

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

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Annual Meeting of Ambulance Association

The St. John Ambulance Association, Newfoundland Centre, held its annual meeting last night at the George V. Hall. Many ladies and gentlemen were present. His Excellency the Governor, Mrs. Davidson, and Major Davenport, A.D.C., attending. His Excellency opened the convention and spoke very briefly of the Order, traced the history of the work of the St. John Ambulance Corps in the present Turko-Balkan war. Dr. Macpherson then read his report, which dealt with the work of the Association in the city. There are 5 classes in First Aid with over 100 membership and 61 had passed the First Aid exam. 3 had taken the voucher, and 13 had qualified for a medal. There are 30 in the Home Nursing Class and those who can wear a medal are: Mr. Wm. Reeves (with label for 1910); Mr. Thorburn, Miss Nell Warren, Harry Berry, Stanley H. Martin, Wm. Stevenson, G. N. Matthews, Miss Lillian Cowan, Miss Eunice Ellis, Miss Eva Gaul, Miss Ethel Hawkins, Miss Marjorie Kent, Miss Lucy Spyr, Mrs. Josephine Thorburn and Miss Annie Gray. In 1912 he met many of the Order in England, attended the review in Windsor Park of the St. John Ambulance Brigade when some 1,000 members were present from England and Wales. The members of the "Overseas Brigade" occupied the centre of the first line and each of the six lines was half a mile long, while on either flank were 1,000 Nursing Sisters seated on the stands. The officers treated the members of the various Brigades with every kindness and courtesy. Since our last annual meeting the C. of E. Education has placed First Aid as an optional course on their Syllabus. In May, Division No. 1 of the St. John Ambulance was formed from members of the C.L.B. with Mr. W. Reeves, as Ambulance Officer. Some ladies are forming a Nursing Division. Just now there are two First Aid classes holding lectures, one of ladies, another of school-boys. After the distribution of certificates, J. Fenelon, Esq., Hon. Treasurer, presented his report, showing the institution to be in a healthy condition financially. Writes on Educational Matters.

LETTER NO. 4.
Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—I thank you very much for the space you have allowed me for my letters on the subject of Education. I hope that my comments may get the members of the Legislature, as well as the Teachers and the Public, thinking.

I should like to supplement what I have written by some remarks on the Building Grant, voted about a couple of years ago. One hundred thousand dollars sounds a large sum of money for the purpose of erecting new schools, and of equipping others, but when this amount is distributed over the whole country, what does it amount to? It is first divided denominationally. The Church of England share amounts to something over \$20,000; but there are 64 Boards of this denomination in need of and looking for a share. Amounts, varying according to different requirements, have been apportioned to the Boards, to be repaid by instalments ranging over 20 years, without interest. Strictly speaking the Government does no more than pay the interest.

Take our own Board. The old High School has had its day and must be rebuilt. It is too small, is badly lighted and has no proper ventilation. It is not worth enlarging or repairing. A new site is found and a large field purchased, the Ladies' Auxiliary raising and paying \$800 for it. A plan, approved by the Government, placed the estimate of a new wooden building at \$7,000. The Board, outside of paying salaries, had no funds. A loan of two thousand dollars therefore was granted, deducting \$100 a year out of the school grant for the next 20 years. In three years the members of the Church, to their credit, had said, added \$2,500 to this.

Another loan had to be obtained at 6 p.c. interest. The building is now erected, furnished with modern fittings, and 200 children are enrolled. Not less than 3 teachers can successfully teach such a number, 70 or more of whom are infants, and a Kindergarten teacher for those who are tots has to be engaged at a nominal salary.

Now, how does a Board of Education manage to finance such a matter as this, without adequate funds? I do not suppose that there is a member of the Legislature who knows, or perhaps cares, much. After paying teachers' salaries, at a rate which is simply a disgrace to the profession, the Board, out of its Annual Grant, (including that Magnificent Maximum Sum of \$160 for Higher Education), wherewith to provide a year's expenses and maintenance. Out of this balance of \$40, it pays \$30 to the Chairman and Secretary, for a whole year's work of supervising the schools and keeping the accounts; \$75 are paid for fuel; \$22 for insurance; \$48 for attendance, lighting fires, dusting and washing, and \$48 for interest; be-

Why does not the Legislature take more interest in the Education of the Colony? The subject receives bare consideration, and certainly no serious discussion in the Assembly. What ever is proposed, or is to be voted on, is settled at a caucus meeting of the Cabinet, and the increase is adopted by a strictly party vote.

Either there is, or there is not, sufficient money in the country to provide for the education of the population. Apparently there is money for everything else. The F.P.C. have formed a Union to protect and better the Fishermen's commercial interests. Who will be patriotic enough to do the same for the fishermen's children?

I contend (and I am prepared to persevere till it is done), first, that one dollar per head of the population is at the present time only barely sufficient to pay school teachers, and to maintain their school houses. Secondly, that considerably more will be needed to make (at least) every Elementary School in the country free to the scholars. The solution lies largely in the hands of the electors.

The political jugglers now in charge would also have the people believe they were neglected by the Bond Administration in the matter of telegraph extension. Now what is the actual fact. The late Government constructed more than double as many miles of telegraph as were built by all preceding Governments. It is a poor cause that requires abuse and deceit to uphold it; and who will say that ridicule and abuse, deceit and base things were not the chief weapons employed to defeat the Liberal party four years since?

Magisterial Enquiry.

The enquiry into the cause of the fire which destroyed the Reid Company's machine shops was continued yesterday when three witnesses were examined.

Michael Dunn, Supt. of the Fire Department, was sworn and in his evidence stated that the fire alarm was rung in at 7.33 a.m. on the 13th inst., from Box 41. I proceeded to the fire on the chemical engine, arriving three or four or five minutes afterwards. The firemen from the West End Station were then on the scene. They had a hose connected at the corner of Brazil's Lane. There was neither stream of water on the burning building when I got there. I went down to eastern end of building where fire was raging furiously. There being no water I came back to find out delay when I saw the water coming from the hose which was laid out by the Western Station men. Central men coupled up two streams at Job Street. Two streams were also put on from the steam engine. The fire had made such progress when I arrived that I considered that owing to the insufficient supply of water we had to confine our efforts to the eastern portion of the building. Know nothing of any explosion beyond what I heard. If there was one it must have happened before I arrived. The Water Inspector Dunnely informed me there was no water in the East End of the city. I adjusted matters by taking off one hose at Job Street and another at Brennan's Lane. The all-out signal was sent in at 11.50 a.m.

Francis Lempie, sworn, I am leading man building locomotives at R. N. Co.'s repair shops. I was about 50 feet from the office on the north side of the building when the fire broke out. At the time I was speaking to James Pike about a casting. He said there was a fire in Mr. Duder's office. I saw blaze through window in the office; fire appeared to be in centre of room. I shouted to men around to run to General Stores to procure all the buckets they could. I then passed through shop and while I was passing explosion occurred, scattering fire in all directions. In a short while the whole building was in a blaze. Don't think fire would cause air compressor pipes to break. I heard orders were given to have power shut off at Sub-Station as soon as the alarm was sent in. There would not be any inflammable material inside the building excepting the oil on the benches and around the floor near the locomotives. The whole building and contents were damaged or destroyed.

Ford Winsor, District Fire Chief, sworn.—Alarm was sent in about 7.33 on date in question. I proceeded to the fire on the chemical engine via New Gower and Hutchings' Street. When I arrived on the scene the machine shop was ablaze from end to end. We confined our efforts to the eastern end of the building to prevent the fire from spreading. The building was burned down and I remained there until the all-out signal was rung in at ten minutes to twelve.


The Doughnut.

Protests Against Forcible Feeding.

Special to The Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-day.
At a public meeting last night strong protests were registered against forcible feeding of imprisoned suffragettes. Bishop Lincoln who presided declared suffrage movement was a grand demonstration of moral force against brute force. Forbes Robertson, actor manager, asserted that forcible feeding would not be permitted in America. George Bernard Shaw, writer, said it was illegal, but that Reginald McKenna, Home Secretary, proposed to legalize it by Act of Parliament. Home Secretary speaking in the House said the only alternatives under existing law were: let imprisoned women die or let them out. He refused to let them out and wished he could deport them but was doubtful whether Parliament would grant him power to do so. Send them to Ireland interjecting a racy Hibernian voice. Mr. McKenna added that he intended to ask for an increase of power to enable him to allow women to be put on license necessitating frequent reports to police, providing for their further incarceration if it was thought necessary and believed the method would prove effective. McKenna told how one woman in prison sponged herself all over with hot water and remained uncovered all night in the hope of catching her death of cold. Others pretended to take their food but surreptitiously starved themselves so as to become exhausted and die in prison. Some had voluntarily self-tortured themselves by thirst, refusing to touch milk or water. They are actuated by fanatical determination not merely to bring law into contempt but martyrize themselves so their heroic examples may act as a stimulus on others engaged in the cause. Sir Arthur Markham, member, remarked there was a conspiracy on foot among militant suffragettes to kidnap Home Secretary McKenna. Hoped forcible feeding awarded the Home Secretary would give him the backbone he lacked at present time.

"Patch cleaned up; estimated 75,000; have 10,000 stowed; some on deck; have not heard from other ships. Newfoundland doing well; lot of flags out when we left him; weight of seals thirty-eight lbs.
From the foregoing it is apparent that Harvey's four steamers are into the seals as well as the larger ships of Bowring's fleet. The Eagle has now seven thousand, having reported in her first message a few days ago to have taken 3,000.
FROM S.S. NASCOPIE:
At noon to-day the following message was received by Job Bros.:
"Patch cut up; estimated about 70,000, fairly good seals; we have 15,000; all well.
(Sgd.) G. BARBOUR."
Mr. R. C. Smith, Supt. A. A. Tel. Coy., sent us the following message received from Cape Ray to-day:
"Wind weak, light; thick snow and heavy open ice in shore. No report from steamers this morning."

A Large Funeral.

The funeral of the Hon. James McLaughlin took place from his late residence, Hope Cottage, at 2.30 p.m. yesterday. A concourse of citizens attended, including His Excellency the Governor, the Prime Minister and members of the House of Assembly. President Hon. John Harris and members of the Legislative Council and representatives of the Judiciary and Law. At the Cathedral the final absolution was imparted by His Grace Archbishop Howley, assisted by Revs. Frs. McDermott, Pippy, O'Callaghan, Kelly and Rev. Monsignor Roche. His Excellency the Governor and Major Davenport held seats within the Sanctuary rail. Mr. N. J. Murphy was the undertaker.

Death of Newfoundland.

Enquiries made regarding James Macdonald, who met a mysterious death at Seattle, as referred to in yesterday's Telegram, elicited the fact that he was a member of the only family by the name of Macdonald living in Harbor Breton. He was a young man, scarcely 30 years of age, was unmarried and left his home a few years ago for Western Canada, where he hoped to make good. Macdonald's father predeceased him but his mother is alive, as well as a brother, Thomas, and a sister, who is a school teacher at Great Jarvis. No doubt news as to how Macdonald met his death will be received from Seattle in due course.



PARIS, March 18.
The French Government under the Premiership of M. Briand, was defeated to-day on a vote of confidence, during a debate in the Senate.
Special to Evening Telegram.
OTTAWA, March 18.
The House to-day went into Supply on Supplementary Estimates for the current year. The debate on the Naval Bill has not been resumed since Saturday night.
HAMBURG, March 18.
From 60 to 80 vessels, mainly small craft, were sunk off here during the night in a south westerly hurricane. The deaths of 12 men have already been reported, and it is thought the total will be much greater.
SALONIKA, March 18.
King George of Greece, was assassinated here this afternoon. He had taken personal command of the troops during the earlier period of the war, and had been here since December, when the Turkish fortress was occupied by the Greeks after a short siege. The Queen of Greece has also been here, and paid attention and care to the sick and wounded. King George in December, had a meeting here with King Ferdinand of Bulgaria. It is supposed that they discussed the fate of the captured Turkish territories after the war. No particulars have, as yet, been ascertained.
LONDON, March 18.
The Berlin correspondent of the Daily Mail telegraphs that the German Government is stated to have decided to tax the funds of Trades Unions and Workmen's Leagues, as well as large fortunes for the purposes of armament. Social democrats in the Reichstag, who would not have opposed the Government, if the tax had been confined to the wealthy classes, will, so Herr Bernstein, the Socialist Leader, states, oppose the tax if any attempt is made to impose it on Workmen's organizations. By themselves the Socialists could not defeat the project, but only 89 votes out of 287 would need to be added to theirs to kill the Bill.
LONDON, March 18.
Following up the Post's attack on William Jennings Bryan, Wilson's Secretary of State, for his speech at the St. Patrick's Day banquet given by Irish Americans at Washington, Saturday evening, the Standard says: "If Bryan really expresses the views of the Cabinet and President, the relations between Britain and America may enter upon a phase which may be regarded with extreme regret by the majority of sensible and moderate persons of both countries." The Standard describes Bryan's speech as a fine example of virulent and inflated nonsense which the inferior demagogue talks when he wants to catch Irish votes.


