

St. Petersburg, May 28. - Capt. Jakovliff, former commander of the Russian battleship Petropavlovsk, who was wounded when his ship was destroved at Port Arthur on April 13, in an interview regarding the possibility of the Japanese capturing Port Arthur, declared that it would take 150,000 men, with magnificent artillery, to accomplish the task. The blow has been a heavy one, as the position lost was of great value, strategically. Added to this, it is claimed by the victors that fifty cannon were taken. 



ONE OF LONDON'S LANDMARKS-ORIGINALLY A CHURCH, NOW USED AS A WAREHOUSE.



The above is a picture of a landmark of London, which is now used as warehouse, but which was for 31 years the church of the Baptists of the city. It is situated on the southeast corner of York and Talbot streets, and was originally without the small annex, the old building being of colonial architecture with massive pillars in the front. It was completed in 1850, there the Baptists worshiped until 1881, when on Dec. 4 the last services were held in it, the congregation having grown so much that it was necessary to build the present church on Talbot street north. The first Baptist services in London were held in the old Mechanics' Institute building on the courthouse grounds in 1844, and two years later "The Regular Baptist Church of London" was organized with nine members-William Wakeling and wife, J. H. Haines and wife, Lieut. Allright and wife, James Hitchens and wife, and Mrs. Henry Groves. Services were then held in an old methodist church at the corner of King and Talbot streets, until 1850, the first pastor being Rev. James Inglis. In 1877 the name "York Street Baptist Church" was adopted.

It may be indicated by the fact that in a few years the savings of the late Grand Vizier Ben Hamid amounted to \$5,000,000-not made in speculation or business ventures, but saved out of his salary. 





Thing to Exterminate These Provoking Pests.

With the passing of spring and the coming of the warm summer months arrives the necessity for packing away winter wearing apparel and household hangings and bedclothes, and of more than passing interest the protecof these articles from the inroads matter.—Country Gentleman. of clothes moths.

"There is no easy method of preventing the damage done by clothes moths, and to maintain the integrity of woolens or other materials which are likely to attack demands constant vigilance, with frequent inspection and treatment," said Mr. C. L. Marlatt, first assistant entomologist of the department of agriculture.

"In general, they are liable to affect injuriously only articles which are put away and left undisturbed for some little time. Articles in daily of weekly use, and apartments frequently aired and swept, or used as living rooms, are not apt to be seriously af-Carpets under these conditions are rarely attacked, except sometimes around the borders, where insects are not so much disturbed by walking and sweeping. PROTECTION TO CARPETS.

"To protect carpets, clothes and cloth-covered furniture, furs, etc., they should be thoroughly beaten, shaken, brushed and exposed as long as practicable to the sunlight in early spring, either in April, May or June, depending on the latitude. The brushing of carpets is a very important consideration, to remove the eggs of young larvae which might escape notice. Such material can then be hung away in clothes closets which have been thoroughly cleaned, and, if necessary, sprayed with benzine about the cracks of the floor and the baseboards. If no other protection be given, they should be examined at least once a month during summer, brushed, and, if necessary, exposed to the sunlight. PROTECTION TO CARPETS. necessary exposed to the sunlight.

'It would be more convenient, however, to so inclose or wrap up such material as to prevent the access of the moths to it, after it has once been thoroughly treated and aired. This can be easily effected in the case of clothing and furs by wrapping them up tightly in stout paper or inclosing in well-made bags of cotton or linen cloth or strong paper.

"Dr. Howard has adopted a plan which is inexpensive, and which he has found eminently satisfactoy. For a small sum he secured a number of the large pasteboard boxes, such as tailors use, and in these packs away all winter clothing, gumming a strip of wrapping paper around the edge, so as to seal up the box completely and leave no cracks. These boxes, with care, will last many years. With thorough preliminary treatment it will not be necessary to use the tar-impregnated paper sacks sold as moth protectors, which may be objectionable on account of the odor.


