



Peel was born in London in 1860. He was the son of J. R. Peel, senior partner in the statuary firm of Peel & Powell, which did business on Richmond street on the site now occupled by the London Granite Works. In those days it was customary to erect stone memorials with sketches on them to mark the graves of the departed. These were usually rough carvings depicting Biblical scenes. At the age of 14 Peel received his first instruction in this particular craft. Later he showed pronounced talent for portraiture and at 16 became a pupil under J. I. Judson, who conducted the first art studio in

Of Paul Peel's early life Mr. Hunt speaks with feeling and regret. The two were bosom friends. While Mr. Hunt was inclined to be conservative, Paul exuded joviality, good cheer and a perpetual optimism that endeared him to all. Nature had endowed him with uncommon talent, quick perception and an imagination that ran riot on occasion, besides a capacity for hard, conscientious work-qualities that make for fine creative accomplishment.

O. B. Graves, veteran art merchant, though four years younger than Paul, remembers the famed artist as a lad when the two attended Talbot street school. Peel was a tall, strikinglooking young man, witty, vivacious and agreeable. At the age of 18 he exhibited several pictures here, but no one saw any special merit in them. Like Rembrandt, Greuse and other immortal wielders of the brush and palette. Peel received only faint and grudging recognition from his contemporaries. The ghost of poverty remained his consort through life. It was only long years after death that a fair appreciation

of his masterpieces was vouchsafed. Confidence in Skill.

It is a mistake to assume that genius is the capacity for evading hard work. La Vie de Boheme is a beautiful myth that was first worked out with consummate labof by a man of imagination named Murger and told again with variations by Balzac and Du Maurier. Bohemia is not on the map because it is only a fairy fabric of fiction; its walls being constructed of the stuff dreams are made of and its little life and a brass tray. Yet the semblance of the thing is there and often deceives the very elect. Around every art studio are found young men who smoke infinite cigarettes and throw off opinions about this great man and that and prate in blase monotone about the beautiful. Sometimes these young persons give lectures on "Art As I Have Found It." But one should not be deceived by this. The art that lives is probably produced by shy, red-headed men who work on a top floor and whom you can only find with the help of a search warrant. One sort talks of art, the other produces it. One tells of truth, the other is living it.

Paavo Nurmi Has Brought His Country Into the Limelight by Running One Race in America

HE Finnish paper-hanger with seven league boots has demolished the hoodoo. Paavo Nurmi came over to America a few weeks ago for the purpose of running. He held official world's records for the mile run, the three mile, and has probably done everything in between in record time. But the Finn inherited an uncomfortable sort of a tradition. All his athletic predecessors, Carpentier, the British poloists, the British golfers, Epinard and Papyrus, went back to their respective native haunts stripped of a great deal of glory.

When the flying Finn conquered he was there fore hailed as a genius. His fame outgrew the sporting pages. He stepped out to the front of the daily newspapers. If he keeps on in America in the same fashion he will become art. People will make sculptural studies of him and pain him in oil. They always do.

Finland before her athletes began to gather in the crowns of laurel was famous for nothing but name. Except perhaps the mistaken but widely circulated impression that all finnan had-dies were born there. To the average Canadian the country was not particularly interesting.

Then along comes one man, a man with muscles of chilled steel. He runs one race. The name of his country becomes a household word

A man of this type is unique. He has done what no procession of trade missions or diplomatic ambassadors could do. He is a tremendous advertising campaign in the interests of the little Scandinavian nation. He turns the spotlight on the accomplishments of others of Finland's athletes, following up her marvelous showing at the recent Olympic games. He turns the spotlight on every aspect of his country's life and makes it a matter of current interest. He is a ballyhoo attracting the crowd's interest.

All this was done by a paper-hanger who made himself famous by pulling himself along with his legs, as a writer in the Literary Digest puts it. He works with the precision of a machine. He is a machine, in fact. He lives on rye bread and fish and is a great believer in massage. He has been training steadily for ten years, going different distances and changing his speeds as he does so.

Who is he, this man who travels about without a name, demanding help for the helpless? When he began his career, he was Urbian Ledoux, French-Canadian mill hand and he started at the bottom of the ladder.

But the young Canadian laborer was ambitious. Mill work failed to appeal to him. He stepped out to carve a future for himself. His first move was to emigrate and he left Quebec for Biddeford, Maine, where he started to work in the daytime and study at nights.

His interest in public affairs drew him towards politics and he eventually became, in the early 90's, the secretary of Biddeford's mayor. In 1896 he took another step up and won an appointment in the United States consular service from President McKinley. Roosevelt gave him still another promotion. He spent eleven years in the service, a third of that time as American commercial representative at Prague.

DARLEY SHELDON is an old, white-haired Yankee veteran, but if he allows you to glance at his bank book you will find him credited in a special savings account with the sum of \$54.577. Thereby hangs a tale, as they

BOSSED BUSH KINGDOM BY A THREE-LAW CODE

A. J. Young Ruled Three Thousand Hairy-Chested Males and Watched the Great North Grow

Had to be a Bad One H E used to be top man in a kingdom of three thousand strong, hairy-chested males miles from civilization in a wilder. and a half of lumber camps in the new Nipissing district of Northern Ontario, and each spring twenty to twenty-five million feet of logs went to the mills below in one big drive as substantial evidence of the winter's work.

He was one of the generals of the J. R. Booth Company of that time and was known everywhere as Fred Young. To-day he is A. J. Young and you may find him, if the lure of the bush hasn't called him away, in a downtown Toronto office. Physically he is a giant, a rival of any woods. He is as light on his feet as a dancer, though his age has passed the sixty mark.

He is known as the man who fed the northern part of Ontario, through one or another of the supply companies with which he was connected. He is the man who had the nerve to build the first customs concentrator at Cobalt, and is now the president of a large iron works at New Liskeard, Ont.

He has been chosen for a thousand pinch hitting jobs. He worked on the Victory Loan campaigns and has led a dozen community drives. He was asked to take charge of the relief work after the disastrous fire at Haileybury, Ontario, two years ago.

Born in Canada of Scotch-Irish descent, he grew up with timber. At fourteen, he was doing a full-grown man's work with axe and pike-pole. In 1886, he took charge of the Booth operations in Northern Ontario and handled them in a thoroughly efficient manner till he launched out for himself in 1904.

He was one of the most successful rulers of men ever seen in the lumbering regions of Ontario and Quebec. He outlines the laws by means of which he controlled thousands of men of mixed tongues, races and ideals, as follows:



How Camphor is Made

Originally obtained from gum deposits occasionally found in old camphor trees, it is now extracted from the wood itself, which after being sawn through lengthwise, is reduced to chips and heated in a still,

The vapor given off in this way passes through bamboo pipes into a cooling chamber, where it condenses in crystal form, known as "flowers." These crystals are collected and exported where they are further purified by being mixed with lime and charcoal and refined in special retorts. The oil thus obtained should not be confused with camphorated oil, which consists of camphor dissolved in olive oil.





The time was when the tides came in at Toronto and almost reached Hamilton, but that was perhaps 10,000 years ago and an Ontario man of the present day would have to fly to James Bay to see the tide ebb and flow in his own province. In a few years, perhaps, when the T. and N. O. Railway reaches Hudson Bay, we can study tides comfortably at some northern summer resort of our own: but nowadays it is easier to go to Quebec or the other beautiful provinces down by the sea.

This withdrawal and return of the waters every twelve and a half hours, like the slow breathing of a living earth, is a perpetual reminder that our little world is not alone in the universe. All sorts of outside influences are tugging at it, especially from our nearest neighbor, the moon, and our distant parent, the sun.

The waters on the side toward the moor are pulled more strongly toward it than the earth usual. When they are at right angles to one

The next morning is as a whole, because they are 4000 miles nearer I watched the flow of the tide, when every it, while the waters on the opposite side are 4000 miles farther away than the centre of the earth and are slightly left behind; and so there is a gentle heaping up of the sea on the two sides of the earth, following the moon from east to west as the earth rotates on its axis.

The same is true of the sun, but the tide is smaller because of its much greater distance from the earth. Whenever the sun and the moon are in the same line, whether in the same direction or the opposite direction, they help one another and we have spring tides, higher than

neap tides, lower than usual.

Wonders of Wolfville

O N islands in the open sea the tides amount to only three or four feet, but where inlets and bays extend as funnels into the land into a corral; and then the tide becomes a pow erful force in shaping its shores and in mould ing the life of people who live on them.

The best example of such reinforced tides is you get a chance go to Wolfville or Grand Pre or Sackville and study them. The region is historic and beautiful and well worth visiting on its own account.

If you go down to the shore at Wolfville about high tide you will see a neat little harbor with a schooner at the wharf beside a storehouse and wavering reflections of masts and walls and sky just as you would at a harbor on Lake Ontario; but if you go there six hours later you are horrified to find a basin of slimy of a great estuary like the bay of Fundy or red mad without water or reflections, and the Bristol channel in England means the expendischooner aground like a fish out of water and with a drunken tilt to its masts and deck.

A trim little steamer lies at a pier not far away when the tide is in and you can step on board and take passage to other towns on the bay. When the tide is out the pier stands up on enormous stilts above a vast sweep of mud with only a trickle of water flowing at the sight in the distance. If you want to take the of machines to be set in motion by the tide steamer a week later it is well to remember that the tide gets fifty minutes later every day and of it so far. that in a week it will come in at three o'clock in the afternoon instead of ten in the morning.

Fishermen and other sea farers must order their movements by the tide table and not by the hour of the day. The rhythm of their lives is adjusted to the moods of the moon rather than to the rising and setting of the sun.

You will, of course, go to see Grand Pre and muse over the fate of Evangeline, and you will also see the lush grass of the dyked meadows, reclaimed from the salt marshes by the work of the tides themselves. Open the sluices in the dykes when the tide comes sweeping in with the mud gathered from the bottom of the bay of Fundy, then close the sluices till the mud settles and the clear water can be discharged when the tide is out; and so the meadow can be built up gradually to spring tide level and provide the richest soil in the Maritime Provinces.

rt is worth while to stand on some bridge over a stream valley and watch the tide flowing in, its opaque waters swelling and stirring the reeds and the coarse marsh grasses and driving inland like a flood, completely reversing for the time the direction of flow of the river. times, as at Moncton, the tide rushes up the channel as a low wall of water, the bore, lifting the stranded boats, jostling them against the wharves and stirring everything out of its lazy tranquility. As it is now the great tides of Fundy and thousand other inlets of the sea do only geological work, wearing down the rocks along their shores and carrying the mud and sand far out to be deposited in the depths. In the lapse of ages these will be filled and the ground-up materials of the shores will form mud flats which may some day be lifted a little and make

There can be no doubt that the sweep of the tides as they follow the moon round the world does work of another kind. They form a break on the rotating globe and very gradually slow down its motion. The day was once much shorter than it is now, perhaps not more than six hours in length in the beginning, and in the future it will steadily grow longer, second by second, until at last there will be only one rotation in a month and the earth and the moon will be in harmony. Then there will be only thirteen days in a year. The rate of change is exceedingly slow, however, and the present generation need not worry over the matter.

W. E. S. of Dutton writes: I re-cently constructed a reflex set using one tube and crystal detector, with

one tube and crystal detector, with a honeycomb coil and condenser as a radio frequency transformer. I can take the crystal detector out of the circuit and still hear signals. What is the trouble?

Ans.—It is quite evident that in the construction of your receiver, you made some mistake, otherwise you would not not be able to hear signals when you remove your crystal detector. Go over your conections very carefully and make sure that your leads do not run parrallel. See that everything is connected right, or better yet, re-hook up your receiver. that everything is connected right, or better yet, re-hook up your receiver. Be careful about battery connections. You are using your tube for a rectifier (detector), and the current is leaking through some of your leads. Reflex sets require very careful construction in order to work correctly, and you should not go about construction of these sets unless you are prepared to take every care and precaution, with plenty of time, in the wiring, and using only the best of lowloss parts.

"I am located on the outskirts of our town, and have great trouble getting distant stations of the south and southwest, although I use four tubes and can get the far western and northern stations. I should be able to get farther distances as the set

Examine your ground connection and try using another ground in connection with it. Examine your loud speaker carefully, and test it to see if the fault is in it or the set itself. If with these tests you have no better success it would be a good plan to call a reliable radio man.

FEES FOR TOURIST CAMP ARE URGED




