You. have more at stake than the small storekeeper, and therefore you should upport the Chamber of Commerce n proportion to your invesment in his community,

"To make this possible, the plural nembership plan has been devised. Under this plan the corporation, firm r individual subscribes to a number f memberships. Since, however, the hamber cannot permit the plural subscribers to dominate its affairs, it allows each subscriber to have one vote only, the same as the smallest storekeeper in the organization.

"It is the custom for the subscriber to plural memberships to assign according to one of the supporters them to the younger men in its employ, the assignments being absolute and carrying with them the power of one vote each. This brings into the Chamber of Commerce the younger me nof business. It interests them in community work early in their careers and makes certain of the presence of men who will be the leaders in the community in a few



The Canadian milling industry has, since 1914, made progressive strides and flour exports between that year and 1919 increased nearly five times. Today this business has an annual capacity of slightly more than 35,are being continually added In-1890 Canada exported 115,099 barrels of flour valued at \$521,383 - 4By 1910 this had increased to 3,064,128 barreis valued at about \$15,000,000. In the fiscal year of 1919, 9,196,806 barrels were milled at a value of \$99, 826,696.

Great Britain has been by far Canada's best customer for flour, her imports from the Dominion of this commodity, for the las fiscal year, being equal to about 60 per cent. of the total, or \$56,000,000 out of nearly

Exports by countries for the last year were as follows:-Great Britain British South Africa \$17,309; New-foundland \$34,147,527; British West Indies \$6,329,527; Other countries

The Trade returns for the present fiscal year show that, as yet, the flour are holding their own, though the European countries are again engaged in grain growing and milling. In the last available period of five months 4.928,164 barpared with 4,461,313 in the same period in 1918. Of these 3.912.405 barrels went to the United Kingdom; 38,423 to British Guiana; 146,596 to the British West Indies, 297,845 to Italy: 73.100 to Newfoundland; and 228.084 barrels to other countries. Whilst on account of the change of conditions in Europe, the export trade may fall off considerably, the Canadian milling industry by reason of the activity produced during the war is in a very strong position, and should be able to hold its own in the period of competition which is un-coubtedly ahead.



NO CLOTHING TO COVER NAKEDNESS

Destitute Jewish Children of Eastern Europe Suffer Terribly From the Cold.

The destitute Jewish children of Eastern Europe are almost entirely without clothing to protect them from the ravages of the winter, according to Samuel Charney, a Jewish writer and critic of Vilna, Poland, who has recently arrived in New York.

"It is not a question of their being without shoes, or without underwear, br without any one thing," he reported. "It is a question of their being altogether without clothing to cover their nakedness, and to protect them from the cold. There is almost a total lack of linen, cotton or woolen clothing in Eastern Europe, and what there is is sold at a prohibitive price. The rags that the poverty-stricken Jews have worn all through the war are falling from them. The clothing problem is almost a greater issue than the food problem to-day.

"The help already given by the Joint Distribution Committee of Jewish Funds, the Red Cross, and the Canadian and American Relief Administration is all that has kept our race alive this long in Eastern Europe. I was an eye-witness to the girl driven out of her mind."

Many of the people are dri cept for America they would all be dead now, except a very few. Only America can keep them alive through the winter that confronts them now. SIX MILLION JEWS **ARE FACING DEATH**

Starvation and Disease Cause Indescribable Suffering in Eastern Europe.

The hardships of this winter will nean death to thousands of Jews in Poland, unless outside aid intervenes at once according to Lieutenant Shel-ton Wright of the American Red Cross Commission to Poland, recently returned to the United States after onths of relief work in eastern

He painted a vivid picture of this half-starved people, clad in rags, who are now creeping back toward their devastated homes after months of refugee wandering, and dying of starvation and typhus along the roads, as they go.

"Outside starvation, numerous diseases, attributed to malnutrition and typhus have killed men and women and children like flies," he said. "I member a family trying to live under an over-turned waggon by the roadside. The mother was dead under a tree a few yards away—she had been dead for days. The father was stretched upon the ground dying of typhus. He died that day. Under the waggon were two little children, both under five, sick with typhus. An older child sat stupidly beside them-a

DESTITUTION IN EUROPE TERRIBLE

Long Processions of Starving, Ill-Clad Children Seen Daily on the Streets.

Long processions of little Jewish hildren in Eastern Europe, bearing their tin cups in their hands, daily walk from their villages to the nearest town in which there is a Jewish relief station, according to relief workers in these stricken lands. sometimes journeying five or six miles in order to get the cup of soup with piece of hardtack, or the mug of milk which is often their sole food of the day.

Those tin-cup processions emphaize, as nothing else could do, the retief workers say, the terrible destitu-tion of the Jews in Eastern Europe at present. The children in them are arefoot, almost without exception. Reports received by the Canadian Jewish War Relief Committee say that both boys and girls are wrapped in burlap, or dressed in clothing made from the sacks in which the relief supplies have come, or in the rags which they have worn during the five years of the war, their gaunt little bodies showing through the tatters. They do not walk as children sually do, without effort or restraint, out drag themselves along wearily, and hopelessly, like tired little ghosts condemned to move in hungry

ocessions throughout eternity. Arrived at the relief station, the hildren are so tired and so weak that they sit down upon the pavements to await their turn in line. Upon the faces of every one of them there is an expression of unchildlike anxiety. It has to do with the only really vital question in the world to them-whether or not the soup or milk will hold out, until their turn comes. Every day some of them have to be turned away without food, since their numbers are so great that the ways sufficient to care for them all.

MILLION PAIRS OF SHOES ARE NEEDED

Destitute Jewish Children of Eastern Europe Use Rags to Protect Feet From the Cold.

A million pairs of shoes are needd by the destitute Jewish children of Eastern Europe to-day, according to reports received by the Canadian Jewish Relief Committee from relief

workers abroad. At least that many of the helpless and hungry Jewish youngsters of Eastern Europe are absolutely without footgear of any kind, their relief agents say. Thousands of others have rags sewn around their feet in lieu of

Several carloads of shoes that formerly belonged to Allied soldiers in France were purchased there by the Joint Distribution Committee Funds for Jewish Sufferers from the War, for the Jewish women of Eastern Europe. But it was impossible to buy the shoes in sizes that could be worn by the children, and all others sold in Europe are at a prohibiive price. So a million youngsters are barefoot during the hard winter of Eastern Europe.

There is a great lack of every conceivable kind of clothing, as well as shoes. In Serbia, a common child's ostume just now consists of two sacks, with holes cut through for the head and feet. In Poland, flour sacks and sugar sacks sent with supplies to mouey. the destitute Jews by Jewish relief Guaranteed against defects. agencies are all being made over into clothing, and even small salt sacks are pieced together, and used for this purpose.


