**SOAP WRAPPER APPEAL**

The officers and members of the "Toronto District W. C. T. U." desire to again call attention to the important and necessity of our "Travelers' Aid" work, which has been carried on by us for more than 20 years.

We began by employing one worker located at the Union Station.

Now we have a "Travelers' Aid Secretary" there as well as two workers, and also one worker at each of the other stations in the city.

During the past year they have spent 6,609 hours at the stations, helping 19,145 persons, many of whom were homeless young girls, who had to be brought to our "Willard Hall" for care and protection.

Our expense in the beginning was com-

paratively small, but it has gradually increased, and last year we paid \$2,654.94 besides incidentals.

Through all these years the "Surprise Soap Company" has given us a small cash percentage for every wrapper collected, thus materially assisting us in securing the amount of money needed.

During recent years, however, our income from this source has not been nearly equal to the expense incurred. We are therefore earnestly appealing to our friends for increased donations of soap wrappers, and where these are not available, money will be most acceptable instead.

During the past year our Travelers' Aid have found many opportunities for service.

Many a tired and perplexed mother, with her family of little ones, expressed her gratitude to the T. A. who gave assistance during the hours of waiting between trains and put them on the outgoing train at the right time.

Then the many aged and infirm ones compelled by stress of circumstances to travel alone, were also made comfortable and their nervousness overcome, as they were kindly and patiently helped on their journey.

Scores of young girls, troubled and perplexed, having wrong addresses or none at all, were carefully looked after, and when unable to be correctly located, were sent to Willard Hall until their friends were found.

Sick and injured women coming off the trains were given "First Aid", and when necessary, taken to hospitals, and their friends communicated with.

A large number of children without escorts and sometimes without tickets or money, were placed in charge of reliable persons travelling in the same direction.

Evil-minded, designing persons were in many cases discovered, and their plans thwarted, and numberless young, innocent girls saved from ruin and misery by the timely intervention of our Travelers' Aid.

### Editorial Notes

The featuring of the Ten Commandments in the curriculum of our public schools is suggested by an exchange. The idea is a good one and might be adopted with much profit. A daily instruction in this fundamental basis of all the laws of civilization could not fail of being productive of real profit—and the present seems a most opportune time for its trying out. The introduction of selected lessons from the "Sermon on the Mount" would also be most helpful to the rising generation.

We understand that a meeting of the Railway Commissioner is to be held at Kentville on Tuesday, Sept. 6th, at which the matter of better protection of the crossing at Port Williams station will come up. Because of the great amount of traffic over the crossing it is one of the most dangerous on the line and certainly ought to be properly safe guarded. The possibility of another fatality occurring here more than justifies any expenditures that would be necessary to add to the public safety. It is hoped that sufficient pressure may be brought to bear on the Commission to assure the necessary steps being taken.

CHURCHES AND ADVERTISING.

The fact that the Conservative Episcopal Church of the United States, has announced its intention of carrying on an advertising campaign sets the seal on a policy other denominations have adopted with success. Authority for adopting modern forms of advertising is derived from the ancient forms of publicity long recognized. Such as church bells, steeples and colored windows.

In a Handbook on Church Advertising Francis H. Case points out that the Northern Baptists of the United States of America expended more money in display advertisements in the spring of 1920 than any denomination ever before appropriated for newspaper and magazine space in one year; and as to the results, he quotes the director of this publicity, L. S. Wilkinson, as saying: "If the results were measured coldly and from the standpoint of money alone, that appropriation would rank as one of the wisest a religious body ever made."

As to the general importance of Church Advertising Mr. Wilkinson is further quoted: "Only lack of constructive effort on the part of the advertising profession can delay the day when religion will tell its story from the educational and inspirational standpoint, from month to month and week to week, in the great organs of written salesmanship. A campaign of common-sense sermonizing in the press, on a scale surpassing any industrial display campaign, is certainly within the range of events which the advertising man brings to pass."

"It is the glory of the Church that the argument of efficiency alone will never convert the Church wholeheartedly to advertising as a major tool. The question which I have had constantly to face in the development of the advertising idea among Baptists is: 'Is it Biblical? Does it follow the basic principles of the New Testament, or is it some material substitute for the proper way of advancing the Kingdom of Christ?'"

"This attitude is a problem the advertising man must face. If industry had to be sold, painstakingly and with infinite skill, is it not natural that the Church, which feels it has a sacred trust, should demand that it be shown in the matter of ultimate spiritual gain?"

"That which is most likely to hold back the progress of church advertising is the attitude that religion and religious leaders are out of date and that advertising is the summum bonum which will save the Church. If a man holds to those beliefs, he should, in justice to himself, his profession, and the Church, devote his energy to some other section of the advertising field."

"For the Church has the divine fire within it. It is the highest expression of the idealistic impulse in man, the spirit of aspiration that distinguishes him from the lower orders. Advertising must, to achieve full fellowship, come to the Church not with a boast to improve, but with a sincere and humble desire to be of service. Advertising owes the Church far more than the church will ever owe advertising, and if you are skeptical enough to doubt that, note for a while how consistently the unselfish ideal set forth in the Sermon on the mount illuminates the higher levels of industrial display copy."

THE PUBLIC ROADS.

(From Yarmouth Light) The Highway Board of Nova Scotia is spending millions of money being supplied by the public of Nova Scotia.

The Board is building macadam and gravel roads, even the gravel roads costing about \$12,000 to \$15,000 a mile and up in places.

Is the Board experimenting or has it studied the experiences of road building for hundreds of years? Two thousand years ago the Roman Empire put down stone roads that its legions might, disregarding weather, march to war. Some of those roads are there now and in good condition.

Roads of other forms of material and construction were put down in this country in more recent years, and the auto and the truck have ploughed and harrowed them. Most of the roads, recently built have been of an untested kind, and built in the shiftless sort of way. The frost and the water have thrown them into ridges and the rains have undermined them.

The tar and oil wear away under summer suns or fail to hold the great trucks, as they have not enough solid rock under them. The same condition is being seen all over the continent. The Rochester, N. Y., Times-Union remarks as to the matter: "Some Macadam roads in this State have been rebuilt three times before the original bonds were even partly paid for."

For years to come the tax-payers of this State will be paying for roads that long since were worn out. Building more Macadam roads will only increase a burden which grows greater and greater as the repair bills come in. Traffic on the highways has become so heavy that Macadam roads will not stand up. It is useless to build them. There is no doubt whatever but that it requires a cement highway to stand up under the traffic of modern times, which is constantly getting heavier.

To build a highway with a good broken stone foundation and cap it with concrete right-ly graded is to make a road that will cost only a few dollars per mile each year to keep in repair. To build any other kind yet fully tried is to invite oneself to pay for it three or four times and to pay heavily for repairs.

CANADA'S APPLE CROP

MONTREAL, AUG. 26—Unless the fruit growers of Quebec and Ontario adopt more modern methods of packing, grading and marketing, their fruit, they are extremely likely before long to find that British Columbia apple growers will have made serious inroads on their trade— inroads which have already got well under way, not only from British Columbia but also from the Western States. This was the warning given the Pomological and fruit growing society of the province of Quebec yesterday, by Prof. W. T. Macoun, of the experimental farm, Ottawa, in the course of an address on "Impressions of western activities."

FORMER VICE PREMIER OF GERMANY MURDERED

BERLIN, AUG. 26—Mathias Erzberger, former Vice Premier and Minister of Finance, was murdered today. Herr Erzberger was assassinated near Offenburg, where he was sojourning with his family. His body contained twelve bullet wounds. Herr Erzberger had left Badgriesbach, where he was taking the cure, in company with the Reichstag Deputy Diez for a foot tour of the Black Forest. An hour later both men were confronted by two youths who separated them, and then emptied revolvers into Herr Erzberger who was killed by shots in the head. Deputy Diez also was wounded.

WILL LOWER FREIGHT RATES.

An early move toward lowering of freight rates on Canadian Railways is expected as the result of recent developments. It is understood that a conference of the railway executives with the board of railway commissioners will take place in the near future, when a decision as to the amount and date of the reduction will be reached. That there will be a reduction is certain, the only question at issue being the amount of the reduction and the date of which it will become effective.

The officers of the Air Board, the Dominion Forestry Branch, and the different provincial forestry departments are following the results of this season's operations with close interest, and will be guided by them in laying out future work.
