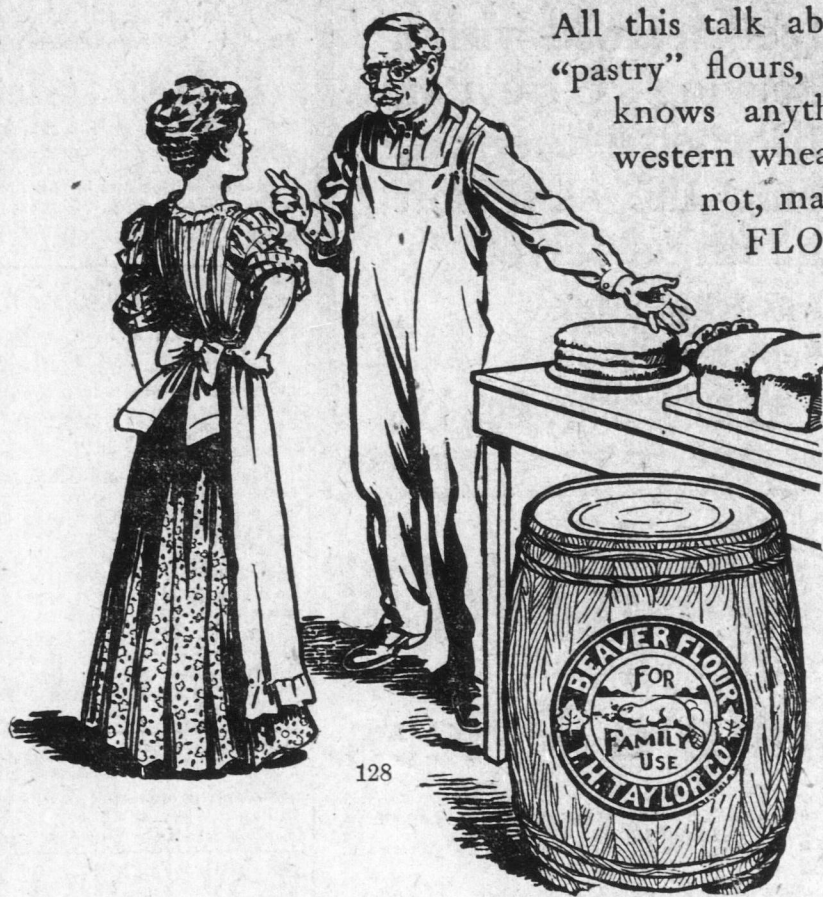

Siam is one of the few countries which boast of a corps of women police. The members of this Amazon Guard are all old and ugly. They wear uniforms, though they are not armed. Their chief duty is to act as gatekeepers of the inner or Women's Palace at Bangkok.

They follow any stranger who enters the palace and remain with him until he takes his departure. They see that there is no mischief made and that no one makes love to the Royal wives and concubines. Men who have business inside the palace—doctors, architects, carpenters, electric light fitters, etc., enter the palace freely, but are always accompanied by some of the Amazon Guard. The palace has some difficulty in recruiting these guards, as the work is hard and the pay poor, and the qualification uncomplimentary.

## Trouble in the Union.

At last meeting of the Firemen's Union it was decided that in A. J. Harvey & Co.'s ships the two trimmers who were non union men in each case would be paid off and a union fireman selected to replace them. This the union regarded as a beneficial proceeding for their men. The union firemen thus employed received \$30 per month. When the Adventure arrived, however, the union firemen on board kicked and said they wanted their two trimmers back on the ship or they would not go to sea in her. Delegate Woods refused to grant this and go counter to the rules of the union, with the result that all the firemen on the ship left her. Mr. Woods then secured six others. But they were persuaded to quit also and they did so. Mr. Woods therefore had to secure five more union firemen and 2 non-union men to fill up the ship's complement and they went in her. The men who left the Adventure will be dealt with at the next meeting of the union to be held shortly. Delegate Woods now finds his position in the union one of extreme difficulty owing to the break caused by these two crews, and at the next meeting he will resign. Unless matters are handled very carefully it is feared that the Union will witness a split in its ranks which it will be hard to bridge.

## Met Bad Weather.

The Norwegian Schr. Labrador arrived here this morning, coal laden to Geo. C. Carter, after a run of 4 days from Sydney. In crossing St. Pierre Bank the vessel had very boisterous weather with a high sea running. Waves time and again swept her and filled the cabin on one occasion. #### Continuation Classes.

Yesterday we drew attention, as we have done on other occasions, to the defect of our educational system in the way of its failure to supply facilities to those over day school age to pursue cultural and vocational studies. These young people do not have the same chances to sharpen their mental faculties, strengthen their powers, and gain in general ability, skill and knowledge, that other countries afford. In this respect we have not even reached the stage that the Mother Country had reached a generation ago, and yet additional and better facilities are being provided all the time. In these matters we have not even started to put ourselves in the race, and it is ample time we did so. Here are some of the impressions made on Dr. Robertson during the visit to the British Isles of the Royal Commission on Industrial Training and Technical Education:—

"At present one can only give a few of the more vivid of the general impressions received," continued Dr. Robertson. "First of all one thinks of the character of the men who are responsible for the organization and administration of the education and of the head masters and other teachers who carry on the class work. Courtesy, enthusiasm and ability of high order were always to the front. "New buildings and equipment for technical instruction are everywhere in evidence. The revival of interest in education, or rather the awakening of interest in this new field of education, has brought out much rivalry between the different cities as to which shall have the finest institutions for its young people. Nor is the attention and interest wholly or even mainly devoted to the material equipment. The effort is focussed on the boy and on the girl, particularly between the ages of fourteen and eighteen. "Trade preparatory day schools have been started to give boys between twelve and fourteen, two years of the sort of education which, while still general for real culture, gives them practical preparation for beginning to learn skilled trades in the various factories and shops. Continuation classes, with a trade preparatory side, have been begun, and are being extended. There are evening continuation classes for boys and girls who have begun work, with courses having direct relation to the trades and skilled occupations in the city or locality. These continuation classes, commercial classes, technical classes and art classes have become a great feature of the educational effort on behalf of most of the children whose attendance at the ordinary school ends with their fourteenth year. "For example, in the city of Hall-

fax, 60 per cent. of all the boys and girls who leave the elementary day schools continue their education at evening vocational classes and technical day courses. "In the city of Edinburgh the schemes to secure educational effort and opportunity for the boys and girls who have left the elementary schools have been also most successful. Edinburgh could not be designated as an 'exclusively' industrial city. In many of its best features it resembles what one would hope a grown up Ottawa would become. "If the proportion of boys and girls who attend continuation, commercial, technical and art evening classes in Edinburgh were applied to the present Ottawa, the numbers of such pupils in Ottawa would exceed 5,000."

The planters hope that this new industry will absorb the bananas during the cheap season, as well as the bunches with less than eight "hands" to the bunch.

Thompson was present in the office and handled the cablegram which was ticked off from the instruments in his office. Congratulations to both veterans. May they be spared many more years to witness the triumphant march of progress. The messages sent were as follows:

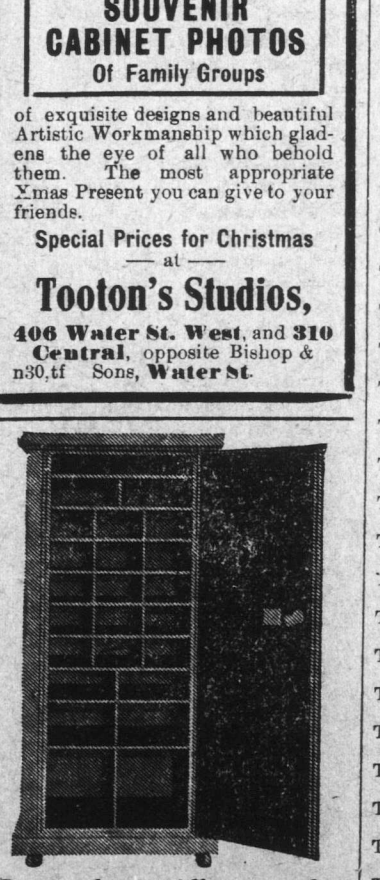

**Cable News.**

Special Evening Telegram.  
DELHI, Dec. 8

The roar of an Imperial salute of a hundred guns welcomed the King, Emperor and Queen-Empress on their arrival here to-day from Bombay. The railroad station had been the mecca of the populace since dawn. Everybody in the city and the Coronation camp, with equippages vying with each other in splendour, passed along the roads, which were crowded with Indian princes, military officers and government officials. Streams of natives went along the same way.

The route to the camp was lined alternately with British and Indian regiments under command of Lieut-General Wilcox and General Barrow. In providing Guards of Honour as escorts, the native troops were also given an equal share with the British.

King George and Queen Mary received the Viceroy and Vicerine, the Governors of the Provinces, Commander-in-Chief and high military officials. After a series of presentations, their Majesties proceeded to a pavilion within the walls of the fort, where 150 ruling chiefs were introduced. This brilliant ceremony, with its gorgeous display of jewels and richly-coloured garments, occupied considerable time. Meanwhile the Provincial legislators gathered on a ridge overlooking the Durbar camp to greet the royal party.

Then began the great procession to the camp four miles away. Throughout India a holiday had been decreed. Hordes of natives gathered to get a glimpse of the Emperor and Empress. They formed a striking background to the gorgeously uniformed procession, which was headed by hands of the Lancers, playing. Then came General Peyton, as herald, in silk and gold, with tabard emblazoned with the royal coat of arms, and sixteen British and native trumpeters, mounted on black chargers. Next followed the native escort of the Viceroy, in scarlet and gold, preceding the Imperial cadet corps, composed entirely of princes and their sons. Their Majesties and the Viceroy, with suites, followed. The Emperor and Empress entered the city through the King's Gate, which was opened for the first time since 1857, when the King of Delhi went to public worship. All along the route the impression seemed profound, and the reception was cordial.

On arrival at the camp the troops defiled past the Imperial carriage. Receptions followed, and the King-Emperor was presented with a brief address of welcome, to which he replied in a few words.

Their Majesties, with the vice-regal party, then repaired to their camp, which circled a house built by Lord Curzon, as a centre. The camp stretched along the great trunk road. The long symmetrical rows of white tents were almost blinding in the vertical Indian sun, while the whole place, when their Majesties entered, blazed with the bright hues of the East.

LONDON, Dec. 8.

In addition to the labour troubles which threaten to reach a crisis during the Christmas tide, this country is now menaced with a possible general strike of postal servants during the height of the festive season. A conference of postal employees will be held at Birmingham on Sunday to decide on an immediate policy for the men of the service.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.

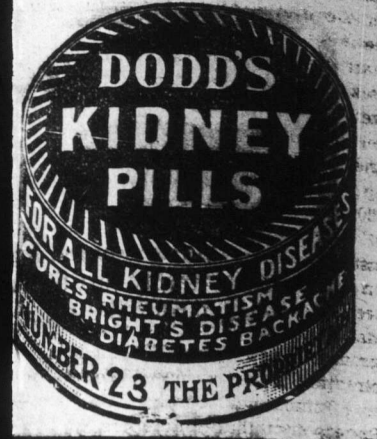
The second one-topic message sent to Congress during the three days of the present session was presented to-day. In it President Taft reviewed the relations of the States with foreign nations during the past year. He urged the Senate to ratify the general arbitration treaties with Britain and France, and suggested legislation that he declared would strengthen the States in the World trade and in her position among other Powers.

Job's new sealing steamer, Neascotie, which was launched at Newcastle-on-Tyne yesterday will be one of the finest ships of the sealing fleet leaving this port. She will have a speed of 14 knots, is over 2,000 tons register, and was built by Messrs. Swann, Hunter & Co. She will be one of the finest ice boats of the fleet having been specially built to resist the Arctic seas, and in the summer season will ply in Hudson Bay. Capt. George Barbour, of the Beothic, will command her at the seal fishery, and Captain W. Winsor will take the Beothic. The ship will leave for this port early in January to get ready for her spring's work.


