The Little Missionary Helpers By Rev. A. H. Barker, B.A.

The little missionary helpers gathered around their Aunt Rebecca, who had just returned from far-away Korea. For some years, at their little Sunday School, which met in Aunt Katharine's home, they had taken up a collection and sent it to Korea to be used there to help in the work, and so they were much interested in that land.

"Aunt Rebecca," said Donald, "what do you see around a Korean house outside?"

"Well," she answered, "you will usually see a six-foot fence made of straw or willow withes. Inside this fence is the yard, and in the yard a dog which makes a great barking, but which goes back about as fast as you go forward. In the fall of the year grain is stacked up around the edge of the yard and threshed with flails, the threshing floor being the ground of the yard.

"The house usually faces the south, so as to get the wa mth of the sun. All the doors are generally on that side. Outside the doors you will see the twine straw shoes of any one who is within. You see, they sit and sleep right on the floor and they do not like to wear their shoes on what to them is their chair and bed.

"Around the yard, too, you will see lots of ugly looking pigs with long snouts, and also plenty of small hens which lay eggs about two-thirds the size of Canadian eggs and which we can buy for six or ten cents a dozen. There are piles of bushes gathered for firewood, a wooden two-wheeled cart, and an ox and donkey which makes a terrible braying at times."

"Aunt Rebecca," said Jack, "have the Koreans cows?"

"Yes," she replied, "but they never drink milk or make butter. They do not know how to milk a cow. They shoe the cows and oxen and use them for plowing, hauling loads, carrying packs on their backs, also for beef. Their hides they tan and use the leather to make harness and other things."

"How did you use the money we sent you?" asked Carl.

"Some of it we used to help repair a school house," replied Auntie. "And some of it was used to help build a church. The people were trying hard to build it without debt. On one occasion the money was all gone and the carpenters wanted a keg of nails. The native pastor, who had charge of the funds, prayed about it, he said, and just then some money came from you, enough to buy the nails, so I gave it to him to use that way. The last you sent we used to help send a little boy to school. His mother was dead,

his father was unable to help him, and he could not get work to do. He was very anxious to study in a school near by and we thought that would be a good way to use your money. The boy's name is Yi Chi T'ek. Here is his picture. Isn't he a fine looking fellow! Some day I hope you will all be proud of him and glad you helped him to go to school."

Tell Me Something to Do By Mrs. C. M. Hincks, B.A.

"Mother, mother, tell me something to do!"

What mother has not heard these words time and again? They are uttered usually in a plaintive tone which cannot be ignored and the busy mother, who wishes that she had as much time on her hands as has her little one, is forced to stop to suggest and invent in order to have peace. The most trying times are the rainy days, or when sickness confines the children to the house and, in addition, makes them fretful and hard to amuse. Even the best tempered and most inventive of children come to mother for ideas at times; and even if our children did not come to us, should we not occasionally go to them and direct their activities, so that their little games may be educative, developing in them memory, imagination and imitation along right lines, and helping them to use their powers and energies for others?

To begin with, our little ones usually delight "to help" mother, and very short-sighted is that mother who ignores this tendency. How little trouble it is to provide the miniature carpet sweeper or broom, or the bit of cloth for a duster; how easy it is to set aside a small piece of dough when baking and have the tiny tin to put it in; how simple to thread a coarse needle (with a double thread which cannot escape the awkwardly held needle) that your little one may help you with your mending.

To be sure, such "help" often hinders you at the time; the dusting has to be watched lest some treasured ornament be broken;

the baking means more cleaning afterwards; the sewing necessitates threading of needles and untangling of knots; but all these activities are affording the child opportunities for expressing the desire to help, a desire which we want to grow and grow, but which, if not nurtured, will wane and wane.

Perhaps you will say these are all activities for girls, but our very little boys enjoy them as much as the girls, and as for the older ones, who are beginning to feel their manliness, perhaps you can entrust them with boards and hammer and nails that they may make some crude article for mother or father. You can employ them for running messages up and down stairs or to the store around the corner. They, as well as the girls, can help look after the smaller ones in the home. They can work in the garden or shovel the snow as father does.

Besides helping mother and father, our children can do so many things for those outside the home. There are the dollies to cut out of the fashion books "for little girls who haven't any" (pointless scissors can be procured for ten or fifteen cents), and how much more attractive they are if gayly colored with crayons. Rare is the child who does not delight to color. There are pictures to cut out and paste in scrap books. If colored cotton cannot be afforded, heavy wrapping paper makes a good substitute for the pages. The simplest of sewing can be done for others, such as strips for rag carpets, little bags, needle books concocted by inserting a piece of flannel in the outer folder of old Christmas cards.

Again, there are activities which, while not directly helpful to others, develop in our children imagination, power to remember and picture the stories which they have heard on Sundays and other days. There is that great invention of recent years, plasticine, so much cleaner and more satisfactory than clay, which affords inexhaustible opportunities. There is the drawing of the story, or, for the older ones, the writing of it and the joy of telling it to mother and the little ones. There are blocks which can be built into Eastern houses and temples, into the walls of the restored Jerusalem with their gates, or the tottering walls of Jericho, into the

lions' den or the pit where Joseph was thrown. A sand pile in a corner of the garden is a great asset for the fine days in picturing these stories.

Perhaps the most delightful activity of all, and the one which best impresses the story and its teachings on the children, is the actual dramatization of that story with the children themselves taking the roles of the persons figuring in it. Noah and the flood, the saving of the baby Moses, David protecting his flocks from the lion and bear, the children singing their hosannas at the triumphal entry—what opportunity such stories afford!

Such methods of impressing the children are employed in the kindergarten and the Sunday School with great success, and there is even more opportunity in the home.

Jesus saying these things. "You will never have to suffer these things," Peter said. "You should not speak about such things. It will make people think less of you." Jesus rebuked Peter for tempting him to hide these things. "Get thee behind me, Satan, for you are tempting me to please people instead of obeying God's will," Jesus said.

Then he called the people around to come near and listen to what he was telling his disciples. He said, "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross and follow me." This is our Golden Text. Jesus was thinking of the way those who were put to death on the cross were treated. They had to carry their heavy, wooden cross all the way from the prison to the place where they were to be put to death. Jesus said his followers must be willing to carry their burden of trouble, which he called their cross, for his sake, and for the sake of carrying the gospel or good news about Jesus to others.

Jesus said that our souls are more precious than anything else in the world. What good would it be if we should gain the whole world and lose our own soul?

Jesus also said, "If any one is ashamed of me and my words, I will be ashamed of him when I come in the glory of my Father in heaven, with the holy angels."

4 And there appeared unto them Eli'as with Mo'ses: and they were talking with Je'sus.

5 And Pe'ter answered and said to Je'sus, Master, it is good for us to be here: and let us make three tabernacles; one for thee, and one for Mo'ses, and one for Eli'as.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Jesus loved the mountain tops. He loved to climb the mountain sides with his dear disciples and spend a quiet time in prayer far away from the noise and crowds of the city streets.

Our story last Sunday told us about Jesus asking the disciples what people were thinking about him and what the disciples themselves thought about him. You remember how Peter said: "Thou art the Christ."

Then Jesus told them the sad things that were going to happen to him. Jesus knew how easy it is to forget to be good. Would his disciples ever forget to love him? Would they ever think he was only a man and not the Son of God? Would they ever forsake him in those sad days to come? Perhaps it would do them good to get a peep at his glory and to think some glad thoughts. Then they would remember this when those sad

days of trial and death came. They would believe because they had seen his heavenly glory. So Jesus went away into a mountain to pray, taking Peter and James and John with him.

Now, while Jesus was praying, a wonderful change had come over him. His face shone as the sun and his robe was shining, white as glistening snow, whiter than any garment ever made. He was changed in appearance, "transfigured," as the gospel story tells us.

While the three disciples were looking in wonder upon his glorious face, they saw that he was not alone. The good old prophet Elijah, with his long, white beard, was standing on one side of him, and Moses, to whom God gave the law for his people, stood on the other side. They were talking with Jesus.

The disciples were filled with wonder at what they saw. They thought, "Oh, if we

could only look always upon this glorious sight!" "It is good for us to be here," Peter said. "Let us stay here always, Lord. Let us build three tents of boughs, one for thee and one for Elijah and one for Moses." They were all excited and afraid at what they saw, and Peter hardly knew what he was saying. He thought that it would be a fine thing to stay always with Jesus up on the mountain.

Just then a bright cloud appeared overhead, and a voice came out of the cloud saying, "This is my beloved Son: hear ye him." These words are our Golden Text. You must all learn them by heart and try to obey the commands of Jesus.

Suddenly when they had looked again, they saw no one but Jesus. The other two had disappeared, and Jesus was alone with them again. You see in the lesson picture the disciples worshiping Jesus in wonder at his heavenly glory which God had allowed them to see. Then they came down again from the mountain top where such wonderful things had happened.

Jesus told the three disciples, not to say anything to anybody about what they had seen, till after he had risen from the dead. They wondered what rising from the dead should mean. We know the resurrection story. They had not heard it yet.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Jesus and his disciples went back again to Peter's house in Capernaum, after Jesus had been transfigured on the mountain top. On the way home Jesus had overheard the disciples quarreling with one another, and what do you think it was all'about? They were quarreling about which of them should be greatest! Now was not that very childish indeed? We can imagine how very sad Jesus would feel as he listened to them as they walked along the way.

He did not say anything about it at the time, but one evening as he sat in Peter's house he called the twelve disciples to him and asked them to tell him what they were quarreling about that day. They were

ashamed to tell him what it was about, so they did not say anything. Then Jesus said, "If any man would be first, he shall be last of all, and minister of all." And this is our Golden Text. Jesus meant that the greatest one is the one who is willing to be last and willing to wait upon the others in an unselfish, kindly way.

Then Jesus called a little child who was amongst those listening to him. The child came running to him, for the gentle Jesus loved the little children and they knew it and loved him too. The little one, without the least fear, climbed on his knee, just as our picture for to-day's lesson shows us.

Jesus put his arms around the child and the

little one snuggled up close to him while he went on talking to his disciples. He said, "Whosoever shall receive one of such children in my name, receiveth me: and whosoever receiveth me, receiveth him that sent me." Jesus meant that they must be kind to the little ones and teach them to love him. They must not be looking after great ones and neglecting the little ones. You must be kind to every child who comes to you and try to help him in every possible way.

After this the disciples began to tell him about somebody who pretended to be one of his followers but was not really a true follower, but Jesus told them to be kind to even such a one, for he might become a true follower. "Those who are not really against us, may be counted on our side," Jesus said, "and they must be counted as our friends."

Jesus told them if any one were kind to them for his sake he would reward them. Even if they only gave them a cup of water to drink, in his name, they should not lose their reward.

Then Jesus turned again to the little child on his knee and he told his disciples that they must be very careful not to turn away any of the little ones that believe in him, or allow any harm to come to them. If they did not protect and teach the children, great punishment would come upon them for neglecting to do so. For there is not a child in all the world who is not very dear to the heart of Jesus, who once was himself a little child.

Go home and sell everything you have and give the money to the poor and you will have treasure in heaven, and come, follow me."

The young prince felt very sad because he could not have eternal life unless he gave his riches to the poor, and he went away grieved. He was not willing to give up his riches. He loved ease and comfort and a good time, and would not give them up even for eternal life.

As the rich young prince walked away down the street to his beautiful home, Jesus turned to his disciples and said, "It is very hard for those who love riches to enter into the kingdom of God. It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter into the kingdom of God." This surprised the disciples very much, for they had always thought that the rich people would be the very first to get into heaven. "If they cannot be saved, who can?" they said.

Jesus told them that it was not possible for people to get into God's kingdom because of their riches or good deeds, but it was possible for God to let anybody in. All things are possible with God. It is not wrong to be rich if we only use our money in an unselfish way.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Jesus was walking along the road to Jerusalem with his disciples. He was a little way ahead of his disciples. He was thinking of the days to come when he should suffer and die on the cross. As the disciples looked at him they were filled with wonder and fear. Jesus turned back and walked with his disciples and began to talk to them about what was going to happen to him very soon. He knew he would never again walk over this road with his disciples, for trouble would begin just as soon as he got to Jerusalem. It would not be long till he would be given up to his enemies, the chief priests and scribes of the Jews, and they would condemn him to be put to death on the cross and would mock him and treat him shamefully and at last they would kill him, but on the third day after he would rise again from the dead.

James and John, those fishermen brothers, came up and walked close to Jesus, one on either side of him. "Teacher," they said, "we would like if you will do for us whatever we ask you." Jesus said, "What do you wish me to do for you?" They said to him, "Grant that we may sit one on your right hand and one on your left hand when you appear in your glory." But Jesus said, "You know not what you are asking. Are you able to follow me through all, my sufferings and to bear what I must bear?" They said, "Yes, Lord, we are able."

Jesus told them that they would indeed have trouble and sorrow and be put to death for his sake. He could promise them that, but he could not promise to give them the

places nearest to him in his heavenly kingdom. Those places were not his to give. They would be given to whoever deserved them most.

When the other ten disciples heard James and John asking Jesus for the best places in his kingdom, they were angry at them and began to find fault with them for asking this, but Jesus called them to him and said, "You know how the kings and other great ones of the world do. They rule over their people and their people serve and obey them, but it is not going to be that way in my kingdom. None of you must want to be head over the others. If any of you wants to become great among you, let him become the helper of the others. Whoever would be first among you, he shall be the servant of all."

Jesus went on to tell them that he, the Son of man, did not come to the world to be waited upon as a king, but he came to help others. He came to serve them and to die for the sins of every one.

The Tenth Commandment is, "Thou shalt not covet thy neighbour's house, thou shalt not covet thy neighbour's wife, nor his man-servant, nor his maid-servant, nor his ox, nor his ass, nor any thing that is thy neighbour's." 91. What is it to covet? To covet is to have a wrong desire for what belongs to others.

But they have scarcely any nice books such as Canadian boys and girls like to read. Christian Koreans have Bibles, hymn books, and can buy many good books.

THE LESSON RETOLD

When Jesus and his twelve disciples came to Jerusalem, Jesus went into the temple. Climbing the steep pathway which led up to the temple, he entered through the Beautiful Gate into the great court of the temple. Jesus was very angry at what he saw there. Men had brought oxen and sheep and doves there and they were selling them to the worshipers for sacrifices to be offered upon the altars, which was the way they worshiped God in those days. Other men were seated at tables changing money for the worshipers, for everybody had to have temple money to put into the collection boxes.

You can imagine what a noise there was.

The mooing of the cattle, the bleating of the sheep, the cooing of the doves, and the loud voices of the buyers and sellers. People were walking through the temple court carrying baskets. Surely the people forgot that it is God's house. Jesus went around amongst them and upset the tables of the moneychangers who were cheating the people and keeping some of their money that they had no right to keep. Then he went amongst those who were selling doves and drove them all out and cut open the cages and let the doves fly away. Then Jesus drove out all the cattle and sheep and the men who were selling them.

Jesus was very angry at these people. He said, "Read in your scriptures, does not God say, My house shall be called a house of prayer? but you have made it a den of thieves." If you look at our picture you will see Jesus driving them out of the temple. How frightened that man looks!

The chief priests and scribes were very angry at Jesus. They thought no one but themselves had any right to say what should be done in the temple. They tried to plan how they could get rid of Jesus. They were afraid that the people would all become his followers, for they were astonished at his wonderful teaching and eager to listen to him. "We must get rid of him," they said to one another, as they scowled and shook their fists at Jesus.

Jesus went away from the temple out to the village of Bethany where he was staying at night in the home of his dear friends, Mary and Martha and their brother Lazarus.

Next day he came again to the temple, and as he was walking through the courts the chief priests and scribes and elders came to him and said, "What right have you to come into the temple and drive those men out? We have charge of this temple, who gave you the right to do these things?" It was God who gave his Son Jesus the right to do whatever pleased him.

THE LESSON RETOLD

One of the Jewish scribes, or lawyers, as we would call them, asked Jesus, "Which is the greatest commandment of all?" Jesus replied, "There is just one God. The greatest commandment of all is, 'Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and with all thy strength.' The next greatest is this, 'Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself,' and no commandments are greater than these two."

The scribe said, "Teacher, you have spoken the truth. There is only one God and to love him with all our heart and mind and soul and strength is better then offering sacrifices and burnt offerings." Jesus was pleased when he heard the scribe say this. "You are not far from God's kingdom yourself," Jesus said. "You are on the right way, and will soon become one of my friends and followers."

Then Jesus went into the temple. He sat down near the door. He could see the people as they came in. In our churches we pass the collection plates for our gifts of money for God's work, but in the temple they had big collection boxes placed near the door. As people came inside the door they dropped

their money gifts into the "treasury," as they called it. Jesus sat looking at the people coming in. He saw many of the rich people of Jerusalem coming in their gorgeous robes of silk and fine embroidery and jewels. They dropped much money into the collection box and never missed what they gave, for they had plenty left for themselves. Jesus knew what they had and what they gave.

After a while a poor widow came along leading her little child by the hand, as our picture shows us. Jesus looked at her as she dropped her two bits of money into the treasury. Just two mites—less than one of our cent pieces. A happy look came over Jesus' face as he turned to his disciples who were standing near him. "See, that poor widow has put more into the treasury than all those rich people have put in, for she has put in all she has. The rich people have put in out of their riches, but she has put in what she really needed for her own use for food for herself and her children."

The widow's gift might seem to be a very small gift in the eyes of the people, but it was large in Jesus' sight. Jesus values our small gifts if we give all we can because we love him.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Long, long ago, God's people the Jews were slaves in Egypt and God helped them to escape from the cruel king. God told them to have a great feast once every year to keep them in mind of his great goodness to them in bringing them back safely to their own land. This feast was called the Passover, and Jews came to Jerusalem from all parts of the world to take part in the great feast and services at the temple. The city, at this time, was crowded with visitors.

The chief priests and scribes wanted to take Jesus and put him to death without letting the people know anything about it, but they said, "We must not do it on the feast day for fear the people who are friendly towards him may make trouble." For there were many in the city who loved Jesus.

Jesus had come to Jerusalem to attend the Passover feast. He was staying at nights with his friends in Bethany. One of them, named Simon the leper, whom Jesus had cured of his leprosy, made a supper for Jesus at his house, and invited Jesus' friends in the village to come to it. Martha was there, for it was she who prepared the supper and waited upon them at the table, and her brother Lazarus was there, sitting close to Jesus.

While they sat at the table, the door of the room was opened and Mary, the sister of Martha and Lazarus, came into the room. She carried an alabaster box of ointment of spikenard, as our picture shows us. This was a very precious perfume which cost a great deal of money. She went to Jesus and

poured it upon his head as he sat at the table, and the sweet smell filled all the house in which the feast was being held.

Some of the disciples were annoyed at Mary. "Foolish woman!" they said. "Why has she wasted all her money? She might have sold this perfume for more than three hundred pence, and we might have given the money to the poor." But Jesus said, "Let her alone. Do not find fault with her. She has done a kind act for me. You have the poor with you always and can give your money to help them any time, but you will not always have me with you. She has done what she could to show her love for me." Jesus said that the story of what Mary had done would be told wherever the gospel is preached, and others will remember her gift, and will do what they can to show their love to Jesus. How wonderful is it that Jesus thinks so much of the smallest act of love which is done to him by his friends!

Jesus wants his followers to be true to him always and he will be true to them and save them from sin and death. He said the words of our Golden Text: "He that endureth to the end, the same shall be saved." Shall we not try to be faithful to Jesus?



THE LESSON RETOLD

If you look at the lesson picture, you will see Jesus and his disciples sitting at a feast, but the disciples are not eating. They are looking eagerly at Jesus. We shall hear what he is saying to them. Count the disciples and you will find that the whole twelve are there. This is no common feast. It is the "Passover" feast. Our story last Sunday told us what that means. The Passover feast was eaten in the homes with as many at the table as there was room for. A lamb was killed and roasted and some bitter herbs were eaten with it, and some thin, hard bread, called unleavened bread, because there was no yeast in it to make it soft and spongy like the bread we eat.

Jesus and his disciples were eating the Passover feast in the home of one of his followers in Jerusalem. Suddenly Jesus said: "One of you at this table is going to go out and tell my enemies where to find me, so that they may take me and put me to death." They said to themselves: "Can it be possible that one of us could be so wicked!" and they began to be very sorrowful. They asked one by one, "Lord, is it I?" Jesus said, "It is one of the twelve who is dipping his bread into the same dish with me." It was their custom to all dip their bread in the same dish, and all who ate together in this way were supposed to be true friends. How mean Judas must have felt, for he knew in his heart that he was the one who was going to betray Jesus.

While they were eating, Jesus took bread and blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. "Take, eat: this represents my body," he said, and then he took the big drinking cup

and when he had given thanks to God, he gave it to them and they all drank of it, and he said, "This represents my blood which is shed for many."

These words of Jesus are not very easy for little people to understand, but next time you go to church on Communion Sunday, you will see the bread and wine being passed, and you will remember that the members of that church are keeping in mind this last supper which we have been hearing about. For Jesus said he wanted all who love him to do this in remembrance of him. He said that would be the last time he would eat the Passover feast with them, for he would soon be with his Father in heaven.

After that they sang a hymn and then they went out to the Mount of Olives and it was night. That same night Jesus said to his disciples, "Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation." This is our Golden Text.



THE LESSON RETOLD

Jesus' enemies brought him to a hill called Calvary, outside the walls of Jerusalem, and there they put him to death on the cross. At the top of the cross was printed, THE KING OF THE JEWS. Beside Jesus' cross there were two other crosses, one on each side of him. Two thieves were being put to death beside Jesus. Long ago, the old prophet of God had said that this very thing would happen.

When Jesus' enemies saw him on the cross, they passed by wagging their heads and pointing at him. "Save yourself, and come down from the cross, if you are able to do all you say you can do. You said you could destroy this temple and build it again in three days," they called out at him. The chief priests and scribes mocking said among themselves, "He saved others, but he cannot save himself from death. Let him come down from the cross and we shall believe that he is the Son of God," and even the two thieves on either side of him taunted him and laughed at him.

As Jesus hung upon the cross, a great darkness came over all the land, and for three hours it was dark as night. Jesus the Son of man was suffering as any man would suffer, and he cried out in agony, "Eloi, Eloi (which means, 'My God, my God'), why hast thou forsaken me?"

Some of those who heard him thought he was calling Elias the prophet to come from lieaven to help him, and one of them ran and filled a sponge with vinegar and put it on a

long pole and gave it to Jesus to drink. "Let him alone; let us see if Elias will come and take him down," this man cried out.

You see how many things Jesus had to bear besides the pain of death on the cross. The taunts of his cruel enemies must have been very hard to bear meekly, but Jesus even prayed for these enemies when he was dying, and asked God to forgive them all. He bore all this suffering for our sins. The captain of the band of Roman soldiers who was standing near the cross and heard Jesus crying out, "Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit," said, "Truly this man is the Son of God." This is our Golden Text.

Look at the lesson picture. Do you see on the ground the shadow of the three crosses? In front stands Pilate, the Roman governor, who gave Jesus up to be crucified, although he could not find any fault in him. The men around Pilate are all enemies of Jesus, and are glad to see him die.

Away at the side, you see the Roman captain who said the words of our Golden Text, and near him you will see some women, —Mary the mother of Jesus is there, and some other women friends of Jesus; and there are his disciples, and others who knew him and loved him.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Jesus' friends buried his body in a new tomb in a garden which belonged to a man who was a friend of Jesus. His mother and friends and the disciples went home weeping.

It was on Friday (Good Friday, we call it) when Jesus died on the cross. Next day was the Jews' Sabbath day. Jesus' friends could not visit his tomb on that day, for they had to attend the services in the temple, but very early on the morning of the third day, which was our Sunday (we now call it Easter Sunday), Mary Magdalene and the other women who loved the Lord Jesus, hurried out to the tomb. They carried sweet spices that they might anoint the body of Jesus.

Mary Magdalene ran on ahead while the

other women stood wondering who would roll away the big stone that had been put before the door of the tomb. "Unless some one rolls it away, we cannot get into the tomb," they say, but they at last went on and when they got near the tomb they saw that the big stone was rolled away, and it was such a big one!

The women went inside the tomb which was like a big cave in the side of the hill. They saw a young man sitting near the place where the body of Jesus had lain. He was dressed in a long, white robe. The women were very much frightened when they saw that Jesus was not in the tomb, but the young man, who was an angel messenger from God,

said, "Be not afraid. You are seeking Jesus of Nazareth who was crucified; he is risen; he is not here. See, there is the place where they laid him." Look at our picture and you will see the angel and the women.

Then the angel told them to go back and tell his disciples and Peter that Jesus would go before them into Galilee, the place he loved beside the sea, and there they would see him as he had told them.

They went out quickly and ran from the tomb. They were trembling and amazed at what they had seen and heard. They were so frightened that they could not speak for a while.

Mary Magdalene had run on ahead and had reached the tomb before the others got there, and when she found that the stone was rolled away, she looked into the tomb and saw that Jesus was not there and she stood beside the door weeping. And while she stood there, Jesus came and spoke to her. And she went and told the disciples who had been with him, that she had seen Jesus. "It was too good to be true!" they thought. We know that it is true. Our Golden Text tells us, "Now hath Christ been raised from the dead."






