**Avondale Notes.**  
 From present appearances it looks as if a beneficent Providence will be a blessing of the coming season. More attention than usual is given by our people to the cultivation of farm crops due, no doubt, to the increased cost of commercial commodities to almost double, and in some cases treble their former value—and prospects look bright for bountiful rewards for our people's industry in this direction.  
 Nearly all fishermen and labourers have repaired to the scene of the summer's operations. We think a larger exodus than on former occasions in springtime has gone to build up Uncle Sam. It is regrettable in this instance to see the fisheries of our country that are so very remunerative deserted by men who have spent the whole of their earning tenure in their prosecution, and whose fathers with far less facilities than present-day methods afford knew no other occupation and produced therefrom comfortable homesteads with always a full cupboard. In some cases the scarcity of men to constitute the planter's crew is the fault, while others are lured from our staple industry by reports of the shekels to be amassed in the big Presidency.  
 To meet the growing demands of their business the "Kennedy Co." are building a new and more commodious store. The erection is to be a three-storey one and the manager of the business, Mr. George Kennedy, M. H. A., is having the work done on plans that will ensure the greatest convenience in the extensive trade in which the premises has always dealt. Mr. Nicholas Lacour is the foreman, and about fifteen labourers are employed.  
 Dr. Jones is attending to the exterior renovation of his residence and surgery. The painting is green and white which contrasts admirably with the foliage and flowers that adorn the surrounding ground and premises.  
 Recently Mr. John Moore resigned his work as Sacristan of the Church at Avondale. Mr. Moore spent more than forty years in the teaching profession in different places in the country, and during his long tenure at Avondale he acted in the above capacity with the coveted commendation of four separate pastors and the congregation of parishioners as well.

Yesterday flags and hunting adorned the residences and hill-tops of Colliers, and the occasion was one amply meritorious to draw largely on the people's joy and thanksgiving. For on that date was there not one of their number in the person of Mr. P. Hearn endowed with the plentitude of Holy Orders? Rev. Fr. Hearn is the son of the late James and Mrs. Hearn, merchant, of Colliers. "Master" Hearn, as the father was always familiarly called, after completing his studies at St. Bonaventure's College, taught school in his native place, and under his tuition his eldest children first saw the light of love. The illustrious son who strove assiduously and yesterday won the nuptial wreath from heaven by being the first from the settlement to receive ordination to minister to God, is the youngest son of the family, and like his late lamented father spent some time in teaching at Colliers after qualifying in the Associate in Arts degree at St. Bonaventure's College. About five years ago he proceeded to Rome to complete his studies for the Priesthood. We congratulate Rev. Fr. Hearn on his initiation in the sacred ministry, and extend to Mrs. Hearn and the other members of her family our hearty felicitations on the signal favour with which heaven has blessed them.

Incidentally, too, we may add that though a primer scholar well nigh a quarter of a century ago when the present venerable prelate, the Rt. Rev. Monsignor Veitch—whose life is now full of years and fuller still if possible of labours, was appointed to the parish of Conception Harbor, of which Colliers forms a part, yet we have vivid recollections of the status quo then prevailing generally, and in the mental wanderings of an absent citizen, we can derive both pleasure and an incentive—the former on the new order of things wrought since that time, and the latter in the energetic means to that end.
