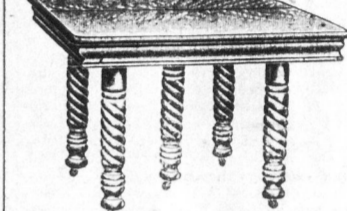

THE PULPIT AND PEW

MUST WORK TOGETHER FOR EFFICIENCY AND CHURCH TRIUMPHS.

DIVIDED THEY CANNOT STAND

Duty of Christian Men and Women to Confess Christ Before Men and to Be Witnesses For the Truth of Religion—Testimony For the Gospel Will Excite Many Evils.

Entered according to Act of Parliament of Canada, in the year 1903, by William Baily, of Toronto, at the Dept. of Agriculture, Ottawa.

Chicago, Feb. 8.—In this sermon the preacher shows that the pew is no less responsible for spiritual stagnation than the pulpit and that a dumb pew makes a dead church.

A practical application of this principle is now facing us, one and all. Are we Christian men and women ready to give our gospel testimony wherever we go? Are we ready to tell what Jesus Christ has done for us? Ready, even though it may bring upon us sneers and ridicule? Ready, though it should involve persecutions and ostracism? Ready, as the young man of old was ready, who stood up and witnessed before the priests and the pharisees, when he made a division among them?

into him!" It is not the pulpit that is dead; it is the pew which refuses to speak and therefore has lost its power to listen.

John Wesley, one of the greatest men who ever lived, no matter how you take him, realized, and profoundly realized, that a dumb pew invariably meant an ineffective pulpit and a dead church.

The older denominations of England at that time entered at the Wesleyans. In decision they called them "Methodists" because they did everything unmethodically.

Now, my Christian friends, while I rejoice in foreign missions and would not abate your interest in them, I want to ask you this pertinent question: Do you think we should allow our country to be monopolized by a few who are seeking them out and overlook the danger of those

who are living in sin by our own door. Do you think that the Samaritans and the Austrians and the Moris and Africans begges should be any more precious in God's sight and in ours than the man or the woman about whose personality you never care until you see a black crape hanging upon the opposite door? Oh, man, if you had the true love of Jesus Christ in your heart, you would act differently toward your unknown neighbor.

Oh," says some man or woman sitting before me. "I could not speak a word for Christ in the store. It would not be appropriate. Such a course as that would be resented not only by my employers, but also by the employees." Would it, my brother? I think such a course would often be gladly welcomed in the store instead of being resented.

There is less drunkenness, less rows, less crimes, less idleness and slothfulness, and my men are happier and more faithful." Now, my Christian friends, with such a testimony as that before you, do you not feel encouraged to speak a word for Christ in the store and in your place of business?

Would that the dumb lips of Christian testimony might be unloosed by our own friends among our loved ones, as well as among the strangers who are outside the four walls of our home. I place this spiritual obligation upon my own heart and life as well as upon yours.

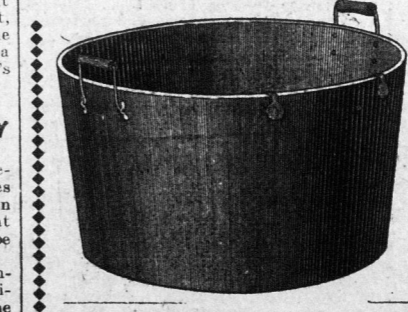
