"Plainly, however, peace considerations cannot be allowed to regulate the strategic distribution of our ships at the outbreak of hostilities.

TRADE WITH NEW ZEALAND

Exports to Canada Made Threefold Increase Last Year.

Ottawa, Oct. 29. - Mr. J. S. Larke, Australia, has sent to the department of trade and commerce, a report which contains the following paragraph: The total trade between New Zealand and Canada in 1905 was £147,443, as against £123,446 for the previous year. This would apparently show a fair growth, but an examination of the items shows that the development is wholly due to the great increase of exports from New Zealand to Canada, which increased more than threefold during the last year, the increase being in wool, skins and sheepskins, a trade formerly done from Australia, but which has now fallen to New Zea-

An examination of the items of im port shows a very heavy decline in bicycles and materials, which has been steadily declining for the last four years. In cotton goods, boots and shoes, agricultural machinery, paper hangings and other items of less extent. The decline in agricultural machinery is due in part to the over-importations of the previous year.

Its crowning blunder was the sale of the labor of the prisoners to a close friend of the Provincial Secretary, at the rate of three cents per prisoner per hour. This labor is utilized in the manufacure of woodenware, but the manufacturers of the same line of goods in the Province, who employ free labor, have entered an indignant protest against this cut-throat competition, and their employes have joined in demanding that the contract be rescinded. Contrary to the pledges of the Government, the contractor has been freed from the obligation to stamp his goods "prisonmade." He has been also relieved of the requirement to deposit \$6,000 a year to cover the prison officials' salaries, which the late Government exacted from the Independent Cordage Company.
