### A DANGEROUS PLAYGROUND

Although some parents do not realize it, our local wharves constitute a rather dangerous playgrounds, especially for children who are under school age.

Last week a trio of youngsters were playing about on the lower wharf where one of them tripped and fell heading over the side. A boat happened to be moored just at that point and fortunately the tide was high, so the boy did not have far to fall into the water. By chance he was uninjured except for being shaken up a bit.

It can be easily imagined, however, that this accident might have resulted in a tragedy. Even more simple happenings have frequently resulted in fatality.

We have often read of similar incidents where one boy has assayed to rescue his playmate from danger and the affair has resulted in a dual tragedy. Parents should take warning and endeavor to keep their children away from this place of danger. Even though there may be men working about the wharves it is impossible for them to keep a protective eye on all youngsters who may prefer the seashore as a playground.

### WHY GO WEST?

Drought and floods, a curtailed market for cattle and the slump in grain prices have caused the western farmers many troubles. There has been for years an impression, seldom fostered, that the west was a land of opportunity for the farmer. It was many failures—but failures are not advertised. A virgin land waited to be exploited, and while its fertility was still unexploited it was a source of good crops and wealth to the soil. Nevertheless even in what may now be regarded as boom times, the western farmers had many difficulties; their co-operative activities and their political movements were met with doubtless reactions to the varied causes of discontent inherent in the conditions of their existence. One of the lessons of history is that discontent is usually, if not invariably, the starting point of class or group movements.

Since the cycle of depression has traffic rules, still he may at any time set in the western farmers appear in many instances—and in whole districts—to have lost nearly all they gained during the era of good times and high prices. This may be only an appearance because they probably have better homes, more equipment and more stock on their farms than they had in the old days; but reports that in the half of the provinces the farmers have lost so heavily in the operations of the past two years that they are heavily in debt to the banks and need further advances to carry them over this season, does not indicate a condition making for optimism.

That the cattle raising industry has been struck a serious blow by the Fordney Emergency Tariff of the United States seems evident. Lord Northcliffe is becoming an alarmist and sensationalist; but he appears to be during his visit to the prairies some use.

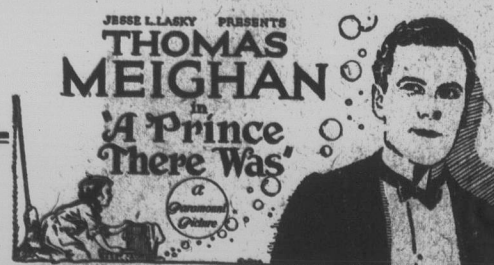

### STRONG WATER FROM BOSTON MAN'S TAP

Boston, May 18.—Water with a kick in it. That is what comes from a faucet in a house at 281 River street, Cambridge, according to the owner, Michael J. Sughrue. He so told Judge Wolcott in the Cambridge court.

The alleged alcoholic was brought to the attention of the court through a raid made by Capt. Conney and Cambridge police upon the Sughrue home on April 22. After vainly seeking liquor throughout the house the officers sniffed at the sink. A suspicious odor arose from the drain pipe. The zealous officers then drained the trap beneath the sink, found the odor stronger, and had the water analyzed. A seven per cent alcoholic content was shown by the analysis.

In court the police charged that Sughrue was guilty of two illegal sales of liquor, one on April 20 and one on April 21. After testifying concerning the alleged sales they told about the strong water in the drain pipe. Michael admitted the quality of the water, and declared that it came to the house flavored with alcohol.

Judge Wolcott did not place much credence in Michael's story. He fined him \$50 on the first liquor selling complaint, and imposed a sentence of three months in the house of correction on the second complaint. Michael appealed and was held in bonds of \$500.

### TWENTY DEAD IN CONFLAGRATION AT SANTO SPIRITO

Rome, May 19.—A disastrous fire swept the historic hospital of Santo Spirito, one of the most ancient and picturesque charitable institutions in Rome, early yesterday. Collapse of the pavement isolated the chronic ward. Sixteen bodies had been extracted from the burning ruins at seven-thirty o'clock.

The institution accommodates nearly 5,000 and includes a hospital, lunatic asylum, foundling home and a refuge for aged and infirm persons.

The fire broke out a little before mid-night in the laundry. At first it seemed insignificant, but it spread rapidly to the neighboring wards, each containing thirty chronic sufferers or infirm patients who were seized with a panic.

So far as can be ascertained the death list will reach twenty. Sixteen bodies already have been recovered. Four other patients were badly burned, and one dangerously injured.

The hospital of Santo Spirito is situated on the bank of the River Tiber, not from the Vatican grounds. It was founded by Pope Innocent III and rebuilt under Sixtus IV. in the fifteenth century. The altar in the hospital chapel was designed by Andrea Palladio, and is reputed to be the only work of this artist in Rome.

### BIRD'S NEST HUNT MAY COST HIM HIS LIFE

Montreal, May 20.—Climbing a telegraph pole on Gouin Boulevard near his home, to reach a bird's nest, Glenn Desjardis, aged 17, unwittingly touched the transformer on one of the electric wires with a short piece of iron bar he carried in his hand. The subsequent shock rendered him unconscious and he fell against several live wires, from which he suffered severe burns. The wires not being strong enough to support his body, fell to the ground. He was picked up by a passerby and conveyed to a hospital. It was later found necessary to remove him to a hospital, where his condition was reported last night as very serious.

### WOOD ALCOHOL KILLS N. S. MAN

Bangor, Me., May 19.—Timothy Burke, who came here last year from somewhere in the maritime provinces, died last night from the effects of wood alcohol.

On Thursday afternoon the police were notified that two men, apparently drunk, were lying in a field near the hospital, and the patrol car was sent up with officers to investigate. One of the men was Burke, who seemed to be in a strange stupor, and was taken to the hospital, while the other gave his name as Clifford Pyne of Calais, and was locked up at the station.

Police records show that Burke was arrested last Monday for drunkenness, and it is said that after being liberated he continued to drink heavily. He was about forty-five years old, an iron moulder by trade, had been employed at the Union Iron Works and lived at Bancroft House. It is believed that he came here from Halifax.

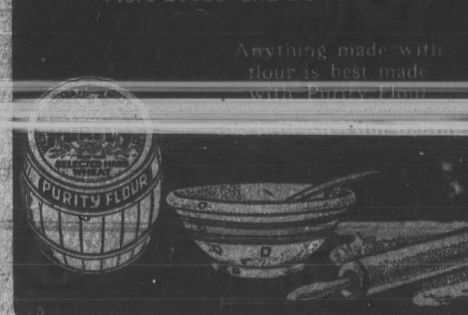

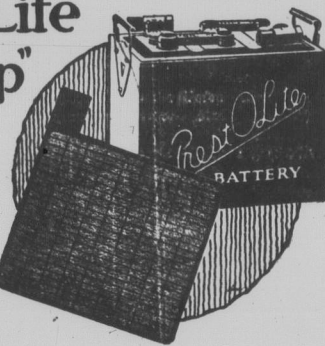

**TO PAINT PICTURE OF THE WEDDING OF PRINCESS MARY**

London, April 27.—A picture of Imperial interest is to be painted by Frank O. Salisbury, the subject being the scene in Westminster Abbey when Princess Mary was married to Viscount Lascelles. The artist, it will be remembered, produced the "Parade of the Unknown Warrior" and the "National Thanksgiving Service for Peace" held on the steps of St. Paul's in 1911.

These include the King and Queen, Queen Alexandra, and other members of the Royal Family, the best man, the bridesmaids, the Earl and Countess of Harrowood, the Archbishop of Canterbury, the prelates associated with the Primates, and the Dean of Westminster.

The picture has been directly commissioned by the King, and, when completed, will be added to the Royal Collection. The fact that it is being painted has already excited interest far beyond Royal circles, and in response to a wish that has been expressed that copies may become available for the general public, the King has given permission for the picture to be engraved.

## Railway News

Vernon, B.C.—The Canadian Pacific Railway has completed at Okanagan Landing an extension of its ice house at that point, giving about 20 per cent. additional storage capacity. Besides this there will be an improved method of icing cars which will enable the workmen to crush the required ice in advance of arrival of cars, so that when cars come to the lake, the ice may be put to ice house and the entire train iced with one movement of the switch engine. This should materially hasten the movement of the fruit from Okanagan Landing. It is expected that cars will be iced in about four minutes each.

The amount of ice put up at Okanagan Landing this year is 8,500 tons. It was brought from Banff and is exceptionally good, and should be adequate for a very prosperous season.

How medical advice was conveyed by wireless and acted upon with benefit to the sufferers was told by Dr. E. W. Drury, surgeon of the Canadian Pacific line "Metagama" upon the arrival of that vessel from Canada at Liverpool.

During the Metagama's eastward run five wireless messages were received from three steamers, viz., "Canadian Raider," "Dunbridge," and "Agadir," asking for advice.

(1) With regard to the treatment of the chief engineer of the "Canadian Raider," who was suffering from kidney disease.

(2) A man on the "Dunbridge," who had sustained a severe crushing injury to one of his hands.

(3) A fireman who had been the victim of a serious accident on the "Agadir."

Five replies were sent at the instigation of Dr. Drury, the "Metagama" being at the time at least 500 miles distant from the vessels named.

Replies were that satisfactory progress was attending the treatment of patients in accordance with Dr. Drury's instructions.

Calgary.—"I did the company out of \$2.50 and I have hardly been able to sleep ever since. I enclose a remittance for this amount. I am sorry for what I've done."

This was what a man now residing in Eastern Canada wrote J. E. Proctor, District Passenger Agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway. He apparently has been much troubled ever since he "put it over," and has done what his conscience dictated. "Do you receive many of these kind of letters?" asked a press representative when Mr. Proctor showed him the letter. "Oh, yes, quite a lot," said the Passenger Agent, "probably on the average one a month in this division alone. I cannot say why it might be before the whole of the Canadian system. Of course I am referring to the passenger department alone for there are many others." Mr. Proctor called for his "conscience" file, which bore out his remark that it is a very frequent occurrence for people "to lose sleep" during the winter months. Some of these run into fairly large amounts; for instance, one of them some little time ago returned the company \$75. He had been wise as to the matter, but instead of going on the land he went to Vancouver and engaged in some other occupation. On one occasion a man wrote enclosing \$5, of which amount he said he had defrauded the company, and this occurred many years ago.

Montreal.—The Dominion Express Company have had in operation in Montreal during the past few months a unique system for the conveyance of Express shipments in transfer between stations in the city, and the distribution of delivery collection shipments in districts situated four and five miles from the railway stations. This is the tractor trailer system. The tractors are simply two-ton trucks, with a fifth wheel or turning plate mounted on the chassis in place of the ordinary truck body; and in the centre of this fifth wheel is one portion of the automatic coupling device. The trailers are large, completely enclosed bodies, with a capacity of three and a half tons, or 515 ft. cubic measurement, each mounted on two rear wheels, with solid rubber tires, and two small front wheels, with folding legs, to hold the trailer up and permit of movement to any desired position when free from the tractor. On the front of the chassis of the trailer are two small wheels for mounting the track of the fifth wheel on the tractor, and permitting turning of the equipment within a small radius when coupled up; also the other portion of the coupling device by which the tractor and trailer are coupled up.

The process of coupling and uncoupling is a matter of seconds only, merely involving the raising of a lever. The driver never leaves his seat. On the road the trailer brakes are controlled by the tractor.

By this system the movement of transfer has been expedited, stations are kept better cleared of transfer matter, and economies have been effected over the relatively slow movement and smaller capacity of wagon transfer.
