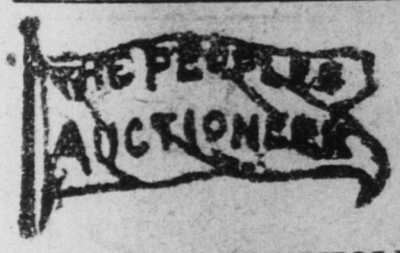

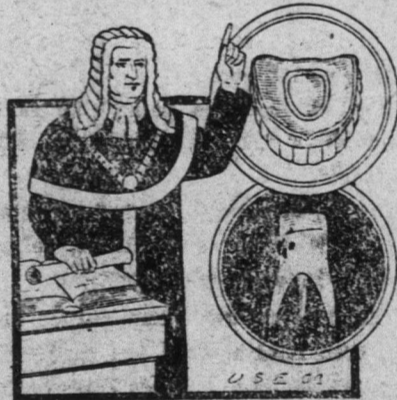


"And nothing was heard of his sweetheart?" asked Ralph.

State Capitals.

SPRINGFIELD, ILL.
By GEORGE FITCH.

Author of "A Good Old Swish."

Springfield is the most important of all the American cities of that name because the legislature of Illinois meets there every two years to grant votes to women, elect members to the Senate and do other surprising things of interest to the world at large.

Springfield is the capital of Illinois and like most capitals is located in the center of the state—that is the horizontal center. In the spring the pedestrian could often get within a few feet of the center of the state downwards before paying was introduced. Springfield being located in the famous black mid belt. Now, however, the streets are paved and there is hardly enough mud in the city to supply the politicians during a good, hot session of the legislature.

Springfield had 51,000 people in 1910. Several thousand of them dig coal for a living and many others make watches while most of the rest act as janitors at the state house in critical sessions. The state house is a magnificent structure, costing \$4,000,000, and decorated on the inside in 34 colors, most of them in a state of violent hostility. OTTAWA, June 23.—Inspector W. J. Bates of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, who is to head the police party going north to investigate the killing of the explorers, Radford and Street, was in Ottawa today conferring with Controller Fortescue. Inspector Bates is one of the most experienced officers of the Mounted Police and is thoroughly familiar with the Far North country, including the deadly Dawson trail between Dawson and Fort McPherson.

He goes from Ottawa to Halifax where he will take ship for Hudson Bay, landing probably in the vicinity of Chesterfield Inlet. The party will likely cross country from there to the country south of Bathurst Inlet, where Radford and Street met their death.

Council's Last Day.

The curtain will be rung down to-
night on the membership of the City
Council, as it has been constituted for
the past twelve years. The Council
has been constituted differently for
the next twelve months in accordance
with an Act which was passed last
session. Instead of a Mayor and six
members being elected by votes for
a period of four years, twelve mem-
bers have been appointed by the Govern-
or in Council, and they will be Gazetted
to-night. They will then meet and
choose a Chairman themselves.

It will be remembered that the ob-
ject of the Commission in charge is
to study the civic situation whilst ac-
tually managing the city, and to make
recommendations as to a new char-
ter with the object of effecting civic
improvements on the most economical
basis. The old Council was hampered
from lack of money. Our city pub-
lic debt is very small as compared
with many Canadian cities and the

revenue raised is also small. It
should be remembered that much of
the indebtedness has been incurred in
providing the city with water, and
that a large portion of the taxation is
in reality nothing but the payment
for water purchased from the Coun-
cil. The sewerage tax and the coal
tax are the only important actual
taxation that is levied. This has
handicapped the City Council in the
past and no matter how economical a
Council may be, it cannot do much
with the revenue at its disposal. We
are by no means recommending ex-
penditure on a scale which has pre-
vailed in many Canadian cities, both
larger and smaller than St. John's.
English investors are looking askance
at their Municipal bonds except when
they are offered at 4 1/2 and 5 p.c. and
even in such cases, some municipali-
ties can only borrow at a large dis-
count. We think, however, that citi-
zens will have to face some borrow-
ing and some extra civic taxation if
extensive improvements are to be made
even in matters which are essential.

**French Fishermen's
Hard Experience.**

**FOUR DAYS TOSSEING ABOUT IN
THE DORY.**

By the Southern Shore train last
night there arrived two French
fishermen who strayed from their
vessel while fishing on the Grand
Banks on the 21st inst., and after
spending four days in their dory, were
picked up by the schooner Gertrude
L. and landed at Caplin Bay on Fri-
day last.

Their names are Henri Lygnone
and Jean Salmon and as they cannot
speak English our representative in-
terviewed them in French this morn-
ing, and with the assistance of Mr.
Bidele elicited from them the follow-
ing story of their experience.

They belong to the barque Marie
Blanche owned by Madame Malen-
dein, and commanded by Captain
Charles Yeanne of Fecamp, France.
They left Fecamps on March 27th,
and sailed direct for the Grand Banks.
Boisterous weather was experienced
all the way, and the vessel secured
but little fish. On Monday June 22nd,
the men set out with the others to
set their trawls, going to the leeward
of the vessel, when they had finished
their lines it was blowing a stiff
breeze, and in the meantime the fog
which had been dense all day prevent-
ed them from returning to their ves-
sel. They had in an effort to reach
their vessel rowed too far to the wind-
ward of the vessel, and so could not
hear the horn. When night came on
they grew fatigued from their exer-
tions to reach their vessel, and settled
down for the night to sleep a little
while in turn. After beating about
for forty eight hours with very little
food they were compelled to open
their dory cans which contained some
hard bread and water. Their dory
had by this time become leaky, and
needed constant bailing to keep her
afoat. They suffered much from the
cold, and one of the men had his arm
chilled from exposure. After thus
tossing about the sea for 4 days they
sighted the schooner Gertrude L. on
the evening of the 24th, and were
picked up and brought to Caplin Bay
as already mentioned. The Captain
and crew of the Gertrude L. treated
the men very kindly, and supplied
them with clothing and brought them
to port on Friday last.

They are now staying at the In-
stitute and are being looked after
by the French Consul, who will likely
arrange for their passage to France.

Diocesan Synod.

FIFTH DAY.

There was no afternoon session of Synod yesterday, as the members and their friends attended a Garden Party given by His Excellency the Governor and Lady Davidson.

The House met at 7.30, the opening office was recited by His Lordship the Bishop. There were 38 clergy and 41 lay members at the roll call.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Rev. H. J. Read gave notice that he will on to-morrow move the following resolution: "That this Synod affirm its adherence to the principle of denominational education for the Public Elementary Schools of Newfoundland, and deprecates any attempt to alter the present Modus Vivendi in regard to the same," and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Government.

Rev. H. Uphill gave notice that on to-morrow he will move the following resolution: "That the grant received by this Diocese for Missionary purposes from the S.P.G. be relinquished on and after the 1st January, 1915."

The Hon. R. Watson moved that Revs. Canon Bolt, Canon Colley, Rev. G. R. Godden, Messrs. H. W. Leitesurier and J. A. Cliff, be a committee to select names for recommendation to the Synod for appointment to Standing Committees for the ensuing biennial period. This was agreed to.

The Rev. J. T. Richards moved the following resolution: "That realizing the great isolation of the clergy-men of the Straits of Belle Isle, especially those of Battle Harbor and Sandwich Bay, the magnitude of the work assigned to each, and the financial capacity of the people concerned to support even the missionaries now in the field, this Synod gives its heartiest approval and support to such efforts as the Deanery may deem prudent to make,—subject to the Bishop's approval—to promote the welfare of the Church in Northern Newfoundland and Labrador."

The Rev. W. J. R. Higgin moved and Canon Noel seconded the following resolution: "That this Synod of the Church in Newfoundland now in session, desires to express both its heartfelt sympathy with the Church in Wales at this time of distress, and also its disapproval of the Bill which has been passed by the British Parliament, disestablishing and disendowing the Church in Wales, and that copies of this resolution be sent to the four Welsh Bishops." Carried by acclamation.

Rev. T. E. Loder brought in his series of resolutions, which after much discussion were withdrawn.

The Rev. Frank Smart moved that the House go into Committee to consider Bill dealing with the H. & F. M. Fund.

The House went into Committee. Revs. Bayly, Smart and Field; Mr. W. W. Blackall and Sir Joseph Outbridge took part in the debate.

The discussion was adjourned, and the House rose at 10.15.

His Lordship the Bishop pronounced the Benediction.

NEWS BY CABLE.

Special to the Evening Telegram.
OTTAWA, June 29.
 The Hillcrest disaster death roll includes 86 married men and four widowers, leaving children. The number of orphans is 159.
BATAVIA, Java, June 29.
 The city of Bekkolono was partially destroyed to-day by a cloud-burst. The business district was left in ruins, and many public buildings were wrecked.
MONTREAL, June 29.
 A pack of Eskimo dogs, "huskies," arrived at Montreal yesterday on their way to London by steamer. They will be used by Sir E. Shackleton in his Antarctic Expedition.
PARIS, June 29.
 Jack Johnson has agreed to fight Sam Langford in the middle of October. For this battle he will receive \$30,000, win, lose or draw. In addition he gets 50 per cent. of the moving picture receipts.
LONDON, June 29.
 The Duke of Teck, who is to be accompanied by a small military mission, including a field marshal of the British Army, will represent King George at the funeral of the Archduke Ferdinand.
HALIFAX, June 29.
 Completed returns for the Ontario Provincial elections held to-day, show the results of the polling as follows: Sir James Whitney's party (Conservatives) 80; Mr. Rowell's "Banish the Bar" (Liberal) 23; Independent, 1.
BERLIN, June 29.
 The Berlin morning papers, representing all parties, made in considering the tragedy as the outcome of Slavonic embitterment over Austria's internal policy. The Tagblatt says that Serbian hatred for the Austro-Hungarian state was the motive of the crime, and that the Archduke and his wife have fallen victims to the passionate enmity which the Austro-

Hungarian policy has, of late years, awakened among the Serbian peoples.
OTTAWA, June 29.
 According to an official report to the Labor Department from its special agent at El Paso, 250 "Colorados" or federal irregulars, who were captured by the Constitutionalists at Salinas, were executed by firing squads. These are accused by the rebels of carrying on rapine and robbery under the guise of war.
ROME, June 29.
 King Victor Emmanuel and Pope Pius sent envoys to the Austrian Emperor to-day. The Pope cancelled the St. Peter's Day reception, for which 10,000 invitations has been issued. The assassination of the Archduke Francis Ferdinand created a deep impression throughout Italy, on account of the close relations with Austria. Only recently the signing of the concordat between the Pope and Serbia took place, and it was generally considered that this would tend to diminish Serbian agitation against Austria.
LONDON, June 29.
 The morning papers editorially, express strongest indignation and sorrow at the manner of the Archduke's death. The Telegraph says: His death is a serious loss to Europe at large, as well as to Austria. The Times fears that Sunday's events must assuredly add clouds to the political outlook of Austria and Hungary. It thinks that the dual system will probably be strengthened for a time, but the more the Southern Slavonic hopes recede, the greater will be the danger of an ultimate explosion.

Woman Hunts Big Game.

Lady Hunter in London Tells of Jungle Thrills.
 Long hours of "stalking" wearisome nights spent sitting over a "kill" awaiting the return of a panther and endless miles on the back of an elephant through thick jungle in quest of a tiger are amongst the incidents experienced by Mrs. Holmes-Tarn, who has just returned from India, whither she accompanied her husband on a shooting expedition. The pursuit of big game is a sport which is attracting numbers of women.
 The sportsman in India may shoot in two ways. There is the one which requires much preparation beforehand, when jungles are plentifully baited in advance with young buffalo to attract tigers to that spot ready for the guns, and there is the other when the sportsman chances his luck in a scratch beat, or a long stalk through the jungles, with a buffalo tied up at random on the chance of "drawing" a tiger. The latter method, more sporting, if also more arduous, was adopted by Mrs. Holmes-Tarn and her husband.
 Mrs. Holmes-Tarn's experiences of shooting are not, however, confined to India. She has probably had more round shooting experience than other women. "My first trip was to the Rocky Mountains, in the Wyoming state," she said. "It was a rough trip; sometimes we slept on the ground in the snow. We were after deer, wapti and bears." Later the speaker went to Canada where, amongst other animals, a moose and caribou fell to her rifle. East Africa is, however, her favorite hunting ground. A rhinoceros, shot with a .303 rifle, and an elephant and rhinoceros with a .400, are amongst her most prized African trophies.
 "I was trapping small animals for the British Museum that trip," remarked Mrs. Holmes-Tarn, "and managed to capture two new general and ten rare species. Once when Mr. Cunningham and I were out after elephant we were lost for 24 hours, dined off a zebra's liver roasted on sticks and only reached camp thanks to the help of a friendly herdsman. Another time it was touch and go whether we were charged by a herd of elephants, but fortunately, they stampeded in the opposite direction. To my mind there is no country like East Africa for shooting. Snap-shooting and stalking through the jungles in India may please people who have not shot anywhere else, but East Africa spoils you for other countries."

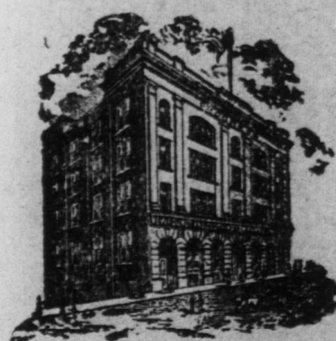

HALIFAX, To-day.
Edward Cook was hanged here this morning for the murder of a Syrian pedlar, Chas. Asaff.

VIENNA, To-day.
The Archduke and Duchess will be buried the middle of next week at Anstetten, Upper Austria.

TORONTO, To-day.
Sir Adam Beck was accorded a record majority in the London Constituency, defeating Dr. Stevenson, Liberal, by 1,496.

PITTSBURG, To-day.
Rev. P. Tanner, Principal of the High School at Weir, was killed and four others received injuries as a result of a fire, which destroyed the main building of Pittsburg State Normal School here.

HAMMONDSPOUR, To-day.
Lieut. Porte had his trans-Atlantic flying boat out for a short run yesterday. The machine carried a load of 1,500 pounds, making a gross weight of nearly five thousand, which was very satisfactory.

LONDON, To-day.
Nationalists received a rebuff from Asquith yesterday, when Devlin put a question, concerning Lord Londonderry's attending parades of Ulster Volunteers, since he is aide-de-camp. The Premier pointed out that his duties were entirely of a honorary character and that the matter was beneath notice.

MEXICO CITY, June 29.
Sir Lionel Carden, British Minister, to-day advised all the British subjects temporarily to leave the country. He said a shortage in fuel used for the operation of trains was becoming more acute daily, that trains would probably soon stop running which would make difficult the departure of persons in the interior. Sir Lionel said he believed it to be his duty to urge all British subjects to leave the capital immediately and he especially advised the women and children to be removed. The minister declared he had no design to frighten the members of the British Colony.

HALIFAX, June 29.
The latest returns at midnight from Ontario give the standing of parties as follows: Conservatives, 82; Liberals, 25; Independent, 2. At the dissolution the parties stood: Conservatives, 87; Liberals, 17; Labor, 1. The election finds the Government returned to power with a majority of over 50, the two parties standing in the new legislature almost where they stood in the last. All members of the Government are returned with increased majorities, with the exception of Hon. Dr. Peaume, who went down to defeat in North Essex, the French Canadian of Ontario thus losing their representative in the Government. Rowell, Liberal leader, running one of the strongest Liberal constituencies in Canada, North Oxford, had his majority greatly reduced. Every seat in the City of Toronto, is held by the Government.

Whale Fishery.

According to latest reports from the whaling stations, the Puma and Lynx, operating at Rose au Rhue, have six whales each to date. The Hump and Cabot which operate from Dublin Cove and Balena respectively, have four each, and the outlook appears none too promising. Nothing has been heard from the Cachelot, which is at Hawke's Hr. station. It is thought that ice has hindered operations, as she is not reported to have secured any fish to date.

Household Notes

The best foods to choose for cooking in the fireless cooker are those which take a long while to prepare—soups, potroasts, beans, etc. To make "lemon honeycomb" sweat the juice of a lemon and put it in the dish you wish to serve it in. Mix the beaten white of one egg with a pint of rich cream and a little sugar. Whisk it, and as the froth rises, put it on the lemon juice. Do it the day before it is to be used. Trays are just pretty things and so very convenient that every room in the house should boast of two or three. A bit of brocaded ribbon, printed pongee or Oriental embroidery will be delightful with glass over it and framed in appropriate wood. To get any sort of thickening smooth stir it with an egg-beater or perforated cake- spoon. If clothes are yellow a tablespoonful of peroxide of hydrogen put in the water in which they are soaked will bleach them. A water-proof apron is a good investment for wash-day. An old raincoat may be used for it. If you wash or clean your gloves yourself, a flat wooden form to stretch them over is a great resource. Choose sunny, windy days on which to wash the blankets. 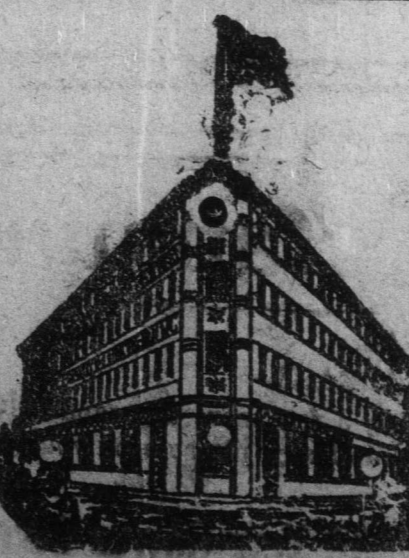

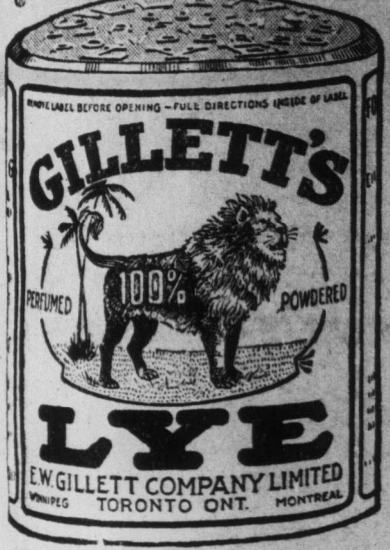

INVERMORE RETURNING.—The s.s. Invermore reached Battle Harbor at 7 p.m. yesterday, coming south. Capt. Kean reports heavy ice five to ten miles off the shore from White Cockade to Battle Harbor. There was no codfish along the coast but codlin were reported fairly plentiful at Hawke's Harbor.

Another of the Zeppelin airships of the German army, the 'Z 1', was wrecked near Diedenhofen, on June 13th, when trying to effect an emergency landing, the cruiser breaking at right angles behind the rear gondola. A lieutenant was injured. The accident occurred during a flight from Cologne to Metz. The 'Z 1' with a military crew on board, ran into a rainstorm, and the commander decided to descend. When the air vessel was within a few yards of the ground, a sudden vertical gust of wind forced it violently to earth, and it broke virtually in two. The airship will have to be entirely dismembered for repairs. This accident is the eighth disaster to a Zeppelin airship by wreck, fire, or explosion. Zeppelins I, II, and VI, Deutschlands I and II, and 'L 1' and 'L 11' all had been destroyed, with a heavy loss of life. In the case of the 'L 11' the entire crew of twenty-eight officers and men were killed when the airship was burned in mid-air during its trial flight at Berlin. The 'L 1', her sister ship, had previously been caught in a storm in the North Sea, and fell into the water, with the loss of fifteen of her crew of twenty-two.

And at dawn ride into the bay. But the ships of my soul are fated ships Whatever their freight may be. There is never a dawn but finds them gone. For they all go down at sea.

Polar Sausage Rations.

Sir E. Shackleton on His Expedition.

Sir Ernest Shackleton, who returned to London yesterday from his expedition in Norway, told a representative of Reuter that he was pleased with the results of the test. "The whole test," he said, "has shown that our preparations are in the right direction."

"The two greatest successes have proved to be our tent and the air propeller motor-sledge. The pace of the sledge carrying the motor will have to be much wider, so as to prevent capsizing."

One of the most exciting experiences was the capsizing of the motor sledge while turning a steep slope. But no one was hurt. The conditions were not sufficiently severe to ascertain all that was necessary about the food, but so far as it was possible to test the rations they proved highly satisfactory. They were so filling that half of a 36-oz. ration was found to be sufficient.

"The breakfast and dinner rations, each made up as small sausages, consisted of lard, sugar, powdered milk, rolled oats, and gelatine, while the mid day ration, enclosed in a square sausage skin, consisted of almonds, beach-nuts, and Brazil-nuts, all compressed and mixed with oil and powdered milk. The only drink was tea and milk.—Daily Mail, May 30.

Pearls of Great Price.

There has lately been exhibited at a Court Jeweller's in Bond Street, a magnificent pearl, enclosed in a square-shaped drop pearl, perfectly symmetrical. \$14,000 is asked. But probably the most exquisite article in the collection is a single necklet of gems of extraordinary hue, the matching and graduation being superb. The cost of this article is £34,000.

But the owners warn a would-be purchaser that if one of the stones were lost it would be impossible to replace it with an exact duplicate. Black and pink pearls also found a place in the exhibition; while a passing reference must be made to a pair of button-shaped ear-rings valued at £3,500. One of the representatives of the firm gives a word of advice upon the preservation and treatment of pearls. Upon no account, he said, should they be locked up in a safe or other dark place for lengthy periods, since such treatment soon causes them to lose their "life" and become dull. If their fair owners find that for some reason or other they cannot wear them outside their garments they should make a point of wearing them underneath their dress, next to the skin. Constant contact with the human skin gives to the stones right lustre, gloss, and sheen. The best possible way to keep pearls in a perfect state of preservation, as well as to prolong their life, is to wear them always, both by night and by day.

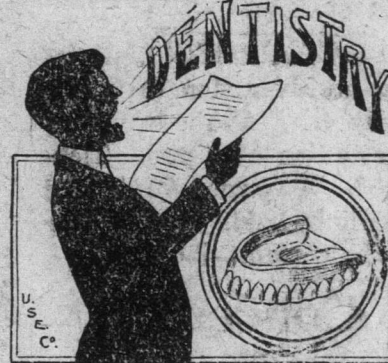

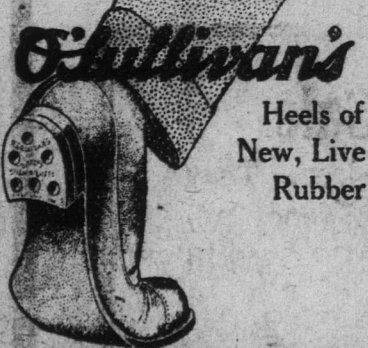

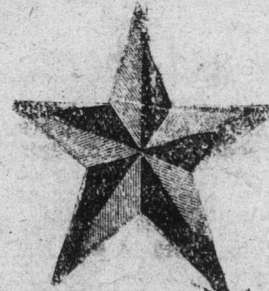
