

I would respectfully suggest that the Municipal Council study the situation as it pertains to this and ther streets such as Military Road, Allandale Road, etc., and plan to erect temporary snow fences (such as are used along the railway line) during the month of December. such a fence was erected on the orthern side of LeMarchant Road t stop the ground drift off Buck master's Field, I believe the trouble ould be greatly minimized and pro bably cured until the property referred to is protected by houses. The Eastern end of the road, which i always open, is proof of the value o

such protection. The first cost of the snow fence may not be more, and probably would be less, than the amount needed to open up the road after every storm. The Reid Nfld. Co. officials could give valuable advice as to the specification of the proposed






