THE LORDS LEARN NOTHING. The British House of Lords follows its usual course when, on the invitation of the Conservative leader, it throws out the bill granting a local legislature to Ireland. For soveral centuries, this irresponsible chamber has been allowed to exist, though no one can point out a single great measure of national improvement which has emanated from it. On the contrary, every great reform that has been proposed in the popular chamber has been either thrown out by the Lords, needlessly obstructed, or damaged and mutilated to the extent of its power. The Lords upheld the rotten boroughs. They opposed the Reform Bill until they were threatened with the creation of a sufficient number of chimney sweep lords to swamp them. They resisted -London young men who have reason to the progress of religious liberty and imconform to the Church espoused by the privileged class. They resisted the extension of habeas corpus and of personal liberty. They opposed the

removal of restraints upon the press. They rigorously resisted the introduction of the ballot. They opposed the abolition of the trade in slaves. As long as they dared, they prevented the reform of criminal law, thowing out Romilly's bill for the abolition of the death punishment in cases of petty theft. They opposed the disestablishment of the State Church in Ireland, and maintained that the provision for religious equality in that island would lead to civil
