# St. Alban's Cathedrai School for Boys

THE GATHEDRAL CLOSE, TORONTO

#### ITS FOUNDIN - AND WORK

At Easter, in eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, St. Alban's Cathedral School began as a class for the boys of the Cathedral. It was soon found to fill a long-felt want, and at once took its place as Toronto's School to fit the boys of our Church for University and business life.

The growth of the School has a number of times necessitated the enlargement and improvement of the School building. This year, to keep pace with its growing needs, it has been decided to remove the School to Weston. A twenty-five acre tract in the outskirts of the village has been purchased; plans have been accepted for a \$25,000 building, and the work will be started at once, so that September, 1909, will find the School in its new home.

The new grounds are ideal ones for a school. They lie directly north of the village, between the Westen road and the Humber. Bordering on the river is a level flat of about eight acres that will be used as the athletic field. Back of this the ground rises to a terrace, well wooded, on which the building will stand. The dimensions of the new building are to be 116 ft. by 60 ft. It will have

four storeys, besides the basement, and will accommodate sixty boarders. It will be equipped with every modern convenience, is in easy reach of Toronto by trolley, and yet has all the advantages of the country.

One of the distinctive features of St. Alban's is the special attention that is given to individual pupils. It has been the policy of the School to have the instruction given in small classes. Much better work can be done in classes of from ten to twenty pupils than when the classes have from thirty to fifty pupils. By having a sufficiently large teaching staff, the classes can be kept small, and thus the work of each pupil can be carefully supervised by the master. Pupils need never be kept marking time for lack of attention. This advantage is shown by the age at which St. Alban's boys are fitted for matriculation. For several years our boys who have gone up for the examinations have averaged less than sixteen years.

#### COURSE OF INSTRUCTION

The Course of Instruction covers all that is necessary for candidates preparing for Matriculation Examinations in the Universities of the Dominion, and the Royal Military College, Kingston, Ont.

Classics, Mathematics, Modern Languages, Physical Science, Divinity, Shorthand, Bookkeeping, Drawing, Music (vocal and instrumental) and Military Drill, are all taught as part of the regular entriculum.

Special attention is given to boys wishing to enter into commercial life.

The School is divided into an Upper and Lower School; the latter being preparatory to the former. Boys are received into the Lower School when they are able to read and write.

A Confirmation Class is held annually in the School after Easter for pupils, who are presented to the Bishop in the Cathedral during the month of June.

A class in Carpentery is carried on during the Winter months, a room being specially fitted up with benches for that purpose.

#### THE RESIDENCE

A large residence accommodating thirty boys is immediately opposite the School building, and is well adapted for the purpose. It is well heated and ventilated; is fitted with the most modern sanitary arrangements; the dormitories are on the second and third floors, and are each under the control of a flat master.

#### REGULATIONS FOR BOARDERS

Boys in residence are under the personal supervision of the Head Master, assisted by the other masters in residence; the regulations of the honse being under the direct control of the Head Master.

Mrs. C. Schneider, the Lady Matron, who has had a wide experience of boys and household management, is in charge of the domestic arrangements.

The present residence is capable of comfortably accommodating thirty or more boys, exclusive of the staff, and the dormitories are arranged so as to hold from three to five boys each, in which they are distributed according to age. All the boys dine together with the masters in a large and spacious dining room. The food supplied is plain and of the best quality. Under no circumstances are the boys allowed to have any catables in their dormitories.

When parents or gnardians desire, pupils may remain during the vacations at a charge of five dollars per week for board and are. The fees for boarders include all the ordinary expenses such as lanuary, mending, etc.

Parents may supply their boys with pocket money, or, if preferred, a sum not exceeding 25e per week will be provided by the Sehool and charged to the account. To prevent extravagance and losses, parents are requested not to send money in large amounts to their boys. A sum may be deposited with the Head Master, who will distribute it as required.

Under no circumstances will a boy be allowed to go away from school during a term, except for some urgent reason which meets with the approval of the Head Master. It is therefore requested that permission will not be asked for boys to go home during a term, as it is impossible for a boy to progress satisfactorily when his studies are interrupted by absence from school, even for a short time.

#### **CLOTHING LIST**

Every boy should, on entry, be furnished with the following articles, all of which must be plainly marked with the name in full. He should bring two lists with him, one of which is to be handed to the House Master or Matron upon arrival.

In the case of boys not going home for the vacations, parents should see that they are provided with underwear suitable for the different seasons. The clothing of boys is inspected from time to time.

#### DINNER FOR DAY BOYS

Day boys can dine in the residence at a charge of \$12.00 per term. All who intend doing so must give their names to the House Master, and provide themselves with a table napkin ring.

#### MEDICAL ATTENDANCE

In ease of illness or other cause for medical attendance, Dr. A. J. Harrington, M.R.C.S., who resides close to the School, will be called. If parents desire any special physician, his address should be given to the Head Master. It has also been arranged with Dr. McLaren (Dentist) to examine and attend to the boys' teeth when necessary.

#### **TERMS**

There are three terms in the School year:

Michaelmas Term, from Sept. 10 h to Dec. 18th, 1908.

Lenten Term, from Jan. 11th to April 8th, 1909.

Trinity Term, from April 20th to June 30th, 1909.

#### **FEES**

The tuition fees for day boys in the Lower School (Forms IIB and IA) are \$15.00 a term; \$90.00 a term for boarders, including tuition; and for day boys in the Upper School (Form II. and above), \$25.00; for boarders, \$100.00 a term.

Each boy will be charged \$1.00 each term to meet the expenses of gymnasinu, cricket, footiall, hockey, etc.

The above fees it de all expenses content with the School except books, stationery, breakages, chemical apparatus, and also music, fencing and carpentry, which are taught as extras.

The fees are payable in advance, the accounts being rendered at the commencement of each term. If they are paid within the first month of the beginning of the term a discount of \$2.00 will be allowed for day boys and \$10.00 for boarders.

A half term's notice is required before boys are taken away, otherwise full fees will be charged for the cusning term.

#### **ENTRANCE REGULATIONS**

Those who are entering new boys will be furnished with an entrance form, which must be carefully filled out. A certificate of good conduct and character from the Head Master of their last school must accompany the application for entrance.

#### **REPORTS**

At the end of each half term reports are furnished to parents or guardians, showing the progress; and at the end of each term a full report, showing standing and progress of each boy.

#### LIBRARY

In the res dence the boys are provided with a Reading Library of carefully selected books by standard anthors, suitable for boys' reading; also periodicals and daily papers.

#### **PRIZES**

An annual Silver Medal, given by Mr. A. K. Goodman, Barrister, of Cayuga, Ont., is awarded to the boy who obtains the highest percentage of marks for conduct and studies.

A prize, given by the School Corporation, is awarded every year for Mathematics in the Senior Form.

A prize is given every year by Trinity University, Toronto, for Classics.

The Cathedral Chapter gives an annual prize for Modern Languages.

The Lord Bishop of Toronto gives a prize for Divinity in each form.

The Rev. H. T. Archbold gives an annual prize for general Biblical knowledge.

Rev. Canon Cayley presents an annual prize for music, open to boys taught in the School.

Other prizes are awarded to the various subjects throughout the School.

The prizes are distributed on a day appointed after the midsummer vacation.

#### SAINTS' DAYS AND HOLY DAYS

A short service is held on these days in the Cathedral at 10.30 a.m., when the boys are specially addressed on the subject of the day. These services are choral and are rendered by the School boys.

#### CHOIR SCHOLARS

Boys of the School who belong to the Cathedral Choir are called "Choir Scholars." and are entitled to certain privileges. They are granted a reduction varying from five to twelve dollars a term, depending on their usefulness, when in the Upper School, provided all regulations are complied with. They must attend practices in the Cathedral twice a week, and be on duty at all services. The utmost regularity is exacted, and absence is never excused, except in cases of sickness or other unavoidable circum-

stances. Upon leaving the Choir through the changing of their voices, they will still have certain privileges of regular choristers, if they obtain the certificate of faithful attendance to their choristers' duties. This certificate is given as a reward of the highest merit only, and is therefore of great value to a boy in after life; but no boy is eligible for this certificate and its attendant privileges unless he has served three years as a chorister.

#### MUSIC

Where instrumental music is desired, arrangements can be made for tuition in piano, pipe organ, or violin. This, of eourse, is by special arrangement with the leading teachers of Toronto, the fees for which are extra.

The eareful instruction, under the Choirmaster of the Cathedral, affords an excellent opportunity to any boys who have suitable voices and are willing to enrol themselves and perform their duties as choristers. No fees are charged for this instruction.

#### SCHOOL PAPER

The paper in connection with the School is known as "Crnx Anrea." It is published once during each term, and contains accounts of the current events of interest in the School besides many other articles of interest and information. The subscription is 50c per annum. This paper is edited and managed by the boys.

#### THE SCHOOL CAP

It is a strict rule of the School that the boys wear the School cap, which is made of dark blue serge with the badge and motto of the School worked in front. Parents are requested to see that the name is plainly worked inside.

It is to be obtained only from Holt, Renfrew & Co., King Street East, to ensure uniformity.

#### **BOOKS AND STATIONERY**

The necessary stationery and books used are supplied in the School at regular prices and charged into the account.

#### PHYSICAL TRAINING

Healthful atheltic exercises are encouraged, there being in connection with the school large grounds and athletic field, where cricket, football, hockey, etc., are played; there is also a gymnasium for exercise in bad weather.

At the new grounds excellent swimming and bathing is afforded. Boys who are not able to swim are taught to do so with safety, the bathing always being supervised by a master.

Special attention is paid to the direction of Sports, in the belief that the right use of games is a valuable part of a boy's education. The grounds in which the School stands afford an excellent field for Cricket. Rugby and Hockey, which are regularly played in their seasons. The games are all under the management and control of the masters. An efficient coach is engaged for the cricket season.

R. G. Davidson, Esq., has presented a handsome silver cup, to be given each year to the boy who gains the highest batting average for the cricket season. A bat is given also each year to the best bowler, and to the boy who makes the highest score during the season in a first eleven match.

#### **ATHLETICS**

The Annual Field Day of Athletic Sports is held in June of each year. This occasion is always much enjoy d by the large number of parents and friends of the School who assemble to grace

the field with their presence. The entries usually are large, and the competition in all events keen.

A "Championship Silver Cup," given by the School Corporation, is awarded to the boy who gains the highest number of points in all events. It is held from year to year.

A second championship prize of \$10 value is given annually

by Dr. R. L. Hearn.

A "Gold Medal" is given every year by the Masters to the boy who wins the highest number of points in running and pemping contests, and, nulike the Champion Cup, is kept by the winner.

Dr. A. J. Harrington has kindly offered an annual Gold Medal for an open quarter-mile race.

The Aquatic Sports are a distinctive feature of the School, to which special attention is given, in order to encourage boys in the necessary art of swimming.

Swimming and Diving Competitions are held annually at Weston during the summer term.

A Cross Country Run is held in the Michaelmas Term, the distance being five miles, the winner holding a silver enp for the year.

A Gold Medal has been offered, to be competed for animally, and to be awarded to the boy showing the greatest proficiency in the art of bringing a drowning person to shore and in restoring animation.

#### THE RIFLE CLUB

The Rifle Club in connection with the Cadets is found to be a most valuable factor in the School. During the Winter months practice is held with the miniature range, while most of the long range shooting is held at the Long Branch Ranges, when parties of boys are taken out and are fully instructed in the use of the rifle.

Competition in shooting with other schools is held annually, and an annual School match is also held each antunm.

#### **CADET GORPS**

The corps consists of two companies, and was formed under the Government regulations for such in educational institutions. It is composed of boys who are in regular attendance at School. Those over fourteen years of age are admitted to the senior company as vacancies occur, while the junior company is composed of boys from twelve to fourteen years.

The object of the corps is to promote interest in military drill, to teach the proper use of the rifle, and as incentive to discipline. The officers and section commanders are all appointed from among the boys.

In the senior company a competition is held between the sections for general efficiency throughout the School year. An annual trophy (a handsome bronze shield on which the number of the winning section and the name of the commander is inscribed) has been presented to the School for this purpose.

Besides drill and rifle shooting, a feature in the company is the Signal Corps, composed of 10 boys, who are taught the regular systems used in the army and navy, viz., the Semaphore and Morse, both with flags and the heliograph. A pair of binocular field glasses are given animally to the mest efficient signaller in speed and accuracy. This company is composed of the younger boys between the ages of twelve and fourteen. It has also a Signal Corps of four boys, who are instructed in the Semaphore system but not the Morse.

When the boys in this company become over fourteen they are transferred to the senior company as vaeancies occur.

#### THE NAVY LEAGUE

A branch of the Navy League has been formed in the School, and by means of Lantern Lectures, etc., the boys have brought before them their duty to the empire. The membership, which includes admission to all lectures, etc., and a badge, is 25c yearly for children and \$1.25 for adults. Members also have the privilege of using the School Naval Library.

A prize is awarded annually by the head office in London. England, for the best essay on some given naval subject.

The popularity with which this branch has been received promises well for its success, there being already on the roll 110 members in the School alone. All particulars with regard to the formation of branches, etc., will be gladly given by the Hon, Secretary.
