great Northern Paper Company for several years and who was supposed to have left Bangor on May 12 or 13 for work on the new wood mill.

The man had gone under several names, it is said, and that may account for the appearance on his arm of the initials P. M. tattooed on the forearm. He was thirty-seven years old and had been acting as a scaler for the Great Northern.

The autopsy performed by Dr. E. T. Mallory, one of the county medical examiners, showed that death was due to drowning.

Smith was supposed to have been in Bangor, but he did not get far, it seems, having been seen a day or two later at a local hotel, asking for a loan of \$10 from someone. After drinking for some time it is believed that he took his life. He is said to have acted rather queerly at times.

Sheriff Fernandez telegraphed to Charlottetown for information concerning the man.




EXPLORE MYSTERY OF GIRL'S DEATH
