Riches of the South Seas.

Much attention is being given the question of the Pacific islands trade, and the matter has been discussed before the British Parliament with the view to having the New Zealand Government assist by providing better shipping facilities.

It is claimed that the business of the islands of the South Pacific might be worth about \$5,000,000 annually to the merchants of New Zealand in exports to these islands, if proper shipping facilities were afforded. This, of course, would mean a marked increase in imports into New Zealand, since practically all of the exports to the islands are manufactured articles imported either from the United States or European countries.

tries.

The question of imports from the islands into New Zealand, especially copra, superphosphates and fertilizers would also mean much to America. Previous to the war large quantities of copra went direct to Germany, and since then America has taken a larger portion.

In discussing the Pacific island trade, the Panama Canal is taken largely into consideration, for it brings the islands of the Pacific Ocean in general much nearer the markets of the eastern coast of the United States and Europe.
