CONTENTS.

ECLIPSES IN 1847.

There will be two Eclipses of the Sun, and two of the Moon this year.

1. There will be an Eclipse of the Moon at the time of Full Moon, on Wednesday, March 31st, in the afternoon, invisible in America. Visible in the Eastern Hemisphere.

2. There will be an Eclipse of the Sun on the 15th of April, at the time of New Moon in the morning, invisible in America. This Eclipse will be visible at the Cape of Good Hope, Madagascar, Australia, Borneo, Sumatra, Java and the neighbouring Islands. It will be central and total on the meridian in longitude 89 deg. 58 min. east of Greenwich, and latitude 24 deg. 30 min. south. Its chief visibility will be in the Indian Ocean and the adjacent tract of the Southern Ocean, extending to 80 deg. of south latitude.

3. There will be an Eclipse of the Moon on the 24th of September at the time of Full Moon in the morning, invisible. The beginning of this Eclipse may be seen at California and the Oregon Territory, and at Alaska the whole will be visible.

4. There will be an Eclipse of the Sun on Saturday the 9th of October, at the time of New Moon in the morning, invisible in America. Visible in Europe, the greater part of Asia, and the northern part of Africa. This Eclipse will be central and annular on the meridian in longitude 47 deg. 11 min. east from Greenwich, and latitude 31 deg. 22 min. north. It will be annular in the south part of Great Britain and Ireland, and in the north of France. The centre will pass very little south of Cape Clear in Ireland, about fifteen miles south of Exeter, in England, and about the like distance north of Havre, in France; but the annular phase of the Eclipse will extend for more than one hundred miles on each side of the path of the centre.

1. Venus will be the Evening Star, until October 3d, then Morning Star, until July 22d, 1848.

2. The Moon will run highest, this year, about the 27th degree of Gemini, and lowest about the 27th degree of Sagittarius.

3. Latitude of Herschel, about 39 min. 30s. south, this year.

4. Longitude of the Moon's Ascending Node in the middle of this year, 6 signs, 14 degrees.

5. Mean obliquity of the Ecliptic in the middle of this year, 23 deg. 27 min. 23.1s. True obliquity same time, 23 deg. 27 min. 23.6s.

POST-OFFICE REGULATIONS.

Corrected to 1st of November, 1846.

LETTERS.—1. Letters sent by post in Canada, and the other Provinces in British North America, are to be charged by weight.

2. The scale of weight for charging postage is to be the same as that by which letters to and from the United Kingdom, via Halifax, are at present

charged, viz:—On a letter not exceeding half-an-ounce in weight, one rate of postage. Exceeding half-an-ounce, 2 rates. Exceeding 1 ounce, 4 rates. Exceeding 2 ounces, 6 rates. Exceeding 3 ounces, 8 rates. And for every ounce above four ounces, two additional rates are chargeable, and every fraction of an ounce is chargeable as one additional ounce.

3. The rates of postage to be charged on letters conveyed by the post, to and from any of the post-towns in British North America, remain unaltered.

4. Letters for the United Kingdom, if intended to be sent direct from the Canadian frontier to Boston, without passing through Montreal, *must be* specially addressed “*via the United States*,” and will be liable to a tax of 8½d. for each single rate, which *must invariably be pre-paid*. Of so much importance is it, that the words “*via the United States*” should be affixed to the address, that any such letter, even with the proper postage pre-paid at an office, will, according to the Postmaster’s instructions, be forwarded by the regular official channel via Montreal, should the above formality be omitted.

5. Letters from Great Britain, when redirected in these Provinces, are subject only to an additional tax of 2½d. currency for each single rate.

NEWSPAPERS.—6. For every Colonial or British newspaper, sent by the post between any places in British North America, the rate will be one half-penny currency, *to be pre-paid or not, at the option of the sender*.

7. For every such Colonial newspaper sent from Canada to a British Colony beyond the sea, when not intended to pass through the United Kingdom, or to any foreign country (the United States excepted), one half-penny currency, to be invariably pre-paid at the time of posting. *Note.*—In addition to any foreign or sea postage to which it may be liable.

8. For every such Colonial newspaper sent to any part of the United States, one penny currency, to be pre-paid.

9. United States newspapers brought by the ordinary post to this country, will be liable on delivery to a provincial rate of one penny currency, in addition to the United States postage which may be due thereon; but if posted in Canada, they will be liable to full letter postage.

10. Colonial newspapers addressed to the United Kingdom, or to any British Colony by way of England, and British newspapers sent by post from the United Kingdom to any part of Canada, are exempt from any postage charge, as has been the case hitherto.

11. With the exception of Colonial newspapers addressed to the United Kingdom, and British newspapers addressed to Canada, which are not limited as to weight, a newspaper, to pass under these regulations, must not exceed the weight of 2 oz., otherwise it becomes liable to pamphlet postage.

12. Foreign newspapers, including newspapers published in the United States, if posted in this Province, are liable to full letter postage.

13. Every supplement or additional sheet to any newspaper, is to be deemed a distinct newspaper, and charged for accordingly.

PAMPHLETS AND OTHER PRINTED PUBLICATIONS—14. Pamphlets and publications printed in the United Kingdom, or in British North America, or in the British West Indies, and reports of Municipal District Councils, posted in Canada, may be sent to another place in British North America, or to the United States, or to a place in the British West Indies, at the reduced inland rate of one penny per ounce in addition to any charge for sea postage, provided they do not exceed the weight of 16 ounces, beyond which it is expressly ordered that no pamphlet or publication shall be forwarded by the post,

15. Pamphlets and publications printed in the United Kingdom, and brought by post or otherwise for delivery in this Province, will be liable to the above rate of one penny per ounce for conveyance through the post in British North America. *Note.*—Less weight than an ounce will be charged as one ounce.

16. Pamphlets and publications printed in the United States, and brought by post from thence into this Province, will be liable on delivery to the rate of one penny per ounce, Colonial charge; but if posted in Canada, such pamphlets or publications will be liable to full letter postage.

17. No printed newspaper, supplement to a newspaper, votes or proceedings of any Colonial Legislature or Municipal District Council, pamphlets or publications, can be conveyed by the post at the reduced rates laid down in these Instructions, unless they are sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the ends. If this is not done, or if any writing or marks appear upon the cover, or

upon the papers, Votes, &c., except the address, the whole packet becomes liable to full letter postage.

18. Printed papers, circulars, or advertisements, cannot pass through the post at the same rate as pamphlets, periodicals, or other printed publications, if they are more especially for the benefit of any particular individual, association or department, whose signatures or firm they bear, such being considered actually letters, printed to save the trouble of writing.

19. Persons transmitting bank notes or exchange through the post, are recommended to mark their packets "*money*," as letters whether paid or unpaid, not so recorded, are difficult to be traced.

Enquiries being frequently made regarding the proper periods for mailing letters intended to go by the Royal Mail Steamers from Boston, and it being almost impossible to prescribe any rule in this respect that will apply the whole year round, persons in the country parts of Western Canada are recommended to ascertain the time it will require for letters to be sent from their post town to Toronto, or to the next principal post-office east of them. During summer the mail to Montreal takes 4 days from Chatham (Raleigh post-office), Goderich, Port Sarnia, Port Stanley, Barrie, or Guelph; 3 days from London, Brantford, Hamilton or Niagara; 2 days from Toronto or Cobourg, and 1 day from Kingston, to which the 3 days allowed from Montreal to Boston should then be added; thus making the time which a letter takes to travel during summer from London, C. W., to Montreal and Boston, about 5 days. In winter, or during the close of the navigation, the time occupied between the same two points will probably be seven days, sometimes eight or nine, so much depending upon the season, or state of the roads and weather. Persons therefore desirous of availing themselves of any particular steampacket from Boston, would do well not to wait till the last day fixed for despatch of the English letters from any particular town in Western Canada, but to mail their letters a day or two previous, postmasters being instructed to forward on all such as fast as received.

The Academical Terms are three—Michaelmas, Hilary, and Easter; and the Terminal Dues, payable by students in the Faculty of Arts, are 4*l.* currency, including all charges for tuition.

Those who are desirous of attending particular courses of lectures, although not members of the University, may be admitted as occasional students, but such attendance will not be regarded as a qualification for a degree.

In October, 1846, the College Council established seventy-two Scholarships: three for each of the districts into which Upper Canada is divided, six for Upper Canada College, and six for the University. They are tenable for three years; and the advantages to be enjoyed during that period are, by the District and U. C. College scholars, exemption from all dues and fees; and by the University scholars, in addition to the above, the privilege of rooms and commons without charge. The first Examination is to take place in October, 1847.

EXTRACT from a Charge of the LORD BISHOP OF TORONTO,
delivered to the Clergy of the Diocese of Toronto, at the
Triennial Visitation, held in the Cathedral Church of St.
James, Toronto, on the 6th June, 1844.

"The employment of the Press was forced upon us some years ago, in self-defence. The bitter calumnies of our enemies against the Church were believed by many, because suffered to pass without contradiction; for those Journals which were the most ready to insert the most atrocious accusations against her, refused to admit a word in her defence. The *Church* newspaper was therefore established for our protection, as well as to supply a convenient medium of communication between the Bishop and his Clergy, and most successfully has it answered our intentions. It has from its commencement been ably conducted, and been continually gaining ground with all persons of intelligent and honest hearts; and for some time past it has sustained a high character both at home and abroad. That every article has been faultless,—every correspondent judicious,—and no point of discussion carried too far, I do not assert; but this much I will affirm,—that those who are best acquainted with the troubles, and anxieties, and vexations which beset the editorial chair of a newspaper, and particularly a religious one, and that sick or well, present or absent, it must be published on a certain day and at a certain hour, feel agreeably surprised that in the course of so many years, so little matter really objectionable has appeared in its columns. It has been essentially useful in making known among our people the true principles of our Catholic Church, in her unity,

doctrines and discipline. Nor has it been less useful in counteracting the influence of certain Journals which have been constantly employing the most vindictive and vituperative language against her. Not that I call upon you to be writers, for this may be inconvenient; and many of you have neither time nor inclination for such employment: but I do call upon you to support the *Church* newspaper, although every word or article may not be according to your views and wishes; for to expect this, would be to expect an impossibility. It must be conducted by one mind, and the minds of its readers are many. The Press is an engine of vast power, and, if rightly directed, of immense importance, and it will be used in this Diocese for good or evil, whiciner we hear or whether we forbear.—Now our object is, through this Journal, to promote the cause of our holy Religion, as taught by our Church in her Articles, Common Prayer Book, Creeds, and Homilies. It is the only channel by which our people through the whole Diocese can be effectually warned against the venom of the revolutionary journals and pamphlets which are daily occupied in poisoning the sources of our domestic, civil, and political welfare; and it is the only means we possess of guarding our people against the sophistries and cavils of Dissent and Romanism on the one hand, and of Infidelity and irreligion on the other. Such are the objects which the *Church* newspaper seeks to accomplish, and hitherto with a measure of success far greater than we had reason to anticipate. It has had, from the beginning, my full confidence; for although I could not approve of everything it contained, the spots were as trifles to its merits; and knowing the great ability and true piety of its Editor, I feel little sympathy with those who, because of some minor differences, are ready in a moment of irritation, at a word or expression which they dislike, to turn against an instrument so extensively useful and almost essential to the prosperity of the Church. I know that it is much read and esteemed in the neighbouring States as well as in England, and takes its place in the first rank of the religious periodical press. I therefore again recommend it as worthy of your zealous and strenuous support."
