





In view of the fact that the convention for the selection of a Democratic candidate for the Presidency will be held on Tuesday, 21st inst., it is interesting to note how the balloting has gone in eletions since 1876. In 1876, on the first ballot, Tilden had 403½ out of 738, and required 492. Hendricks had 133½, Hancock 77, Allen 56, Bayard 56. On the second ballot Tilden received 508 votes. In 1880 on the first ballot, Hancock received 171 and needed 492, Bayard had 153\(\frac{1}{2}\), Payne 81, Thurman 68\(\frac{1}{2}\), Field 65, Morrison 62, Hendricks 50\(\frac{1}{2}\), Tilden 38. On the second ballot Hancock received 320 and needed 492, but Bayard had fallen to 113, and Randall could muster only 1283. After the second ballot Hancock was nominated by acclamation. in 1884 Cleveland received 392 votes on the first ballot; Bayard, his chief competitor, 170. On the second ballot Cleveland received 683; necessary to a choice, 547. In 1888 he was nominated by acclamation.

The Magic Maze, a maze of mirrors is the satest novelty at the Horticultural Exhibition in Londen. The visitor enters the maze by a crooked passage, walled entirely ly mirrors, into the central hall, toward which a number of seemingly endiess venues appear to converge. Reproductions of the visitor are presented at every imaginable point and angle. A figure stands at the entrance to the hall and beckons with uplifted hand, and the reproductions show the figure in a hundred different places at once. The bewildered visitors walk about in a caudious, half-scared way, running into their own reflections and ooking with distrust on every one who approaches, unable to tell substance from shadow. The space occupied by the maze being 40 teet by 30 feet, but the arrangenent of mirrors gives it the appearance of ooing acres in extent.

THE TREACHEROUS RIVER. deep or swift-flowing stream, but experience has taught the majority of us that it is far from prudent to take too many chances while boating or bathing in its waters. Saturday's tragedy at the Cove bridge, following many others of a similar nature, should emphasize this fact. It cannot be too strongly impressed upon parents and guardians that there is danger when children go playing either on the water or on the banks of the stream. All the way down the river it is known there are many deep holes, washed out by the multitude of freshets. These are continually changing, so that what may be a shallow bank one month may be a deep hole next. This is made apparent, in a marked degree, at the southwest side of Victoria Bridge. For years there was a deep hele near the bank of the river at that ot, and one or more fatal casualties was the result. Gradually, by the action of the stream, the hole was almost filled, but after the last heavy rain fall, a gravel bank was vas deep water once more in the locality The same results have been produced in various other parts of the stream, both above and below the forks. Then it has been discovered that while the river water is, in the main, warm there are ice cold springs bubbling up at various points, naking it perilous for any person to bath

in the locality, especially if in a heated condition. Only the experienced and the most cautious persons can be regarded as safe when they enter the stream. A man may even be a good swimmer and yet go down through the reaction resulting rom a sudden plunge into very cold water. These are facts which should be laid to neart by both old and young.

The very hot weather affords very strong temptations to the average juvenile to go swimming. The exercise gives both health and pleasure. It would be an excellen thing if the coroner's jury, when discussing the cause of the fatality of Saturday last, would make some suggestions as to the propriety of providing a perfectly safe spot for bathing in the river. Surely it could be supplied at a comparatively small cost.

LONDON AND MIDDLESEX AND THE GERRYMANDER.

The official report of D'Alton Mc Carthy's speech against the infamous system of gerrymandering, which was countenanced by the bill of 1882 and again by the measure now before Parliament, emphasizes the injustice of the system. In regard to the ection which gerrymanders London West into the city, while compelling citizens in the fifth and sixth wards to vote in the adjoining rural constituencies, Mr. Mctownship of Elgin, a township of Huron, adjoining rural constituencies, Mr. Mc-Carthy said:

"The municipality of the city of London "The municipality of the city of London has now 31,100, and nothing could have been more natural, nothing could have been more proper, than that the district of the city of London should have been enlarged to its present municipal boundaries. But the bill leaves a portion of the city of London out in the county, and takes in another part of the county, adding it to London. No matter what the object may be, so far as I am informed, there is really no political object to serve; I do not know so far as I am informed, there is really no political object to serve; I do not know how that its. The very best information I can get is that London would have been just as much strengthened from a Conservative point of view by taking the district as it now stands. I say, no matter what the object may be, the Government, and the honorable gentleman who represents the city of London, could ill afford to have made or tolerated a change of that kind. Now, that Is what the bill has done, and I submit that it is wholly inadequate as a measure of representation. I fail to understand what the principle is for which or against which I am now expected to record my vote. Is it the principle of equality of population? I do not that it is the bill. iple of equality of population? I do not and it in the bill. Is it the principle of adherence to the county or city bounds. That is not covered by the bill before us.

Certainly not; if it had been equality that was sought in this district London West should have been added to South Middlesex with its 18,806 instead of to the four wards of London with their 24,000 and odd of a population. Not a word more need be said to convince any reasonable man of the hypocrisy of the assertion that the change is the result of an honest desire o equalize the constituencies.

Mr. McCarthy believes with the ADVER TISER that the disgraceful gerrymander of 1882, which so many of the Conservative M.P.'s admitted in the course of the debate was a most inequitable measure should be undone. In his speech he thus

commented: commented:

"The law as it has been since 1882, and as it is proposed to be continued for another ten years, does not in the slightest degree follow city or county limits. On the centrary, I find on looking at the act of 1882 these conditions are to be ascertained from it. There are electoral districts, four, I think, which are partly in three different counties—North Brant, Caldwell, Leeds and Grenville, and Monck.

"Mr. McCarthy—The honorable member for Bothwell, who is more familiar than I am with that part of the country, says West Middlesex.

"Mr. McCarthy—Then in two counties there are Addington, Bothwell, East Eigin, East Grey and North Lanark, two of the Middlesexes, if the third is in three counties, North Norlolk, North Ontario, West Ontario, North Oxford, Perth, South Oxford, South Perth, West Peterboro, Russell, East Simcee, South Simcee, Center Wellington, North Wellington, South Waterloo, East, West and North York.

All this cutting and carving was not undertaken to do justice to the electors,

undertaken to do justice to the electors, but with the object of enabling one of the political parties to have an unfair advan-tage over the other. The greater sinner of them all, indeed, gloried in the fact that he had "hived the Grits." It is true, as Mr. McCarthy pointed out, that there have been and will continue to be constituencies that will not consent to be gerrymandered out of their natural affinities without re-senting it, but it is nevertheless a fact that as a consequence of this snameful jugglery the party which indulged in it got a most unfair advantage in the counsels of th

nation. The result of the wholesale dis made evident in the official statement of the general election in 1891, issued by the chief statistician of the Dominion Gov. ernment-a gentleman holding a high position in the Department of Agri-culture. It is there shown that while the Liberal party received an absolute majority of 7,200 of the total votes polled in Ontario, nevertheless they were in a minority of four, having only 44 seats in Parliament against 48 held by their opponents. Surely independent citizens, who believe in the British principle that the majority should rule, cannot defend th continuance of an arrangement so grossly unjust as that. Mr. McCarthy's view is the proper one. He believes in the maintenance of the city and county boundaries, and as far as possible representation according to population. This is what he has said on this subject:

has said on this subject:

"But, Mr. Speaker, what I desire to contend for is that the chief principle ought to be representation by population, that that ought to be qualified by a full and fair expression of public opinion by regard being had to community of interests existing in localities, and also by some regard, being paid to what the honorable member for liothwell (Mr. Mills) advocated the other night in a very foreible manner, permanger, p paid to what the honorable member for Bothwell (Mr. Mills) advocated the other night in a very foreible manner, permanence and stability. Why should there be community of interests? From time immemorial the country has been the political unit. It was so prior to the Reform Bill in England in 1832, It has continued to be so in England from that day to the present, notwithstanding the changes made; and in the Dominion of Canada, in both the Provinces of Quebec and Ontario, and I undestand in the Maritime Provinces, there has always been representation upon the basis that the county or city is the political unit. I believe at first the franchise was conferred on the county, authorizing it to send certain representatives to Parliament—I think that was the earlier history; but since 1832 Parliament has dealt with the matter by its own hands. I submit that no good reason can be found for the departing from it. I do not mean to say you can find anything in the Mosaic law, or even in the Christian dispensation in favor of county lines or city limits, but where the peaple serve together as jurors, act together in political matters, in every way work together in the management of their local affairs, there is a community of interests growing up between them which should not be destroyed, unless there is some controlling reason which offsets these other considerations. I know no possible practical benefit of dividing counties or adding townships to counties. I know of no possible advantage, unless it be the one of an equality of representation, which I have endeavored to show has not been attained by the scheme which now exists."

To make matters worse, to still further trample under foot the municipal boundaries, the new measure takes a county municipality and foists it into the city of London, while it keeps the fifth and sixth wards of the city voting in the county. The ADVERTISER cares not what the party advantages one way or other of such a stupid arrangement may be; but it believes that the system proposed by Mr. McCarthy in atonement for his past support of the gerrymander is a fair, a reason able and a convenient one, and can only re-gret that Sir John Thompson was able to prevail upon all but two of his followers to reject it.

The Thames claimed another victim Saturday afternoon.
