
waiting applause; and Vernon Vane walks over to the table at which Hal is turning over the pages of a scrap-book.



British Merchant Marine Leads the World.

U.S. Will Not be Represented at Meeting of Premiers--French Elections Strengthen Government--Lord Mayor of Cork Will be Deported--Japanese May Not be Admitted to American Citizenship.

BEATING ALL THE WORLD.
NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—Britain is now building more merchant ships than all the rest of the world combined, says a statement issued today by Lloyds Register of Shipping.

U.S.A. WITHDRAWS.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—The immediate withdrawal of United States troops from further participation in the Council of Ambassadors in Paris was reported today to have been decided upon. The State Department officials declined to discuss the report, but they did say that the United States government would not be represented at the meeting of premiers next week at which France and Great Britain will discuss ways means for enforcing the terms of the Treaty of Versailles, affecting particularly conditions in the Ruhr.

DEBATES GAIN IN FRENCH ELECTION.
PARIS, Jan. 11.—Complete returns for Senatorial elections Sunday, shows gains for Centre parties, both right and left losing seats. Results for ninety-five seats contested: Conservatives, three; Radicals, thirty-nine; Radicals and Socialists, forty-three; Republican Socialists, eleven.

GOVERNMENT STRENGTHENED.
PARIS, Jan. 11.—Sunday's elections, in which one of the seats in the French Senate was filled, strengthened the position of the Government, according to the Echo de Paris. All members of the Ministry, with the exception of Henri Ricard, Minister of Culture, who were candidates, elected it is said.

BRITISH EXCHANGE SOARS.
NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—There was a veritable boom in foreign exchange today, particularly British rate, which rose to \$3.72 and a half. This is the highest bid for that remittance since

the early part of last August. Informed banking circles, however, the movement was believed to have much of its momentum from cables intimating that preparations are being made by the British Government to refund its obligations in the United States.

DISTURBANCES IN INDIA.
ALLAHABAD, India, Jan. 11.—(Delayed)—Agrarian disturbances on a considerable scale are reported in the Rai Bareilly District, southeast of Lucknow. Troops are being sent to the affected region.

CALIFORNIA ASSEMBLY BACKS UP SENATE.
SACRAMENTO, Calif., Jan. 11.—The Assembly of the California Legislature adopted today by unanimous vote without reference to the Committee, the Senate resolution asking that no treaty be made with Japan granting citizenship to the Japanese or nullifying the provisions of the new Anti-Alien Land Law.

PROTESTING AGAINST EMERGENCY TARIFF BILL.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Dissatisfaction with the Fordney Emergency Tariff Bill began to manifest itself today at the Senate Finance Committee resumed progress on the measure. Representatives of producers of sugar, receivers in New York of shipments of Bermuda potatoes and onions, and other importers appeared to protest against the Bill as it passed the House.

WILL REMOVE EMBARGO.
MONTREAL, Jan. 11.—Transportation of Dominion Steel Corporation products over Canadian National railways will be recommended on Saturday, if the decision reached by the directors of the Corporation after considerable deliberation and made public today, meets with the approval of the railway. An embargo on these products has been in force since December 28, but to avoid any complications the Corporation had decided for a time at least to offer no business to the railway. This, however, caused considerable

landing of the Western Union Barbados Cable as had been charged earlier in the day by President Carleton of the Western Union Company.

WILL SPAN THE EARTH.
SAINTE ASSIZ, France, Jan. 11.—The corner stone of what is designed to be the most powerful radio station in the world and capable of working with all stations on the earth was laid here yesterday.

CANADIAN CURLERS DEFEAT SCOTSMEN.
GLASGOW, Jan. 11.—Canadian curlers who arrived here last week on the Empress of France played two matches at Edinburgh. They beat Glasgow Province by 108 to 65 and Renfrew Province by 80 to 63.

HOPE TO FIND DEVALERA USEFUL.
LONDON, Jan. 11.—That apparent unanimity of Esmond De Valera from arrest would continue as long as De Valera does not participate in the affairs of the extreme nationalists, was the statement made in authoritative quarters in London today. Government officials express the belief and hope that owing to De Valera having allegedly been compromised at home by what is claimed to be a split within the ranks of Irish Americans and taking cognizance of what is termed moderate opinion in Ireland which the Government contends is growing in strength and influence, it is possible De Valera will become servicable in bringing into force the Home Rule Act toward which end the Government is mobilizing its policy and bending every effort.

ATTEMPTED TO ASSASSINATE TWO OFFICERS.
DUBLIN, Jan. 11.—A sensational attempt was made this morning to assassinate two officers, who with the wife of one of them were riding in a touring car in the outskirts of Dublin. The car was riddled with bullets, but the driver sped up and escaped with the passengers, one of the officers being wounded.

O'CALLAGHAN MUST RETURN.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Refusal to waive passport restrictions in the case of Daniel J. O'Callaghan, Lord Mayor of Cork, who arrived from Ireland last week as a stowaway without a passport, was decided upon today by the State Department. The announcement was made that an opinion of the solicitor of the State Department that there was no reason why an exception should be made in the case of the Lord Mayor, had been concurred in by Acting Secretary of State Davis, and the decision transmitted to the Secretary of Labor, Wilson.

BELIEVED DEAD.
TIPTONVILLE, Tennessee, Jan. 11.—The finding of an overcoat sleeve of Capt. Simpson, formerly of Toronto, pilot, and a cushion of a hydro-aeroplane in the Mississippi River near here today, was taken to indicate that Simpson and his mechanic, Carl Fisher were dead. Simpson and Fisher were enroute from Cincinnati on a three thousand mile trip with films of moving picture and are supposed to have fallen into the river when their plane caught fire, near Tiptonville, Sunday. Simpson served for more than three years as an aviator in the Canadian and British armies.

NO PRESSURE WAS USED.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Acting Secretary of State Davis denied today before the Senate Committee that the State Department had brought any pressure to bear on the Cuban Government to prevent the

Performing Diver's Accidental Suicide.

On Monday, January 11, 1841, Samuel Scott a diver from the United States of America, about twenty-seven years of age, accidentally hung himself when preparing to leap into the river Thames from Waterloo Bridge at London. A "Challenge to the World" from him had been for some time posted over the streets of the Metropolis, to "make this jump of forty feet, and to return to the 'White Lion' Inn at Drury Lane." With the bridge crowded to witness his performance, he placed his head in a rope, and after swinging for a few seconds did so again head downwards. Having climbed the ladder he exclaimed, "Now I will dance once more before I die." But after he had placed his head within the rope a second time and swung himself off, one person observed that his animation seemed to have ceased, and though one of the performer's friends replied that he had not hung half his usual time, two persons were able after some time to descend the ladder and cut him down, but a surgeon opened what is named the jugular vein, from the Latin "jugere," meaning "to join," as belonging to the collar-bone, which joins the neck and shoulders, and he found that only a few drops of blood flowed, and that the performer seemed lifeless. His body was removed with all possible speed to Charing Cross Hospital, and was there subjected to the influence of galvanism, now called electricity, by Benjamin Golding, a noted physician who lived from 1793 till 1863; who used every other expedient to restore the man's life but without success.

The Two Plague Spots of Europe.
The weak spots in the trading organism of the world are two. In the first place, Russia is not functioning in the economic sphere; she is still an unbridged vacuum. In the second place, nearer at home, and adversely affecting in a greater or less degree all immediate neighbors, is Central Europe, with its plague centre in Austria. Austria is in the condition of an undeclared bankrupt. Every message that comes to this country shows the urgency of dealing quickly with her problem before the country cracks and involves others yet more deeply in her disaster.—London Daily Chronicle.

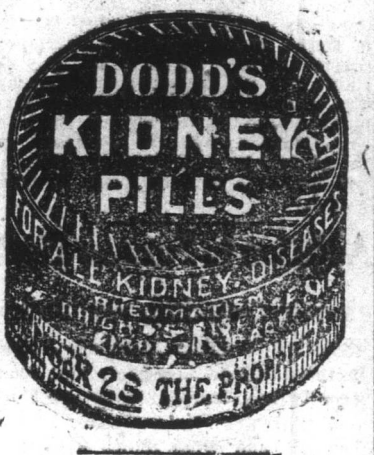

"MOTHER NEVER SEEMS TO NOTICE."



Here is a rather touching little tale that I heard the other day.

Lucy is a very lovely young girl. She seems almost incapable of hurrying. It takes her almost twice as long as other children to dress or undress, or eat her dinner, or get her things to go out.

Naturally this is constantly interfering with the routine of the household and she is always trying to get her mother to hurry up. "But I don't see how I can do the least good," she said.

One day she was on Lucy's side of the case, and she was presented when a visitor helped her under one arm.

"You don't hurry up and get ready before the other children?" she said. "I don't think it's any good. I do try to hurry, but mother never seems to notice."

Need the Sunshine as Well as the Rain.

The little incident was repeated to her and she was almost too self-accusatory. Henceforth she is sure she will notice efforts in the right direction no matter how slight.

Of course it is not only children who need the sunshine of commendation and appreciation. In every human relationship the recognition of effort as well as the censure of faults is necessary for happiness and growth.

Makes Up His Mind He Won't Try.

Many and many a time when a husband or wife makes some effort to overcome a fault that annoys the other and that effort goes unrecognized, and nothing is said until the fault is committed again and censured, the one who tried is embittered and makes up his mind not to try again.

Whereas if the little effort had been promptly encouraged by praise and appreciation, it might have developed into a much bigger effort.

Personally, I think it is worth while to go almost further in your praise than the effort merits since by so doing you establish in the other person's mind a flattering picture of himself which he must live up to.

Help Them Paint That Picture.

I believe that a great many people practice virtue partly because they are trying to live up to a flattering picture of themselves which they have set up in their own minds. If you can help establish such a picture in another's mind by your praise, you have helped establish a standard by which pride will bid him or her try to live.

There is a great deal said about the evils of pride, but I think there is no greater force for good in the world than the right kind of pride.

The True Story of "Messiah."

The Handel and Haydn Society, from which the Christmas performance of Handel's "Messiah" have become an annual rite, is the oldest musical institution in the country, but not half so old as the popularity of the "Messiah" itself. This immortal oratorio is nearly 250 years old, but so everlasting is the caliber of Handel's genius that it can hold a musically uneducated audience as strongly as ever before.

Handel was 57 years old when he wrote it. He had spent his life trying to make London operatic, writing operas after operas, producing them, making fortunes and losing them over night to such a degree that he was declared bankrupt again and again. The last reverse was too much for even his dauntless energy and rallying will, and, announcing he was leaving England for good, he went to Dublin in 1742 and composed in less than three weeks a new oratorio, "The Messiah." Thus ran the newspaper announcement:

"For relief of the prisoners in the Mercer's Hospital on Stephen's Street, and of the Charitable Infirmary in the Tan's Quay, on Monday, the 12th of April, will be performed at the Music Hall in Fishamble Street, Mr. Handel's new grand Oratorio called the 'Messiah,' in which the gentlemen of the choir of both Cathedrals will assist, with some Concertos on the Organ, by Mr. Handel, etc., etc."

The ladies are requested not to come with hoops this day in the Music Hall in Fishamble Street. The gentlemen are desired to come without their swords.

"The Messiah" was duly performed with an extraordinary success, bringing with it a popularity which has never waned from that day to this. So revered was Handel after this that when he conducted at subsequent concerts, no one dared to cross him. At the close of an air he would cry out the word "Chorus!" in a formidable voice. If the ladies in court indulged in conversation during the music, he was capable of swearing and calling names, "whereupon," writes Barney, "the gentle princess, who loved him much, would say to the offenders, 'Hush, hush, Handel is angry.'"

The only dissenting voice was that of Mr. Jennens, who wrote the text. "I shall show you a collection I gave Handel," he wrote to a friend, "called 'Messiah,' which I value highly, and he has made a fine Entertainment of it, though not near as good as he might and ought to have done. I have with great difficulty made him correct some of the grossest faults in the composition, but he retained his obstinately, in which there are some passages far unworthy of Handel, but much more unworthy of the 'Messiah.'"

Despite Mr. Jennens, the "Messiah" has been beloved and honored in all parts of the world, and the custom has been established in England of giving benefit performances, thus perpetuating the spirit of its original performance.—Boston Herald.

CITY AND COUNTRY.

It seems a ghastly pity that all the girls and boys are thronging to the city, grown tired of village joys. The city bids them enter, gives them the cordial hand; and down in old Hay Center the empty buildings stand. "Aw, chee," the kids are saying, "the old town is a frost; we'll go where bands are playing, regardless of the cost." The country town is shrinking, it's known a dismal slump, with only graybeards drinking around the village pump. The sad-eyed merchant princes gaze down the dusty street, and brushing shell worn quinces, invoke the name of Pete. The young folks all are leaving, they go on every train to search for joy, decaying, and pleasures all in vain.

Adventure is the mentor that counsels them to go; and down in old Hay Center the life is pretty slow. Hay Center's ways are quiet, she's calm, without, within; she has no midnight riot, or garish brands of sin. Her people all are sleeping when village clocks strike ten, and no cheap sports are keeping high wassail in a den. They go to church on Sunday to hear the pastor shout and all the dames on Monday still hang the washing out. Hay Center has no pink uns to chronicle life's game; but from such towns our Lincoln and other great men came. It's sad to see her dying, abandoned, dusty, gray; but all the kids are striving to tread the Great White Way.

Kiss in Court Causes Scene.

Wade smiled as the deputy sheriff rushed him through the prisoner's pen, to the basement of the courthouse where it appeared that the crowd was going to seize him. Mrs. Nott, who is also held on a charge of first degree murder in connection with her husband's death, went into hysterics following Wade's kiss. She threw her arms above her head and screamed wildly.

"Take her out," yelled the crowd and two deputy sheriffs lifted her in their arms and rushed her from the courtroom.

It was the second time during the day that the wife of the murdered man had been carried from the courtroom.

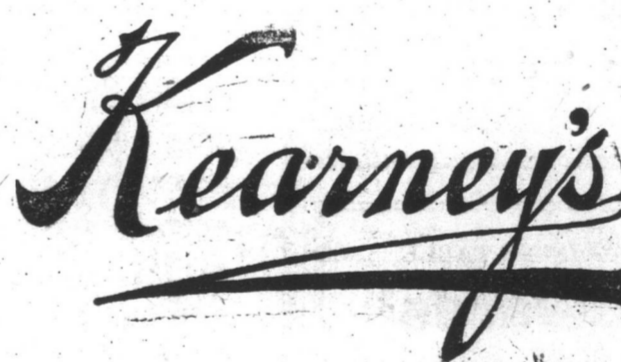
