Economic Conference Of the Allies Important Decisions.

Official Message from Secretary of State.

Clementel, Minister of Commerce, on June 14th, 15th, 16th and 17th, 1916, for the purpose of fulfilling the mandate given to them by the Paris Conference of March 28th, 1916, giving practical expression to their solidarity of views and interests, and proposing to their respective governments appropriate easures for realising this solidarity. They declare that, after forcing on

(1) Laws and regulations prohibiting trading with the enemy, shall be brought into accord for this purpose, (2) The Allies will prohibit their own subjects and citizens and all persons residing in their territories om carrying on any trade with the inhabitants of enemy countries, what-ever their nationality, by enemy subects wherever resident, or by persons, irms and companies whose business is controlled wholly or partially by enemy subjects or is subject to enemy influence, and whose names are included in a special list.

They will prohibit importation into

their territories of all goods originatplete and humiliating; to quote Joyn-son-Hicks' own words: "I really think ng from enemy countries. (3) They will devise means of establishing a system enabling contracts entered into with enemy subjects, and injurious to national interests, to be ancelled unconditionally.

(4) Business undertakings owned or perated by enemy subjects in the erritories of the Allies will all be sequestrated or placed under control; measures will be taken for the pur-pose of winding up some of these undertakings and of realising their as-sets and proceeds, such realisation emaining sequestrated or under cou-

In addition to the export-prohibitions necessitated by the internal sit-uation of each of the Allied countries the Allies will complete measures already taken for the restriction of enemy supplies, both in the Mother countries and in the Dominions, Colnies and Protectorates:

PERMANENT MEASURES OF MU-TUAL ASSISTANCE AND COLLA-BORATION AMONG THE ALLIES:



On the northern flank of General Brusiloff's front the Austrian resistance has been considerably stiffened by the arrival of a large number of German reinforcements and has succeeded in checking the Russian drive between Lutsk and Kovel, which is directed against Vladimir Volynski and aims at destroying the Austrian communications between Kovel and Lemberg, but in spite of violent Austro-German counter attacks, one of which broke through the Russian lines, the latest reports are to the effect that the Russians have again re-sumed progress in this sector after taking the usual toll of prisoners. DIRECTIONS

FOR THE GUIDANCE OF ELECTORS IN VOTING.

Each elector, on entering the room where the poll is being held, shall declare his name, surname, and addition. After so doing he shall receive two ballot papers in the above forms respectively.
Each elector, if required by the De-

puty Returning Officer, the Poll Clerk, one of the Candidates, or one of their agents shall, before receiving his hallot papers, take an oath of qualifica-The voter is to vote only for one candidate for Mayor and for six candidates as Councillors.

After receiving the ballot papers the voter shall go into one of the compartments and with a pencil, there provided, place a cross in the division containing the name of the candidate for Mayor, and the six candidates for Councillors, for whom he intends

The voter will then fold each ballot paper, so as to show a portion of the back only, with the initials of the Deputy Returning Officer, and shall hand them so folded up to the Deputy Returning Officer, and the Deputy Re turning Officer shall, without unfolding them, ascertain that they are the ballot papers which he furnished to the elector, and then immediately place them in the Ballot Box. The voter shall forthwith leave the Polling

If a voter inadvertently spoils a ballot paper, he may return it to the Deputy Returning Officer, who will give him another.

If a voter votes for more candidates

than he is entitled to vote for, or places any mark on the ballot papers by which he can afterwards be identified, his vote will be void and will not

If a voter takes a ballot or ballot paper out of the Polling Station, or fraudulently puts any other paper into the Ballot Box than the papers given him by the Deputy Returning Officer, he will be subject to punishment by a fine of Five Hundred Dollars, or by imprisonment for a time lars or by imprisonment for a time not exceeding six months, with or without hard labour.

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
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
