House of Assembly,

FREDERICTON, TUESDAY, 16th JANUARY, 1798.

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY having been prorogued to this day, then to meet for the dispatch of business—when a sufficient numbers of Members to compose a House not attending—

Adjourned until to-morrow.

WEDNESDAY, 17th JANUARY, 1798.

A fufficient number of Members to compose a House not attending—Adjourned until to morrow.

THURSDAY, 18th January, 1798.

The House met pursuant to adjournment—and it being the day observed in honor of Her Majesty's birth-day—

Adjourned until to-morrow morning at eleven of the Clock.

FRIDAY, 19th JANUARY, 1798.

The House being met pursuant to adjournment-

A Message was delivered from His Excellency the LIEUTENANT GOVER-NOR requiring the attendance of this House in the Council Chamber.

The House attended accordingly—and being returned, and the Speaker having taken the Chair—

Read

Read the first time a bill " to prevent Trespasses."

Mr. Speaker then reported that the House had attended His Excellency the LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR in the Council Chamber, where HIS EXCELLENCY was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses, and that, to prevent mistakes, he had procured a copy of the same; which he read to the House, and is as follows, to wit:

"Gentlemen of the Council,
"And Gentlemen of the Assembly,

- "THE principal objects that I have at this time to recommend to your confideration, are the ordinary fervices of the current year and of the two last preceding years, together with such particulars as were recommended during the two last Sessions, and for which the necessary provisions have not been completed.
 - "Gentlemen of the Affembly,
- "I have given orders for such accounts, and papers, as may be necessary for your further information, to be laid before you.

"Gentlemen of the Council,
"And Gentlemen of the Assembly,

"THE business now before you will, I hope, be dispatched in such manner as may be most effectually conducive to the present and suture prosperity of this Province, which, in our respective stations, as branches of the Legislature, we cannot but consider as the great end of all our deliberations."

On motion made and feconded-

Refolved, That an Address be presented to His Excellency the LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR, in answer to the foregoing Speech.

Ordered, That Major Murray, Colonel Coffin, Mr. William Pagan, Mr. Simonds and Mr. Campbell, be a committee to prepare the same.

The House then adjourned until to-morrow morning at eleven of the Clock.

SATURDAY, 20th JANUARY, 1798.

Major Murray, from the committee appointed to prepare an Address in answer to His Excellency's Speech—Reported, That the committee had agreed to a draught of the same—which he read in his place, and then delivered in at the Clerk's table; where the same being again read, was unanimously agreed to by the House, and is as follows, to wit:

- "To His Excellency THOMAS CARLETON, Esquire, Lieutenant "Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New-Bruns- wick, &c. &c.
- "The Humble Address of the House of Assembly.
- " May it please Your Excellency!
- "The House of Assembly will without delay, take into their serious consideration the ordinary services of the current and preceding years, and make fuch provision as the present situation of the Province will admit.
- "We thank Your Excellency for ordering fuch accounts and papers as may be necessary for our further information, to be laid before us.

" Nothing

"Nothing shall be wanting on our part to expedite the business now be"fore us, and we trust it will be conducted in such manner as will effectually
"conduce to the future prosperity of this Province, which, as one of the
"Branches of the Legislature, we cannot but consider as the great end of all
"our deliberations."

Refolved, That the foregoing Address be presented to His Excellency the LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR by the whole House.

On motion, Ordered, That Captain Agnew, The Attorney General, Mr. Gilbert, Mr. Peters, Mr. Glenie, and Mr. Street, be a committee to bring in a bill "for regulating and establishing a table of Fees."

The committee appointed to correspond with the Agent of the Province, during the recess of the General Assembly, laid before the House the said correspondence—

Which was read.

On motion, Refolved, That this House will, on Tuesday next, take into consideration the correspondence with the Agent of the Province.

The House then adjourned until Monday next at eleven of the Clock.

MONDAY, 22d JANUARY, 1798.

Ordered, That Colonel Ellegood and Mr. Gilbert wait upon his Excellency the LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR, to know when he will be pleased to receive this House with their Address in answer to His Excellency's Speech.

The faid Members returned and reported that they had waited upon His Excellency accordingly, and that he was pleased to say he would receive the House with the same on Wednesday next at twelve of the Clock.

A bill "for regulating and establishing a table of Fees" being brought in by the committee appointed for that purpose—

The House met—and then waited upon His Excellency the LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR with their Address in answer to His Excellency's Speech at the opening of the Session—

And being returned, the Speaker took the chair and reported that the House had waited upon His Excellency with their Address, and that he was pleafed to make the following reply thereto, to wit:—

" Gentlemen,

"I thank you for the affurance you give me, that nothing on your part fhall be wanting to expedite the business now before you, the completion of which is of such evident importance to the interest and reputation of the Province."

The Chairman reported—that the committee had taken into confideration the business to them referred—and had had come to the following Resolution, to wit:

" Refolved, That it is the opinion of this committee that there be granted

" to His Majesty, for the support of the Government of this Province, the following duties of impost, to wit:—

"On every gallon of Rum fix-pence; on every gallon of Brandy, Geneva, and other distilled spirituous Liquors eight-pence; on every gallon of Wine nine-pence; on every gallon of Molasses one penny; on every hundred weight of Brown Sugar two shillings; on every pound of Bohea Tea one penny; on every pound of Hyson, Souchong, and all other Teas two-pence; on every pound of Leaf Tobacco two-pence; on every pound of other Tobacco, excepting that manufactured in Great-Britain, fix-pence; on every pound of Loaf Sugar one penny; on every hogshead of Porter, Ale, and Beer, five skil-

" lings; and on every pack of Playing Cards fix-pence.

Ordered, That the faid report be accepted.
