"The mayor and the aldermen can't know what they are talking about when they accuse us of extravagance," he said. "Our rate this year is 14.8 mills. Last year it was 14.6372 mills, so that our increase this year is 14.8 sthan two-tenths of a mill. We have something to show for our money, too, because we have some of the finest schools in Canada.

"What has the council to show for the money it collects in taxes? It certainly hasn't pavements, sidewalks or sewers. These are all paid for on the money is compared to ours."

### Inaugurating Fight Against International "Drug Ring"

New York, March 22.-Opening of a fight to curb the traffic of an international drug ring, which, he says, is headed by businessmen of Germany, Japan and Great Britain, was announced here today by Dr. Carleton Simon, special deputy police commissioner.

Declaring high-ranking officers of steamships plying between New York and the Mediterranean and South American ports have been transporting drugs to the United States. Dr. Simon said that many raids are planned and developments of a startling nature expected. The crews of six steamships are now under surveillance, he added. The deputy police commissioner said the leaders of the "ring had been identified, but that action against them was impossible, as the laws of their countries do not prohibit trafficking in narcotics.





Unnecessary excessive or untimely expenditure from that purse is therefore equivalent to taking money from taxpayers which

otherwise they might, and would naturally prefer, to save or spend personally. It is in effect a hold-up by due process of law for which there is usually no remedy legal or otherwise after the fact

The time to begin controlling expenditure is before it is made. It is customary to divide civic expenditures into "controllable" and "uncontrollable." As a matter of fact, all civic expenditures o'clock, when the income tax will be discussed and explained are controllable—if the control starts soon enough. Interest and sinking fund charges are controllable through the control of the capital expenditure which necessitate the debt charges. Cut Down Debt.
