If the tariff advances should be less than 15 per cent, their wages will be ad-





Chicago, Nov. 24.—Today's wheat market was something of a runaway affair, prices advancing rapidly in the face of the comparatively weak cables from Liverpool and the continent. The trade was altogether professional, and was not broad, which probably accounted for the advance not being twice as great as it was. While Liverpool made but ad gain for the day, it was nevertheless due to information from that place that prices here were so strong. The Liverpool Corn Trade News estimated that Europe would require 17,00,000 bu monthly from this country from now until next harvest. Until noon this was the prominent factor, and after that hour Bradstreet's report of an increase in the world's stocks of but 1,500,000 bu, where at least 4,000,000 increase was expected, furnished additional incentive for buying. Closing Paris cables were unchanged to 5 centiles lower for flour, and from 10 centimes higher unchanged for wheat. Antwerp was 24 centimes higher to 50 centimes higher, and Berlin was a mark lower. May wheat opened from 80% to 80%; sold between 82% cand 80%, and closed at 31% to 82c—1% to 1% c higher than yesterday. Cash wheat was strong and 20 higher. May corn closed & under yesterday. 
