That the board of education is the only city body which has kept its mill rate to the same level as last year and that it has more to show for its expenditures than any other department, were the claims put forward by Truswere the claims put forward by Trustee J. B. Wright today.
"The mayor and the aldermen can't

"The mayor and the aldermen can't know what they are talking about when they accuse us of extravagance," he said. "Our rate this year is 14.8 mills. Last year it was 14.6372 mills, so that our increase this year is less than two-tenths of a mill. We have something to show for our money, too, because we have some of the finest schools in Canada.

"What has the council to show for the money it collects in taxes? It certainly hasn't pavements, sidewalks or sewers. NEW SEAPLANE IS LIKE SHIP WITH WINGS

London, March 22.-Details of an entirely new type of seaplane, which can either fly or cruise as a warship, have been made public here. Two of these ships are being built for the air ministry. The vessels are said to be much like small ships with wings added. They are larger and stronger than any sea-going aircraft yet con-structed and each will carry a rew of seven with emplacements for five machine guns.
They have a range of 1,500 miles and when not flying will be able to "taxi" along the water, driven by their propellers.

SUITS VETERANS

Secretary Cunliffe of the G. W. V. A. Says It Will Equalize Pensions.

The proposed new pension scheme, as set before the parliamentary committee on soldiers' civil re-establishment by Secretary C. G. MoNeil of the Domin-ion command of the Great War Veterans on Monday has met with the approval of all soldiers concerned in this city. The proposals tabled by Mr. Mc-Neil are as follows: Increase in widows' pensions \$1 per one per cent of disability of pension base; pensions for guardians of soldiers' orphans; no deduction of pension because pensioner does not live in Canada, and the equalization of pensions irrespective of rank. Inaugurating Fight Against International "Drug Ring"

New York, March 22.-Opening of a fight to curb the traffic of an international drug ring, which, he says, is 'headed by businessmen of Germany, Japan and Great Britain, was announced here today by Dr. Carleton Simon, special deputy police commissioner.

Declaring high-ranking officers of steamships plying between New York and the Mediterranean and South American ports have been transporting drugs to the United States, Dr. Simon said that many raids are planned and developments of a startling nature expected. The crews of six steamships are now under surveillance, he added. The deputy police commissioner said the leaders of the "ring" had been identified, but that action against them was impossible, as the laws of their countries do not prohibit trafficking in narcotics.

Unless this is done it is useless to pretend that your school has a good physical education department, for without fair credit for physical training the boy or girl is almost certain to look upon the whole arrangement as the farce you have made it—in short, as "physical torture" or "farcical culture."

A full term of physical training, provided the pupil shows proficiency, ought to bring credits equal to the credits given for a full term in algebra or Latin satisfactorily completed.

The silly performances purporting to be physical training in many schools where no credits as yet are given for the work amount to nothing but a sorry swaste of valuable time and an extravagant expenditure of public funds.

Educators who happen to be ignorant of, let us say chemistry or geography, do not as a rule oppose the teaching of these subjects in school. 


