An interesting parliamentary paper
giving a return of the military forces
employed in South Africa from the
beginning to the end of the late war
has been issued. The garrison Aug.
1, 1899, consisted of 818 officers and
9622 men, reinforcements sent be-
tween then and the outbreak of the
hostilities Oct. 11, 1899, totalled 12,
546. Thereafter the troops sent up
to May 31, 1902, reached the great
total of 386,081, besides 52,414 men
raised in South Africa. The final
casualty figures are: Killed 5774,
wounded 23,029, died of wounds or
of disease 16,148.



Board of Trade, previous to their meeting on Saturday night, August 30th.

Dear Mr. Lewis,
Referring to your inspection of the "Evangeline" and to the conversations you have had with Mr. Lewis, and the writer, we have come to the conclusion, that whilst the ventilation in the "Evangeline" is thoroughly efficient, it would give satisfaction to the trade if we fitted mechanical ventilation in addition to the 14 and 18 in. ventilators we have already fitted. Under these circumstances we have decided to expend a very large sum of money in fitting up mechanical ventilation in these vessels, and we are giving Messrs. Blackman instructions to carry out the work.

The ventilation will consist of separate electric motors and separate dynamos for two fans, together with double rows of pipes on the floors in each side of the ship; these pipes will be about 9 inches in diameter, perforated, and the fans will force down the air through these pipes which will clear itself through the apertures ventilators.

There will also be a single line of pipes each side of the ship, in the 'tween decks, which will be sufficient for these cargo spaces.

We trust that our endeavours to meet every requirement of the trade will be appreciated, and will enable you to have the apples landed in good condition.

We would like you to do all you possibly can to insist upon the apples being in proper condition when they are shipped.

We had the pleasure of a visit from Mr. Lewis to-day, and he has communicated to us the contents of Mr. Starr's cable, which we think you will agree with us, satisfactorily disposes of the matter.

The steamers we propose to fit, are the "Carlisle City," "Evangeline" and "Loyalist."
